

Elon Musk's X sues union government over alleged censorship and IT Act violations

Social media giant 'X' (formerly Twitter), owned by U.S. billionaire Elon Musk, on Thursday (March 20, 2025) filed a lawsuit in the Karnataka High Court against the Government of India, challenging what it called unlawful content regulation and arbitrary censorship. It raised concerns over the Centre's interpretation of the Information Technology (IT) Act, particularly its use of Section 79(3)(b), which 'X' argues violates Supreme Court rulings and undermines free expression online. The lawsuit alleged the government is using the said section to create a parallel content-blocking mechanism, bypassing the structured legal process outlined in Section 69A.

'X' claimed this approach contradicts the Supreme Court's 2015 ruling in the Shreya Singhal case, which established that content can only be blocked through a proper judicial process or the legally defined route under Section 69A. According to the Ministry of Information and Broadcasting (I&B), Section 79(3)(b) mandates online platforms to remove illegal content when directed by either a court order or a government notification. If a platform fails to comply within 36 hours, it risks losing its safe harbor protection under Section 79(1) and could be held accountable under various laws, including the Indian Penal Code (IPC). However, X has contested this interpretation, arguing that the provision does not grant the government independent authority to block content.Instead, it accused authorities of misusing the law to impose arbitrary censorship without following due pro-

Under Section 69A of the IT Act, the government has the power to block public access to digital content if it is deemed a threat to national security, sovereignty, or public

order. However, this process is regulated by the 2009 Information Technology (Procedure and Safeguards for Blocking for Access of Information by Public) Rules, which require a structured review process before blocking decisions are made.'X' has argued that instead of following these procedures, the government is using Section 79(3)(b) as a shortcut, allowing content to be removed without the necessary scrutiny. The platform sees this as a direct violation of legal safeguards meant to prevent arbitrary censorship. Another major point in the social media platform's legal challenge is its opposition to the government's Sahyog portal. Created by the Indian Cyber Crime Coordination Centre (I4C) under the Ministry of Home Affairs, this platform was designed to streamline takedown requests under Section 79(3)(b) and facilitate direct communication between social media platforms and law enforcement agencies. Twitter, the IT Act, and the blocking saga explained | In Focus PodcastHowever, 'X' has refused to onboard an employee onto the Sahyog portal, claiming it acts as a "censorship tool" that pressures platforms to remove content without proper legal review. The lawsuit argues that this is yet another attempt by the government to control online discourse without judicial oversight.

Russian President Vladimir Putin's decision to halt attacks on Ukraine's energy infrastructure for 30 days is far from being the breakthrough for lasting peace. While President Donald Trump promotes this partial truce as progress, he reality is more complex. By refusing a full ceasefire and demanding an end to western military aid to Ukraine, Putin is setting terms that serve only Moscow's interests. The ceasefire focusses solely on energy infrastructure, and even that commitment appears shaky. Mere hours after Putin's call with Trump, Russian drones struck Ukraiian cities, including a hospital in Sumy. Meanwhile, Ukraihian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy, though supporting he limited truce, remains cautious. His concerns are alid.The White House's handling of negotiations raises ed flags. The upcoming peace talks in Jeddah, Saudi Arabia, lack clarity on Ukraine's direct participation. Frump's claim that military aid to Ukraine was "not discussed" contradicts the Kremlin's assertion that it is cenral to Russia's demands. European leaders, including Germany's Olaf Scholz and France's Emmanuel Macron, emain wary. They rightly emphasise that Ukraine must e fully involved in any settlement. A deal that legitimises Russian territorial gains or weakens Ukraine's military tanding would only prolong the conflict and embolden uture aggression. Yet, dismissing talks entirely would be a mistake. This brutal war has stretched into its third year, eaving hundreds of thousands dead, displacing millions and devastating cities. A lasting peace must be the ultinate goal — not just a fragile truce that prolongs sufferng. Diplomacy must aim beyond temporary ceasefires o secure Ukraine's sovereignty and regional stability. Peace must emerge from negotiations that uphold interational law. Without a firm commitment to a just resoluion, the war will continue at immense human and eco-

Along with the PMShri scheme, mobile Anganwadi

centers should be completely abolished in the State.

The CPI(M) is demanding that the 10 months' wages due to them be paid immediately. They have been protesting against the fixed salary of Rs 18,000 for Asha workers and the abolition of the target. The State government has said it will hold talks with them and form a committee with an IAS officer to resolve the issue and take action based on those proposals. It promised to increase the salaries of Asha workers and provide job security during the elections. But their problems have not been resolved," he said.He also said the CPI(M) was demanding that their legitimate demands such as abolition of holidays, ANC, PSC and other targets, retirement benefits of Rs 5 lakh, provision of restrooms for Asha workers in all hospitals, half of their salaries as pension and so on be addressed. Delhi Metro completes tunnelling on Phase 4's deepest underground stretch on Golden Line

The Delhi Metro Rail Corporation (DMRC) Tuesday completed tunnelling on the deepest underground stretch of Phase 4 with a tunnel breakthrough at the IGNOU station on the Aerocity-Tughlakabad corridor, known as the Golden Line. The newly completed tunnel, stretching 1,460 metres from Chhattarpur Mandir to IGNOU, was constructed using a tunnel boring machine (TBM). The depth of the tunnel varies between 18 and 39 metres. Another parallel tunnel on the same route was completed on February 25. The DMRC has now achieved three tunnelling breakthroughs in the last four weeks as part of Phase 4 under-

Chief Minister Rekha Gupta and Environment Minis ter Manjinder Singh Sirsa attended the event. Slamming the previous Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) government, Gupta said, "The earlier government tried to stop the Metro project. The Delhi government's share was not given. Even today, the Delhi government's liability of Rs 10,000 crore towards Delhi Metro is pending."The Golden Line, part of Phase 4 of the Delhi Metro expansion, aims to improve connectivity in the city's southern parts. The corridor will link Aerocity, a major transit hub near the Indira Gandhi International (IGI) Airport, with Tughlakabad. Approximately 19.343 km of the approved 40.109 km corridor is underground.

Only two Delhi Metro tunnels are deeper than this: a tunnel on the Magenta Line in Phase 3 was built at a depth of about 30 metres, while another for the Airport Express Line passes below the Rajiv Chowk station at about 45 metres. According to the DMRC, the tunnel was built using the earth pressure balancing method (EPBM), with a concrete lining made of precast tunnel rings cast at a facility in Mundka. The construction involved the installation of 1,048 rings with an inner diameter of 5.8 metres. "This tunnelling project was challenging because of the high mica content," said Amit Bagla, an engineer with construction firm Larsen

Facing tax demands of Rs 243.74 crore, Clean Ganga Mission to contest I-T orders, seeks nod to revise returns

With no end in sight to its tax woes, the National Mission for Clean Ganga (NMCG), which is facing tax demands amounting to Rs 243.74 crore, has contested the income tax (I-T) department's assessment orders and is in the process of filing appeals. According to the NMCG, the central agency responsible for mitigating pollution in the Ganga River and its tributaries, "the faceless assessment process" has made matters "more difficult". It has now requested the Central Board of Direct Taxes (CBDT) to allow it to revise

Initially registered as a society on August 12, 2011, under the Societies Registration Act, 1860, the NMCG was later upgraded to an 'authority' on October 7, 2016, under the Environment (Protection) Act, 1986. Despite this transition, its Permanent Account Number (PAN) remained categorised as an Association of Persons (AOP). This led to scrutiny by the I-T department's software, which flagged it as a high-income entity, resulting in repeated tax thority", which was approved by the committee.

notices. The issue was raised in the joint meetings of the NMCG's Audit Review Committee (ARC) and Budget Review Committee (BRC). At the most recent meeting on February 7, NMCG officials highlighted the ongoing tax concerns. "Since NMCG's PAN is in the capacity of 'Association of Persons', NMCG has been receiving a number of notices from IT department every year. While the notices for AY 2023-24 & 2024-25 have been resolved, 2 major demands of AY 2022-23 amounting to Rs 243.74 crore are pending. NMCG has contested the orders and is in the process of filing appeals against the assessment order," stated the minutes of the meeting circulated on March 11."The committee was informed that the NMCG is unable to take the advantage of Section 10 (46) notification under the IT Act, even though NMCG was notified vide notification dated 26 March 2024 as a Government Authority for the AY 2021-22 to 2023-2024, as the Rols for the said years had already been filed. Further, the faceless assessment process has made matters more difficult," it noted. "CBDT has been requested vide application dated 15th January 2025 to permit NMCG to revise its IT returns. An application has also been filed to extend the notification u/s 10 (46) beyond AY 2023-24 on 31 May 2024, followed by a DO from DG- NMCG to CBDT Chairman on 20th January 2025," the minutes of the meeting noted. Two years ago, the NMCG had mulled to amend its PAN after being picked up by the I-T department's scrutiny software as a high-income entity, and getting income tax notices almost every year. In a meeting of the NMCG's ARC and the BRC held in December 2023, the agency's executive director (finance) had proposed to amend its PAN to reflect its status as a "government au-

Govt seeks public opinion on conservation reserve status for Navi Mumbai's DPS Flamingo Lake

Maharashtra's forest department has initiated the process of granting conservation reserve status to the 30-acre DPS Flamingo Lake, with over 1,000 people joining a supportive signature campaign, following concerns that stagnant water in the lake is making it unsuitable for migratory flamingos. A forest department official said, "A report compiling public opinion and the collected signatures will be submitted to the government. The mangrove cell will send its proposal to conserve the wetland as a conservation reserve."The move follows a high-level government committee's recommendation on September 23, 2024, to grant conservation status to the lake. The committee, which included representatives of the City and Industrial Development Corporation and was led by the forest secretary, also directed Cidco to keep water inlet points 3 and 4 open to ensure proper tidal water flow. "Despite these directives, Cidco has not taken action, leaving the water stagnant," said B N Kumar, director of Navi Mumbai-based Natconnect

A recent inspection by the mangrove cell found that blocked pipes continue to prevent water circulation, leading to algae growth over half the lake. The cell has urged Cidco to clear obstructions and restore water flow. "Navi Mumbai



International Airport Limited (NMIAL), in its environmental impact assessment report, committed to protecting biodiversity around the project, a pledge reiterated in compliance reports submitted to the Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change," added Kumar. Public support for the lake's conservation continues to grow. Sandeep Sareen of the Navi Mumbai Environment Preservation Society said more than 1,000 people have signed a petition urging the government to protect the lake. Environmentalists have also approached Forest Minister Ganesh Naik to save the lake. Naik assured that all possible efforts would be made to save the wetland

Karnataka moves to clear land 'encroached on' by Union minister Kumaraswamy

H D Kumaraswamy, indian expressAhead of the court hearing in January, H D Kumaraswamy had accused the Karnataka Congress government of conspiring to "grab" 45 acres of land owned by him near Bidadi in Ramanagara. Union Minister for Steel and Heavy Industries H D Kumaraswamy suffered a setback on Tuesday as Karnataka's revenue department initiated measures to clear land at Kethaganahalli in Ramanagara district that he had allegedly encroached on. The move came a day after the Karnataka High Court expressed strong views over implementing its order to clear the 14 acres of encroachment.

The Ramanagara district administration deployed its staff and earthmovers to clear the encroachment, with Deputy Commissioner Yeshwanth V Gurukar leading the


The state government formed a Special Investigation Team (SIT) to clear the encroachment in January, ahead of the hearing of a contempt petition in the high court moved by the NGO Samaj Parivartana Samudaya on January 29 over the government's failure to recover the land allegedly encroached on by influential people, including Kumaraswamy. The government had given an undertaking in the court to clear encroachment at Kethiganahalli in the district neighbouring Bengaluru.



The case of alleged encroachment by Kumaraswamy and others dates back to 2014, when the Lokayukta sought a report on the land records in Kethiganahalli village. Apart from Kumaraswamy, former Mandya MP G Madegowda, former MLA D C Thammanna—close relative of the JD(S) minister—and an aunt of Kumaraswamy were accused of encroaching on government land valued at Rs 130 crore at

Subsequently, the Lokayukta ordered an investigation by revenue officials and measures to ensure recovery of the land. It had also sought criminal action against those found trespassing on the land, apart from disciplinary measures against officials.

The programme is part of the broader Climate Skill - Seeds for Transition initiative launched by the British Council for five countries: Brazil, Mexico, Indonesia, Vietnam and India. Mumbai University is among three institutions selected in India to implement the programme. It seeks to develop master trainers from the university and its affiliated colleges to extend its impact to a wider community.

According to information from Mumbai University, this programme will be rolled out in stages, with faculty members and representatives from various university departments actively involved. For the first phase, starting on March 22, as many as 25 master trainers and three cofacilitators have been selected by the university to receive training from global experts appointed by the British Council. The first phase will include five-day training with experts appointed by the British Council. Following this, these master trainers are expected to conduct various local activities, including workshops and taking up projects

Apart from professors, students selected for the programme will work alongside local administrations, NGOs, and other stakeholders to launch region-specific climate actions. These may include creating public biodiversity registers, conducting wetland conservation programs, and performing energy audits to promote sustainable development and reduce climate change vulnerabilities in local communities. Dr Aparna Phadke, assistant professor in the geography department and the programme lead at Mumbai University, said, "Our goal is to train trainers who implement similar programmes in their respective institutions. Mumbai University has been actively engaged in initiatives such as biodiversity surveys and wetland conservation, which will serve as expertise for students to bring to local administrations when they collaborate on various projects under this programme."An official from Mumbai University said, "While the British Council had planned to train 130 trainers and 800 students, Mumbai University has expanded the scope by involving 225 professors and 1,200 students. Increased participation is expected to ensure broader engagement."The official added that when these people start working on projects with local administrations, the collaborations will take the discussions to grassroots levels.Dr Phadke emphasised that to ensure the sustainability of these efforts beyond the collaboration with the British Council, the university plans to establish green clubs in its affiliated colleges. These clubs will be managed by master trainers who will be trained through the initiative. Additionally, the university is exploring incorporating these activities into academic credits to encourage greater student participation, she said.

In Himachal Assembly, LoP Jai Ram Thakur raises issue of Bhindranwale flag display in Kullu, urges CM's intervention

Himachal Pradesh Leader of Opposition (LoP) Jai Ram Thakur on Tuesday raised concerns over reports of people entering the state from Punjab with flags that displayed slain Khalistani militant Jarnail Singh Bhindranwale's image. Speaking during the Zero Hour of the ongoing Budget Session in the state Legislative Assembly, Thakur also brought up the recent attack on a Himachal Roadways Transport Corporation (HRTC) bus in Punjab last week.

"It is very unfortunate that people coming from Punjab are carrying Bhindranwale flags in Himachal Pradesh. A recent incident was reported in Kullu. Additionally, an HRTC bus was attacked in Punjab, with the attackers wielding swords. They pasted posters of Bhindranwale and Chief Minister Sukhvinder Singh Sukhu on the bus. Will the CM ensure that he takes up these serious issues with the Punjab Government?"Last Saturday, an altercation broke out after residents in Kullu objected to the display of flags with the image of Bhindranwale on motorcycles driven by people from Punjab. Two residents were injured in the incident. Later, the Kullu district police intervened to ease the tension. Responding to Thakur's statements, Chief Minister Sukhvinder Singh Sukhu assured him that both issues would be taken up with Punjab Chief Minister Bhagwant Mann.Kullu district police, meanwhile, registered two First Information Reports (FIR) against unknown people in the wake of the incident. Thunderstorms predicted for Kolkata, South Bengal in next few days, temperature to drop by 2-4 degrees

The IMD has forecast a partly cloudy sky for Kolkata on Tuesday, with maximum and minimum temperatures likely to hover around 34 and 25 degrees Celsius respectively. South Bengal is gearing up for a period of unsettled weather, with thunderstorms and rain predicted from Thursday to Sunday, bringing relief from recent high temperatures. Meanwhile, residents of Sub-Himalayan West Bengal can expect a prolonged period of dry weather according to the latest forecast.

A noticeable drop in temperature, ranging from 2 to 4 degrees Celsius, is expected across the region. Yesterday, Tuesday, saw a marked decrease in minimum temperatures in parts of Gangetic West Bengal, and an appreciable fall in both Sub-Himalayan and Gangetic regions. Conversely, some areas in Sub-Himalayan West Bengal experienced a slight rise in temperature.

Darjeeling in the hills recorded the lowest minimum temperature at 11.6 degrees Celsius, while Coochbehar in the plains saw a minimum of 15.6 degrees Celsius. Purulia registered the highest maximum temperature of 40.1 degrees Celsius, with Kalimpong (hills) reaching 24.4 degrees



Celsius. Despite the recent light rainfall, which provided temporary relief from the intense heat, the state continues to experience sweltering conditions. Rain, accompanied by local thunderclouds, was reported in Kolkata, Howrah, and Purba Medinipur on Tuesday evening, offering a brief respite from the day's scorching sun. However, the relief is expected to be short-lived, officials said. Some districts in South Bengal have recently experienced temperatures nearing 40 degrees Celsius, earlier prompting heatwave warnings, which have now been lifted.

Delhi HC refuses to stay trial court proceedings against BJP leader Kapil Mishra in 2020 'communal remarks' case

The Delhi High Court Tuesday refused a request by BJP leader and Delhi Law Minister Kapil Mishra to stay the trial proceedings against him in a 2020 case accusing him of promoting communal enmity. Mishra is challenging the dismissal of a revision petition in the case before a sessions court. Mishra's revision petition had challenged the summons issued to him in the 2020 case lodged against him under Section 125 (promoting enmity between classes in connection with election) of the Representation of the People Act. Mishra has been accused of making objectionable statements in the electronic media in 2020 like "Delhi mein chhote chhote Pakistan bane (there are mini-Pakistans in Delhi)" and "Shaheen Bagh mein Pak ki entry (Pakistan has entered Shaheen Bagh)". The case also pertained to a tweet by Mishra that there will be an "India vs Pakistan" contest on the "streets of Delhi" on February 8, the day of the Delhi Assembly elections in 2020. Senior counsel Mahesh Jethmalani requested the high court to stay the trial court proceedings from framing charges against Mishra. Justice Ravinder Dudeja recorded in the order that the court "does not feel the necessity to stay the proceedings of trial court", and made it clear that the "trial court is at liberty to proceed further". While Jethmalani vehemently pressed for a stay, even arguing that Mishra's "reputation will be damaged if charges are framed", while seeking a deferment in the framing of the charges till the high court disposes of his petition, Justice Dudeja refused to accede to the request.Justice Dudeja orally remarked, "...Otherwise you'll go before trial court and say matter is subjudice before the high court and seek adjournment...even if trial court frames the charge, this (petition before the high court) will not become infructuous. Let the proceedings continue... If you get a favourable finding (before the trial court), all proceedings will go... You will not be prejudiced with continuation of

Over 69,000 admissions under RTE Act confirmed in Maharashtra, school union says will take fees from students as Rs 2,400 crore pending from govt

As the deadline for admissions under the Right to Education (RTE) Act in Maharashtra ended on March 10, over 69,000 students have confirmed their enrollment. However, the Maharashtra English School Trustees Association (MESTA), which has over 20,000 member schools, said private schools will have to charge fees for students admitted under the RTE Act as the state government has not paid full dues since 2018.

MESTA president Sanjayrao Tayade Patil said, "Schools across the state have not received complete dues

since 2018. These dues amount to Rs 2,400 crore. Many schools have around 400 RTE students. How are the schools supposed to function without fees? We will request the parents to pay the fees this year, and as soon as the government reimburses us, we will pay the parents back."The Right of Children to Free and Compulsory Education Act or Right to Education Act, 2009, commonly known as the RTE Act, makes education a fundamental right of every child between the ages of 6 and 14. It also requires all private schools to reserve 25 per cent of seats for children from disadvantaged backgrounds. On March 11, the Maharashtra Ministry of School Education and Sports put out a government resolution releasing Rs 200 crore through supplementary demand for disbursement as RTE funds. However, Patil said this amount was insufficient when compared to the claimed dues of Rs 2,400 crore.

The window for confirmation of admission under the regular selection list was from February 17 to March 10, under which 1,01,967 students were selected, and 69,686 students confirmed their admissions. According to a notice released by Director of Primary Education Sharad Gosavi, the admission process under the first selection list was set to begin on March 18.He appealed to parents to check SMS alerts and the RTE website for updates on the application process. Admissions can be confirmed until March 24.

HC upholds Haryana judicial services selection criteria, dismisses plea against appointment of 2 additional sessions judges

The Punjab and Haryana High Court has upheld the selection criteria for Haryana Superior Judicial Services and dismissed a petition challenging the appointment of two successful candidates as additional district and sessions judges. The ruling, delivered by Chief Justice Sheel Nagu and Justice Sumeet Goel, reaffirmed the validity of the minimum qualifying marks requirement and rejected the plea for relaxation of marks. The case revolved around a challenge to the 2015 recruitment process, with the petitioner arguing that Clause 15 of the advertisement—mandating a minimum of 50 per cent aggregate marks for general-category candidates—was unconstitutional and beyond the powers of the high court.

The court, however, held that the requirement was legally valid and aligned with judicial precedents. Citing Supreme Court judgments, it observed that "where the principal statutory provisions and regulatory framework are silent, the High Court, in its administrative authority, can supplement such deficiencies to uphold standards of merit and suitability". It further stated that stipulating a minimum qualifying benchmark ensured that "only persons with prescribed qualities and capacities are selected". On the selection of the two successful candidates, the court found no irregularities or violation of rules. The petitioner had argued that they were appointed despite failing to meet eligibility criteria, thereby vitiating the process. However, the court ruled that the selection was conducted in strict adherence to the prescribed conditions. It noted that both candidates had successfully cleared the written examination and viva voce and that their names were recommended based on

The petitioner further alleged that the two successful candidates had been granted undue relaxation at the final stage, contending that similar grace marks should have been extended to him. The court dismissed this argument, clarifying that the relaxations granted to them were within the framework of the rules and did not compromise the



selection's integrity. "Ex post facto relaxation of selection criteria is impermissible, unless explicitly provided for under the governing rules," the court stated, adding that any deviation from prescribed standards must be applied uniformly and not selectively. The court rejected the petitioner's claim that the selection process was unfair. It noted that he had voluntarily participated in the process and challenged the criteria only after being declared unsuccessful. "A candidate who willingly takes part in a selection process cannot turn around to impugn its conditions after failing," the judgment stated, invoking the doctrine of estoppel. The petitioner had applied for the position in response to an advertisement issued in 2015. The selection process included a written examination, a viva voce conducted in September 2017, and a final result declared in August 2018, with appointments made in December 2018. The petitioner challenged the appointments nearly three years later in 2021. The petitioner had secured 467 marks out of 1,000, falling 33 marks short of the qualifying threshold. He sought grace marks, arguing that similar relaxations were granted to the two successful candidates. The court, however, ruled that no arbitrary relaxation of selection criteria was permissible, as it would violate principles of fairness and transparency. Dismissing the petition, the court upheld the appointment of the two successful candidates while reiterating that judicial selections must maintain high standards to preserve the integrity of the judiciary.

Central Railway boosts revenue through non-fare sources, with advertising contributing more than half

The Central Railway Monday said the Mumbai division's several initiatives to generate revenue through nonfare sources resulted in earnings of Rs 95.16 crore in the current financial year from April 2024 to date. A significant portion of the revenue came from out-of-home (OOH) advertising, which contributed Rs 49.14 crore, as per CR. This includes new advertising spaces at Atal Setu, generating Rs 1.16 crore annually. The rail display network, which includes digital and non-digital advertisements, added Rs 19.93 crore to the revenue. Assets under this category include self-ticketing zones at 22 railway stations, projection mapping technology for advertising and glow ball towers at CSMT and Panvel, along with advertisement rights at the Uran and Dronagiri railways stations, said CR.

Mobile advertising has also played a key role, bringing in Rs 15.54 crore, according to CR. This includes vinyl wrapping on 26 mail/express trains, food tray advertisements on premium trains such as Vande Bharat, Deccan Queen, Tejas Express, and Janshatabdi Express, as well as advertising on the headrests and glass doors of select trains. Other sources of non-fare revenue, contributing Rs 10.40 crore, include relaxation massage chairs at Lokmanya



Tilak Terminus (LTT) and Kalyan, outsourced waiting rooms at various stations, battery-operated carts, and vending of miscellaneous items on trains, said CR.In March 2025, CR secured key revenue-generating contracts, including relaxation massage chair facilities at LTT and Kalyan for Rs 16.46 lakh and Rs 15.34 lakh, respectively. Advertisement deals were finalised for Roha station (Rs 5.55 lakh), Tejas Express (Rs 29.70 lakh), and LED screens at Vikhroli, Chunabhatti, and Tilaknagar stations (Rs 2.01 crore), said CR. According to CR, outsourcing two non-airconditioned waiting rooms at the Thane railway station added Rs 1.81 crore.

Rights petitions against Adani Green Energy projects in Sri Lanka withdrawn

Colombo: Five fundamental rights petitions filed against the Adani Green Energy projects in the northeastern region of Sri Lanka have been withdrawn by the petitioners. The withdrawal comes after the Attorney General filed a motion following Adani Green Energy's notification to the Board of Investment about its decision to cancel its wind energy projects. Last month, the Indian conglomerate announced its withdrawal from further engagement in the renewable wind energy project in Mannar and Pooneryn. Fundamental rights petitions were filed in 2024 after the previous cabinet approved the project in May last year. The petitions pointed to the project's environmental hazards and the lack of transparency. The Adani Group left the project after the new Sri Lankan government led by President Anura Kumar Dissanayake decided late in December to review the project



and renegotiate the power purchase agreement. The previous government-negotiated price of eight cents was considered too high, with the government aiming to bring it be-

'Nagpur violence pre-planned... selected houses, establishments targeted': Maharashtra CM Fadnavis

Maharashtra Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis said Tuesday the violence in Nagpur, which broke out Monday over rumours that a holy book had been desecrated during a protest seeking the removal of Mughal emperor Aurangzeb's tomb, seemed like a "planned incident". On Monday, more than 200 members of the Vishwa Hindu Parishad (VHP) and the Bajrang Dal held a protest near the Shivaji Maharaj statue in the city, demanding the removal of Aurangzeb's tomb. The protesters allegedly burnt an effigy of the Mughal emperor but the incident sparked rumours of a holy book being desecrated. Four policemen were injured and several vehicles were torched as the violence broke out.

A group of 80-100 people allegedly gathered as the rumour spread on social media, and pelted stones at police personnel. The Nagpur police said they fired tear gas shells and resorted to a lathi charge to disperse a mob in Chitnis Park and Mahal even as violence spread to Kotwali and Ganeshpeth. While speaking in the Maharashtra Assembly, Fadnavis, who also holds the home portfolio, said, "After the morning incident, there was silence. By evening, some people attacked in a pre-planned manner. We found a trolley full of stones and weapons were also found which had been seized. Selected houses and establishments were

"This seems a planned incident. No one will be spared. Those who attacked police will not be spared at any cost. It will not be tolerated. The police were trying to maintain peace," he said. The chief minister also appealed to people to maintain restrain. "This is a period when festivals of all religions are ongoing. Everyone must keep patience and respect others," he said. Fadnavis said the film Chhaava, based on the life of the son of Shivaji Maharaj, brought the real history of Chhatrapati Sambhaji Maharaj. "But the emotions of people are overflowing and they are showing anger against Aurangzeb. Despite this, we must show restraint. Maharashtra is getting investment, and we will get it if we manage to keep law and order. I warn everyone that anyone who will disturb the law and order will not be spared," he added.

The Maharashtra CM talked about how the Nagpur violence unfolded. He said at 11.30 am Monday, VHP and Bajrang Dal workers protested in the Mahal area in Nagpur, demanding the removal of the tomb of Aurangazeb, and burnt a replica of the tomb. "By evening, a rumour spread that the tomb had a sheet with religious text. A mob of 200-300 became aggressive and shouted slogans," he said. "Before that, those who wanted to file a case against the Bajrang Dal were called to Ganeshpeth police station. While the police action was on, around 200-300 people started stone pelting with lathis and a dozen two-wheelers were damaged and some people were attacked," he said. In the third incident, a mob of 80-100 attacked the police in the Bhaldalpura area, and more vehicles were damaged. "In this incident, 33 policemen were injured which includes 3 DCP rank officers and one of them was attacked with an axe. Around 5 citizens injured, and one of them is in ICU," he added. According to Fadnavis, three cases have been filed at the Ganeshpeth Police Station, and two at the Tehsil Police Station. Meanwhile, a curfew was imposed in several parts of Nagpur — under the jurisdiction of Kotwali, Ganeshpet, Tehsil, Lakadganj, Pachpavli, Shantinagar, Sakkardara, Nandanvan, Imamwada, Yashodharanagar, and Kapilnagar police stations — after the violence broke

How a landscape architect's firm grew to be among country's top brands for all things gardening

Siddhant Bhalinge sits in an office against a background of the bone-dry slopes of the tekdi and grey high-rises under construction. His office is more vibrant, with a scattering of plants in pots, including a peace lily at his table. Nine years ago, Bhalinge had defied sceptics by setting up an online store to supply "everything related to gardening". 'Ugaoo' was born and has become one of India's top portals for various categories pertaining to plant lifestyle, from planters to fertilizers to seeds to garden tools. Today, it is present in 16 cities and, through quick commerce alone, sells 5,000 plants every day. "Right now, the gardening market in India is close to \$9 billion (approximately Rs 78,000 crore), of which the landscaping business that comprises public infra, huge developments and gardens make up \$5 billion (approx Rs 43,334 crore). The gardening market, where people are actually buying plants, fertilizers, machinery and garden tools, among others makes up \$4 billion (approx Rs 34,667 crore)," Bhalinge says.

"This financial year, Ugaoo will close at close to Rs 100 crore. We see our sales growing about 40 to 50 per cent year on year. So, our plan over the next five years is to cross the Rs 500-crore mark as there is a huge market that is yet to be organised," the founder-CEO adds. A few days ago, Ugaoo opened a 5,000 sq ft store in Koregaon Park, a testimony to how far the company has travelled and how much more it aims to cover.

Bhalinge comes from a family that created one of India's oldest vegetable seed companies, the 140-year-old Namdeo Umaji Agritech India, which - with its 200 nationwide distributors - reaches a market that mostly comprises rural and commercial farmers. "I was always at the farm and was exposed to new technologies in seeds. My father had introduced hybrid papaya and hybrid chili to India," says Bhalinge. He went to the US to study landscape architecture and "that's where I learned the value that plants had to people's lives". Bhalinge loved design and could understand plants well. So, when he returned to India, it hit him how the industry was disappointing in terms of specialised gardening stores. "Many people were going to agriculture stores and buying jugadu products. It was very unorganised. I also felt that the way the plants were presented could be better. In the West, I had seen big box stores that made it easier for people to adopt plants and select the right kind of plant. I saw that, in India, an experience had to be built," he says. Though the company launched in December 2015, it spent the first three years educating consumers on the right kind of indoor plants, where to keep them, which were the



low-light plants, which were semi-shade plants and which flowering plants could be grown inside, rather than focus on sales. As trust built, the company noticed that millennials had begun to buy plants from them, though, today, the older generation also makes up the customer base.

"We are now building the new-age consumer or the next generation of consumers who prefer buying plants online for the sake of convenience. I also feel the local nursery does not give them adequate knowledge and quality is not consistent," he says. Ugaoo's ethos is to use science and present a finished product. The company has a 25acre nursery in Talegaon, where they grow almost 2 lakh plants a month. But customer enquiries are coming in for more than plants. "We have launched a garden machinery segment as well at our new store. We have lawnmowers, chain saws and so on. It was for this reason that we needed a larger space and Koregaon Park was ideal. We are planning to hold a lot of workshops, at least one every week. We are going to have these plant swaps and gardening meetups. The entire third floor is reserved for events and anything related to plants," he says.

A new challenge has come in with rising temperatures. Bhalinge points out that it is difficult to believe that we are only in March. Climate change has impacted consumer behaviour as well, especially in the north, where people stop buying indoor plants because they fear these will perish in the heat. But more people want knowledge about living with plants. "Wherever construction is happening and new flats or offices are coming up, that is where we do well.

The five-member panel, which has the support of rebel Akali leaders, had gathered at the Akal Takht Sahib on Tuesday to launch its membership drive. "You have been here today as part of the committee that was formed by the Sri Akal Takht Sahib on December 2. You have been invited for tea at the secretariat of Sri Akal Takht Sahib by Singh Sahib Giani Kuldeep Singh Gargaj. There, Singh Sahib will discuss the ongoing issues with you. Therefore, you are supposed to meet Jathedar Sahib before leaving," reads the letter from the Akal Takht

On December 2 last year, the Sri Akal Takht Sahib had ordered a religious sentence for Sukhbir Singh Badal and other senior Akali leaders for the alleged mistakes committed by the SAD government between 2007 and 2017. A seven-member committee was also formed to reorganise the Akali Dal by initiating a membership drive and making arrangements for the election of its top leadership within six months. Later, two of the panel members resigned. The

SAD had refused to cooperate with the panel citing legal issues. After the Shiromani Gurdwara Parbhandak Committee (SGPC) removed all three jathedars - Giani Raghbir Singh, Giani Harpreet Singh and Giani Sultan Singh - who had formed the committee from their respective posts, there had been no communication between the Sri Akal Takht Sahib and the five-member panel. It was also alleged that the new Akal Takht Sahib acting Jathedar Gargaj would sabotage the panel. Hence, his invitation to the panel comes as a surprise to many. The letters were delivered to the panel members when they reached the Akal Takht Sahib for prayers before starting the membership drive. Harjinder Dhami to resume duties as SGPC chiefMeanwhile, a day after the SGPC rejected his resignation as president of the apex gurdwara body, Harjinder Singh Dhami announced Tuesday that he will be resuming his duties. "I have been requested to join back. I take it as an order from the community and will join the SGPC as president in the coming days," he said. Farmers Harmanpreet Singh Jhand from Taragarh village in Amritsar and Gursimran Singh from Hathoa village in Malerkotla have redefined the concept of diversification farming with exotic fruit — avocado. Jhand, who farms on leased land returned to India from East African countries before the pandemic and successfully adapted avocado cultivation to the soils of Punjab.

After completing his Bachelor of Science, he left India in 2010 to explore farming opportunities in Ethiopia, and later in Kenya and Rwanda. "In Africa, I soon became involved in avocado farming and saw the potential and began farming on leased land there," he says adding that over time, he expanded his avocado farming efforts across other African nations."I sent a few seeds from my African farms to my brother in Punjab, who planted them in our nursery. Those two trees, now over 10 years old, produce around 80 kg of fruit each annually. When I returned to Punjab before the pandemic, I couldn't go back to Africa for some time, so I decided to focus on our family nursery here. I knew avocados could be grown here, especially in Puniab," he says, adding that his faith in the crop's adaptability was reinforced by his first successful experiment with avocados, with his two trees serving as proof of the fruit's ability to survive here. He says the crop requires cool weather and thrive best in places such as Himachal Pradesh, but with the right care, they can be grown here as well.

By 2019, he expanded his nursery to include 4-5 varieties of avocado, which he later increased to 10 varieties, with several of them performing exceptionally well. He now produces nearly 10,000 avocado plants annually. Majority of these are sold to farmers in Himachal, while the rest are sold in Punjab. The plants range between Rs 500 and Rs 1,500. "I also use hybrid plants through grafting. We use seeds from our own trees as well as seeds from Africa. The hybrid plants we create through grafting can start producing fruit in 3-4 years, unlike the local varieties," he says. He adds that one acre can accommodate about 150 plants, and each tree, once mature, yields about 80 kg fruit annually. "The price per kilogram varies between Rs 500 to Rs. 1,200, so a single tree can generate between Rs 40,000 to Rs 96,000 in revenue," he says, adding that he also grows 60 different varieties of mangoes, blueberries, apples, flowers, and various vegetables in his nurseries.

Like Jhand, Gursimran Singh has conducted trials with avocados and other exotic fruits on half an acre for nearly a decade. He now grows avacado, logan and pecan at his Dhanoa Natural Farm and Nursery. His journey into exotic fruit farming began in 2014 when he first experimented with avocado cultivation after getting the idea from his cousins, who were settled in the US and were visiting Punjab. "They asked me for avacado fruit but it was not available in our village. So I started growing it here. The initial years were full of challenges. In the beginning, my plants would often get destroyed, especially when I procured them from South India. The varieties weren't ideal for our environment," he says.

In 2019, he planted 50 avocado trees of which 35 survived. Over the next few years, the trees began to bear fruit, with each tree now producing 10-12 kg fruits annually. "I plan to increase my avocado farm from half an acre to four acres in the upcoming plantation season in July as plants are being prepared at my own nursery," he says, adding that they own 12 acres, but he kept 4 acres for his experiments, and the remaining 8 acres are leased to other farmers. He also runs a company called Naturepath Plantation Pvt Limited, which helps other farmers set up their own orchards. "I have helped set up avocado orchards in places such as Patiala, Amritsar, and Nawanshahr. My goal is to empower other farmers to grow exotic fruits, which require much less water than traditional crops and are increasingly popular among health-conscious consumers, while providing good returns for the farmers," he says, adding that his firm charges Rs 2.50 lakh to set up an avocado orchard on one acre, which includes plants and all the necessary technical know-how.

Gursimran believes that exotic fruits have enormous potential in all over world including Punjab, especially since they require 75% to 80% less water compared to traditional crops. "Fruits are an ideal choice for a state facing water scarcity," he says. He also grows local crops such as Sona Moti wheat, which he sells at Rs 9,000 per quintal, against the MSP of Rs 2,425 per quintal, as well as mustard and vegetables. Through his nursery, he grows and sells around 40-50 varieties of both local and exotic fruits, catering to local farmers who want to experiment with new crops.

Out of a total of 2.77 lakh residents of the constituency, 2.46 lakh were surveyed.Of the 1.38 lakh unemployed people, according to the pilot exercise, 64% are women. Around 39.5% of the unemployed were actively seeking employment, and among them, 60% were women, the data showed.

This pilot data showed that women's participation in the workforce was low despite their attempts to get employed.Incidentally, 68% of those who were surveyed said they need "skill training". The top professions that job seekers were aiming for were tailor, computer operator, computer programmer, software engineer and administrative official, the data revealed.

In Chandigarh Municipal Corporation's drive against use of plastic, 165 issued challans

The Chandigarh Municipal Corporation conducted special drives across the city on Saturday against the use of plastic carry bags, improper waste segregation, and littering in public places. A total of 165 violators were issued challans during the operation. With Swachh Survekshan 2025 assessment approaching, MC Commissioner Amit Kumar, deployed multiple teams from the sanitation department to enforce waste management regulations. The teams, led by chief sanitation inspectors, carried out inspections in various markets and found numerous shopkeepers violating Municipal Solid Waste (MSW) rules by using and storing banned plastic bags. The officials issued challans to the offenders and warned them of stricter action in case of repeat violations.

As per MC officials, in total, 43 challans were issued for selling or using plastic carry bags, 68 challans for sanitation violations and littering in public places, 52 challans for improper segregation of waste, and one challan each for C and D (Construction and Demolition) waste and horti-



culture waste. Fines ranged from Rs 500 to Rs 20,000, depending on the severity of the violation. Commissioner Amit Kumar said an innovative approach wasused by MCC teams to track violators. Officials retrieved proofs like payment slips or personal documents from garbage dumps to identify offenders. Using this method, they traced and penalized 12 individuals who had dumped waste in public places.

Revolutionary songs at Kerala temple festival stir row, devaswom board calls for probe

The TDB on Saturday sought a report from the festival organising committee of the Devi Temple at Kadakkal in Kollam district and asked for a vigilance probe into the incident, which took place on March 10.TDB president P S Prasanth said, "We have sought a report from the temple about the circumstances under which songs associated with a political organisation were sung at the temple festival. The High Court had earlier given a clear direction to the board to ensure that no symbols or flags of political parties are displayed at temple premises. If there are lapses, action will be taken against those concerned."

The incident took place during the annual temple festival. During the festival, singer Aloshi Adam sang songs that are popularly sung during events of the CPI(M) and DYFI. While Aloshi was singing the songs, an LED screen behind him showed the flag and symbol of the DYFI, which irked a



section of the audience. Aloshi and temple festival organising committee's secretary, Rahul, said the songs were sung on demand from the audience. "The local traders body was the sponsor of the musical programme. During any such event, the audience will demand their favourite songs. We will oblige to their demands," he said.

The incident led to protest from the Congress, with Opposition Leader V D Satheesan saying, "It has to be suspected that the CPI(M) and DYFI wanted to foment trouble at the temple and make way for the BJP. The temple is not the place for singing revolutionary songs. Power has made the party arrogant."In the last month, Kannur district has witnessed two incidents of clashes between the CPI(M) and the BJP during temple festivals in the politically sensitive Thalassery region.

In virtual meet, Abhishek chalks out TMC plan: Panels at each level, training camps

Trinamool Congress (TMC) national general secretary Abhishek Banerjee on Saturday said that the party would form district-level core committees within the next five days to focus on scrutiny of the voters' list in the state as part of its efforts to weed out "fake voters". Additionally, block-level, ward-level, and panchayat-level committees will also be formed by April 3. Abhishek, who is considered number two in the TMC, made this declaration during a virtual meeting with over 4,500 party leaders. The Diamond Harbour MP said that a zila committee will be formed within the next five days to oversee the voter inspection process. A block committee will be formed from March 21-27, and from March 28 to April 3, anchal and ward committee will be formed for the inspection process. From April 16, the verification process will begin in every block of the state, he said. Banerjee also informed that new district to block-level president names will be announced soon, with selections based on performance. Abhishek also informed that I-PAC will assist the party to identify fake voters in the list and to ensure that the process is carried out effectively, all committees will undergo training. "Training camps will be organised once all committees will be formed," he said. IPAC is the political consultancy firm employed by TMC in the 2021 assembly polls and later. Addressing concerns about extortion attempts the TMC leader said, "We have noticed many people trying to extort money in the name of I-PAC or from the office of Abhishek Banerjee. We filed police complaint against those persons. A phone number has been shared to report if anyone tries to claim from I-PAC and dupe leaders." "If anyone comes with an I-PAC identity, verify his or her identity with the district president or our office," said BanerjeeHe also called upon party leaders to focus on Assembly seats where the TMC did not perform as expected in the 2024 Lok Sabha election. During the virtual meeting, Banerjee described how BJP planned to insert fake names in the voters list in Maharashtra and Delhi to win the Assembly elections. He cited examples on "how 39 lakh voters were added in four months to win Maharashtra elections."The All India Trinamool Congress later on X announced, "On 27th February, Smt. @MamataOfficial ex-



posed the ECI's fake voter scam, revealing a grave threat to free and fair elections. Today, our Nat'l GS, Shri @abhishekaitc, and State President, Shri Subrata Bakshi, convened a key virtual party meeting to address this issue and chart the next course of action. We stand firm against electoral malpractice—democracy cannot be compromised!"Last month, Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee had accused the BJP of adding fake voters from other states to the electoral rolls with the alleged backing of the Election Commission (EC), claiming that the party had used similar tactics to secure victories in the Delhi and Maharashtra Assembly elections. She also made a statement that a core committee to see such complaints of fake voters. Following which, the core committee had a meeting on March 6 where Abhishek Baneriee was not present. After the meeting, TMC state president Subrata Bakshi announced that Abhishek will hold a meeting on March 15 and address the issue of fake voters. A man who opened an attack on devotees at the Golden temple premises, leaving five of them injured, had arrived in Amritsar from Yamunanagar in Haryana three days ago following a dispute with his family, Punjab Police Saturday said. Police identified the accused as Zulfaan. He was accompanied by another person. Wielding an iron rod, Zulfaan had went on a rampage at the Golden Temple Friday, injuring two sevadars and three devotees. The condition of one injured, from Bathinda, was reported as serious. He is admitted to the emergency wing of the Sri Guru Ram Das Institute of Medical Sciences & Research at Vallah

"The second accused allegedly conducted recce along with the attacker," said a police officer. Amritsar Police Commissioner Gurpreet Bhullar said they are interrogating the accused to gather information on when and how he planned the attack. The iron rod used in the attack was taken from a construction site near the lodging.Bhullar said that the accused had left his home in Haryana after a dispute three days ago. His brother told the police that they had no contact with Zulfaan since then. As the accused entered the Guru Ram Das inn, he was stopped by sevadar Jasbir Singh. Zulfaan, however, hit the sevadar on the head with the rod. On hearinh his scream, others rushed to restrain the attacker, who attacked them with the rod. All the injured individuals were immediately admitted to the Sri Guru Ramdas Hospital. Condemning the attack. SGPC described it as part of a larger conspiracy. "SGPC has urged the police administration to take immediate and stringent action against the culprits and to disclose their identities to the public," said Partap Singh.

UP BJP district president polls go online, party to take livestream, WhatsApp route

The BJP will declare new district presidents for Uttar Pradesh online, on Sunday, with the state headquarters announcing its decision through live streaming and coordinated WhatsApp groups.

A task centre has been set up at party state headguarters in Lucknow where state president Bhupendra Chaudhary, general secretary (organisation) Dharampal Singh and state election officer Mahendra Nath Pandey will monitor the announcement process. The Information Technology (IT) cell of the party has been assigned the task for making arrangements for the online monitoring in every district. It will be the first time that the party will be announcing district presidents online. In the past, the names of district presidents and other posts was announced only through a press-release for the media. This was followed up with a written communication to the office bearers concerned. To streamline the announcement on Sunday, a meeting has been convened at 2 pm in every district office where election observers, district election officer, senior office bearers of different wings, local MLAs, MPs and the ministers will be present.

During these meetings, the district election officer will receive a message on WhatsApp from the party headquarters informing the name of the new district president. The district election officer will then proceed to announce the name of the new president who will be welcomed by the other office bearers. The BJP in UP has 98 organisational districts. On Sunday, presidents for 87 of these districts are expected to be announced. The election of the 11 remaining districts is yet to be completed. Sources said that among the district presidents, nearly 50% positions will be filled by OBCs, SCs/STs and women.

"This representation will be done to counter the Samajwadi Party (SP)'s slogan of PDA (Pichhda, dalit, and alpsankhyak) in view of 2027 UP assembly polls," said another party leader.BJP sources said that the party is expecting protests and demonstrations from miffed candidates. "In the past, 10 to 20 nominations were filed for each organisational election. This time, at least 50 nominations have been filed in at least in every district. 58 nominations have been filed in Etawah, and 51 in Meerut, for example. As per the ongoing organisational elections in the party, booth presidents were elected first, followed by election of the mandal president. Following the election of the district president Sunday will set the ball rolling for the election of the state president.

Former Union Minister and UP BJP organisation election officer Mahendra Nath Pandey told The Indian Express: "This is sanghathan parv (festival of organisational polls) of the party. Party leadership has decided that results of district elections will be announced in the district concerned. Meetings will start at 2 pm and an announcement (of district president) will be made soon after that. Monitoring will be done to check that the programme is being held properly."

In Lebanon, Israeli strikes point to a precarious ceasefire



BEIRUT, GNS News Agency, March 20, As Israel resumes heavy strikes in the Gaza Strip, escalating Israeli attacks in south Lebanon have killed five Hezbollah members in the last few days, according to security sources in Lebanon, underlining the fragility of a U.S.-backed ceasefire. The war between Israel and the Iran-backed Hezbollah in Lebanon marked the deadliest spillover of the Gaza war, rumbling across the frontier for months before escalating into a devastating Israeli offensive that wiped out the group's command and many of its fighters, along with much of its arsenal.

While the ceasefire brought about a big reduction in the violence, each side accuses the other of failing to fully implement it. Israel says Hezbollah still has infrastructure in the south while Lebanon and Hezbollah say Israel is occupying Lebanese soil by not withdrawing from five hilltop positions. The Israeli military has reported striking five

Hezbollah members in three separate incidents in south Lebanon since March 15. In one of the incidents on Sunday, the Israeli military said it struck two Hezbollah militants "who served as observation operatives and directed terrorist activities". Security sources in Lebanon said five Hezbollah members were killed. The Israeli military said on Sunday that a gunshot hit a parked car in the Israeli community of Avivim, and that the shot most likely came from Lebanon. No one claimed responsibility. In Lebanon, Israeli strikes in two towns on Monday destroyed prefabricated houses brought to the area for people whose homes were destroyed in the war, security sources said.

The U.S.-backed ceasefire agreed in November required Hezbollah to have no weapons in the south and Israeli troops to withdraw as the U.S.-backed Lebanese army deployed into the region. Israel said earlier this month it had agreed to U.S.-backed talks with Lebanon aimed at demarcating the border. It also released five Lebanese held by the Israeli military in what it called a "gesture to the Lebanese president". Hezbollah officials have put the onus on the Lebanese state to liberate the remaining land still occupied by Israel. Still, leading Hezbollah official Ali Damoush said on Friday the group would not give up its arms while there is an occupation. Analysts say Hezbollah will have to think very hard before taking any decision to escalate against Israel, noting that its overland resupply route to Iran was severed by the fall of its ally Bashar al-Assad in Syria and that many of its supporters are homeless because of the devastation caused by the war. "So far, Hezbollah is keen not to respond and to leave the decision to the government and the Lebanese army," said Qassem Kassir, a Lebanese analyst close to Hezbollah.

Israeli strikes kill over 400 in Gaza, say Palestinians, ceasefire on brink

JERUSALEM/CAIRO, Israeli airstrikes pounded Gaza, killing more than 400 people, Palestinian health authorities said on Tuesday, threatening the complete collapse of a two-month ceasefire as Israel vowed to use more force to free hostages held by Hamas. The Palestinian militant group, which still holds 59 of the 250 or so hostages seized in its October 7, 2023 attack on Israel, accused Israel of breaching the ceasefire and jeopardising efforts by mediators to secure a permanent truce.

Sign up here.lsrael's prime minister, Benjamin Netanyahu, said he had told the military to take "strong action" against Hamas in response to the group's refusal to release the remaining hostages and because of their rejection of ceasefire proposals.

The Israeli military described the attacks as a "preemptive offensive" aimed at thwarting Hamas' ability to launch attacks against Israel and to rebuild and rearm its forces. It said it targeted "mid-ranking military commanders, leadership officials and terrorist infrastructure" belonging to Hamas. The airstrikes also hit homes and tent encampments housing civilians from the north to south of the Gaza Strip and Israeli tanks shelled across the border line into the enclave, witnesses said.

"It was a night of hell. It felt like the first days of the war," said Rabiha Jamal, 65, a mother of five from Gaza City."We were preparing to have something to eat before starting a new day of fasting when the building shook and explosions began. We thought it was over but war is back," she told Reuters via a chat app.Netanyahu has vowed to eradicate his old foe Hamas. While the group has been weakened with relentless Israeli bombardment and ground offensives, it is still the dominant force in Gaza. Among those killed in airstrikes on their homes were Essam Addalees, the de facto head of the Hamas government, Ahmed Al-Hetta, deputy justice minister and Mahmoud Abu Watfa, the deputy minister of interior and head of the Hamas-run security services, Hamas said.

Egypt, one of the mediators in the ceasefire deal agreed in January, called for restraint and urged all parties to work towards a lasting agreement. Israel's intense pressure on Hamas came as tensions flared elsewhere in the Middle East, which has seen the Gaza war spread to Lebanon, Yemen and Iraq. Israeli media said Israel was opening shelters in multiple areas in commercial hub Tel Aviv to prepare for possible retaliation from Hamas or Yemen.

The airstrikes earned Netanyahu a political boost. Former National Security Minister Itamar Ben-Gvir, who left the government over disagreements about the Gaza ceasefire, is rejoining the coalition after the resumption of Israeli strikes, a statement said, strengthening Netanyahu's government. The Gaza attacks were far wider in scale than the regular drone strikes Israel has said it has conducted recently against suspected militants, and follow weeks of failed efforts to agree an extension to the truce agreed on January 19.

Witnesses in Gaza contacted by Reuters said Israeli tanks shelled areas in Rafah in the southern Gaza Strip. Bewildered children sat next to bagged-up belongings, ready to flee north again having returned to Rafah with the ceasefire. In hospitals strained by 15 months of bombardment, piles of bodies in white plastic sheets smeared with blood were stacked up as casualties were brought in. Gaza's Hamas-run health ministry said 404 people had been killed in one of the biggest single-day tolls since the war erupted. The health ministry said many of the dead were children, and 562 people were injured. Israel has halted aid deliveries into Gaza for over two weeks, exacerbating a humanitarian crisis. The Israeli military said its attacks would extend beyond airstrikes, raising the prospect that Israeli ground



troops could resume fighting. As Israel launched its operation in Gaza, its forces have pressed on with an operation in the occupied West Bank which the military says is aimed at Iranian-backed militant groups in long-standing refugee camps. Israeli jets have also struck targets in southern Lebanon and Syria in recent days as the military builds on gains it made during months of fighting against the Iranian-backed Hezbollah and during the collapse of the former Syrian regime.

Negotiating teams from Israel and Hamas had been in Doha as mediators from Egypt and Qatar sought to bridge the gap between the two sides after the end of an initial phase in the ceasefire, which saw 33 Israeli hostages and five Thais released in exchange for some 2,000 Palestinian prisoners. With the backing of the United States, Israel had been pressing for the return of the remaining hostages in exchange for a longer-term truce until after the Muslim fasting month of Ramadan and the Jewish Passover holiday in April. However, Hamas has insisted on moving to negotiations for a permanent end to the war and a full withdrawal of Israeli forces, under the terms of the original ceasefire agreement

On Tuesday, Hamas spokesperson Abdel-Latif Al-Qanoua told Reuters communication with mediators was ongoing, and the group was keen to complete the implementation of the original Gaza ceasefire deal. Egyptian mediators said they were surprised by the overnight airstrikes as negotiations a day earlier had been calm and they had not been notified, two Egyptian security sources said. They are now engaged in intense contacts to salvage the ceasefire and return to talks, they said.

Much of Gaza now lies in ruins after the war, which erupted on October 7, 2023 when Hamas-led gunmen attacked Israel, killing some 1,200 people, according to Israeli tallies, and abducting 251 hostages into Gaza. The Israeli campaign in Gaza has killed more than 48,000 people, according to Palestinian health authorities, and destroyed much of the housing and infrastructure in the enclave, including the hospital system. Surfers fall sick as strange foam, dead fish wash ashore 2 Australian beaches

Melbourne: An Australian State closed two beaches after dead fish and an unusual off-white foam washed ashore while surfers reported feeling unwell, officials said on Tuesday. A microalgal bloom created by unusual weather conditions was suspected to have sickened humans and marine life as well as creating the foam that has covered hundreds of metres (yards) of coastline, South Australian Environment Protection Authority principal scientific officer Sam Gaylard said. "It is very concerning," Gaylard told Australian Broadcasting Corp. "It is unusual at this scale. At this time of year, when the weather conditions allow, we do occasionally get isolated blooms, but something of this scale is definitely a little bit unusual," Gaylard added. Waitpinga Beach and neighbouring Parsons Beach, both south of the South Australia state capital Adelaide, have been closed to the public since Monday in response to a "fish mortality

event in the area", the Department for Environment and Water said in a statement. "The beaches will be re-opened as soon as possible," the department said. Dozens of dead fish have reportedly been washed shore. Surfers have been complaining since the weekend of getting sore eyes, sore throats and coughing after contact with the water, said local Anthony Rowland, who surfed at Waitpinga on Saturday. "While we were out there, we started coughing," Rowland said, referring to his surfing comrads. He said he was overwhelmed by the response from other surfers after posting his experience online. "Lots of people reached out — so many people have said they're had exactly the same symptoms," Rowland said. Marine scientists took water samples from the foam, which is a byproduct of the toxic organisms' decay,

Parents of missing Sudiksha Konanki want her to be declared dead

New York: The family of missing 20-year-old Indian student Sudiksha Konanki has asked police in the Dominican Republic to declare her dead, according to US media reports. Konanki, a citizen of India and a permanent resident of the United States, was last seen on March 6 at the Riu Republic Resort in Punta Cana town. She has gone missing while on vacation in the Dominican Republic and US federal law enforcement agencies are working with authorities in the Caribbean country in the probe into her disappearance. Despite an extensive search, her body has not been found

Dominican Republic National Police spokesperson Diego Pesqueira said Konanki's family has sent the agency a letter requesting a declaration of death. The Konanki family did not immediately respond to a request for comment. Meanwhile, authorities in the Dominican Republic have confiscated the passport of the man who is the last person known to have been with Konanki, according to a source close to the investigation. Dominican Republic Attorney General Yeni Berenice Reynoso interviewed Joshua Steven Riibe, over the weekend for more than six hours and the questioning is expected to continue with a local prosecutor, the source said. Riibe is not considered a suspect in the case and has not been accused of wrongdoing. It's unclear why Riibe's passport was confiscated. Since Konanki went missing in the early hours of March 6, Riibe, a 22-

year-old from Rock Rapids, Iowa, and a senior at St Cloud State University in Minnesota, has remained under police surveillance in the Dominican Republic.

He has been taken to the police station for interrogation multiple times, his parents said in a statement. The Konanki family sent a formal letter to authorities, acknowledging there is no suspected foul play involved in Konanki's presumed death after she vanished from a Punta Cana beach in the early hours of March 6. The father and mother also wrote they trust the authorities' probe into the case and noted Riibe, the last person to see the young woman alive, has cooperated with investigators, sources said. Konanki's parents in the same letter said that they understand that certain legal procedures must be followed for their request, but that they are prepared to comply with any necessary formalities or documentation. Konanki, described by her father as an "ambitious" student who planned to study medicine, arrived in Punta Cana on March 3. She travelled with five other female students from the University of Pittsburgh, according to the Loudon County Sheriff's Office. Riibe said he first met Konanki in the hotel when he and his friend introduced themselves to her group. The two friend groups went together to the bar, where they drank until "someone suggested we go to the beach," Riibe said in his interview. In the early hours of March 6, she was seen on surveillance footage drinking with five women and two men in the Riu República Hotel bar. In the video, Konanki is seen wearing a white cover-up as she hugs and talks with her friends. Riibe is seen several feet away, bent over and stumbling

Then, at 4.15 am, a surveillance camera captured the group, including Konanki, entering the beach, police said. Just before 5 am, surveillance footage shows five women and one man leaving the beach. Konanki was not among them. During his fourth interview with prosecutors, Riibe described a harrowing attempt to save Konanki after they were jostled by the wave and she got tired of swimming. Authorities in the Dominican Republic have said no one is considered a suspect in Konanki's disappearance. US authorities have said it is a missing persons case and not a criminal matter.

World War II: Women spies who tricked Nazis

Oxford: If spy films have taught us anything, it's that the people chosen for a career in espionage are special. They are the cream of the crop selected because they exhibit unique skills: high levels of intelligence and certain emotional traits that made them perfect for spying. During the World War-II, the Special Operations Executive (SOE) was a British agency tasked with training spies to conduct espionage, sabotage and reconnaissance in German-occupied Europe and east Asia.

Active from 1940 to 1946, SOE was a pioneering British secret service. This is because it employed civilians, from all backgrounds, including women, which was unusual at a time where most spies were recruited from the army. The women hired by the agency were the only ones allowed to take on a combatant role by the British Army during the Second World War. However, many have been unjustly forgotten. These women were active throughout Nazi-occupied Europe, but most women worked in France. They were not French, but French speakers who tried to pass for local. On paper, this might seem impossible, since being fluent in a language does not make you a spy. SOE recruited prospective agents on the basis of their language skills, and trained most of them in England before sending them into the field. Despite their lack of experience, many SOE women successfully duped German soldiers. Here are some of the simple but effective ways they managed such deception. Emotional control First, women spies sometimes fooled people simply by appearing calm. Irish agent Maureen Patricia "Paddy" O'Sullivan had grown-up in Belgium and was renowned for her daring personality.

In a post-war interview, she described how she avoided a thorough search while carrying compromising documents. O'Sullivan acted confident and friendly to divert the soldier's attention from her bag. As she laughed and joked with the German, he was distracted from making a closer examination. The spies' cool was frequently praised in post-war commendations.

commendations.

Remaining calm was no mean feat, especially since most SOE recruits had never worked undercover. In France, they could be questioned by Nazis at any time and nervousness made them look suspicious. Agent Yvonne Cormeau joined SOE after losing her husband during a bombing at the beginning of the war. In a 1989 interview, she summarised the situation perfectly: "We learned to live with fear." Physical appearance SOE spies did alter their

appearance in order not to be recognised, but for most, this

merely involved picking clothes which matched their

cover. Yvonne Cormeau was sent to a farm in southern France, where the pro-Allied owners gave her new clothes and an apron. She was supposed to pass as their assistant and needed to look like one. A few agents went a step further and dyed their hair. This was the case of Noor Inayat Khan (code name Madeleine), a Sufi Muslim of royal lineage born to Indian and American parents. Betrayed to the Germans, she was executed at Dachau concentration camp in 1944. Inayat Khan's contribution to SOE proved invaluable. For several months in 1943, she was the sole radio operator still active in Paris amid the growing Gestapo presence. However, her constant hair dyeing was less effective. To try and escape the notice of the Gestapo, she regularly bleached her hair blonde, but this actually brought

They questioned Alfred and Emilie Balachowsky, her contacts who lived near Paris and led a local resistance network, about the presence of a woman "sometimes blonde and sometimes brunette". The agent was not arrested on that occasion, but her efforts had backfired.Locals like the Balachowskys provided crucial support for SOE women, who could be given away by any small gesture.

her to the attention of the Germans.

Despite having grown up near Paris, Inayat Khan threatened her cover just by pouring tea. Shortly after her arrival, Mrs Balachowsky invited neighbours to a tea party, during which the SOE agent poured the milk first into her cup, leading a neighbour to comment that she behaved like a Brit. Emilie Balachowsky quickly corrected Inayat Khan, who was not the only spy to make errors based on cultural differences. While at the farm, Yvonne Cormeau was asked to watch the owner's cows. She was about to bring her knitting kit, until her contact explained that this would give her away. "I was forbidden from knitting, as we Englishwomen knit differently."These anecdotes are a testament to the importance of everyday habits and of the agents' local contacts. For SOE women, espionage in France was very much about teamwork. While Inayat Khan was compromised and executed, for the most part the SOE's civilian programme for women was a success. The SOE paved the way for other agencies which gradually started to recruit civilians of all genders after the Second World War.Some of its methods are also used by modern secret services, such as the illegals programme, a Russian initiative which involves sending Russian operatives fluent in English undercover in the US.Despite this success, the contribution of women like Patricia O'Sullivan, Yvonne Cormeau and Noor Inayat Khan has remained widely overlooked. They deserve to be remembered along with the period's male

Joint pains, arthritis going up in India, says WHO study: Know what's causing them



Jamuna Patil, Ravindra Sharma, and Madhavi Kakade (names changed) suffered from severe aches, pains and swollen joints for years before they were diagnosed with arthritis or joint inflammation and pain. Worse, they were misdiagnosed and put on other therapies that did nothing but worsen their symptoms.

Patil, 44, was told her symptoms were indicative of menopause and found she had rheumatoid arthritis — a chronic, autoimmune disease that causes inflammation and pain in the joints — two-and-a-half years later. Sharma, 55, diabetic and overweight, was told he had gout when he suffered from severe knee osteoarthritis (when wear and tear breaks down cartilage in the joints) for seven years that required surgery. Kakade, 22, was treated for rheumatic fever by a local doctor. In three years, her knees deformed and she was finally diagnosed with rheumatic arthritis. She required early knee replacement surgery. These are just a few instances of musculoskeletal pains that the World Health Organisation (WHO) has found in the Indian population. As part of its community-oriented programme for the Control of Rheumatic Diseases (COPCORD), its survey has shown a strikingly high prevalence of musculoskeletal (MSK) pain and arthritis in the Indian population. Published in the International Journal of Rheumatic Diseases, the survey tracked 56,548 people and found that 16 per cent suffered from musculoskeletal pains, the rural population being affected the most. Women were found to be the worst

Why is the study significant?

According to Dr Arvind Chopra, rheumatologist and lead author, "We did not have robust estimates of the burden of arthritis in India. Our study is the best approximation but sufficient for public health and policy planning," he said. Roughly one-sixth of the Indian population suffers from musculoskeletal pain and several million from various forms of arthritis — 4.22 million from rheumatoid arthritis, 54.44 million from osteoarthritis and 17.24 million from soft tissue rheumatism. "The pain was mostly self-managed, and only those with moderate to severe intensity and experiencing difficulty in daily living and livelihood sought organized medical care. The findings should be considered as they make case for launching a national programme of arthritis," he added.

What's causing arthritis in India?

Some risk factors for rising numbers are a rapidly ageing population with degenerative joints, poor knowledge about pain management that delays diagnosis, chronic illnesses like hypertension and diabetes, autoimmune diseases and heavy manual work among those into hard labour. In cities, obesity, sedentary behaviour and poor lifestyle are triggers. "Several inflammatory forms of arthritis such as rheumatoid arthritis and lupus are autoimmune conditions and are easily triggered by mental stress and infections," said Dr Chopra."Women also suffer more," Dr Chopra said, adding that an alarming proportion of rheumatoid arthritis was found in vounger women under 45. While poor health literacy is a factor, women tend to overlook their symptoms. The survey also listed chikungunya arthritis, joint inflammation triggered by the chikungunya virus, which lasts months and years. The prevalence of musculoskeletal pain was higher in the rural population (20 per cent vs 10.3 per cent in urban areas). Meanwhile, rheumatoid arthritis was 0.34 per cent, undifferentiated inflammatory arthritis was 0.22 per cent, spondyloarthritis was 0.23 per cent, osteoarthritis was 4.39 per cent, gout 0.05 per cent and chikungunya arthritis 1.2 per cent. Non-specific arthralgias, soft tissue pains and degenerative arthritis were dominant disorders. Twelve per cent of respondents reported inflam-

Sitting at home may negate benefits of exercise: How a sedentary worker fixed his heart disease

Published in the journal of the American Heart Association, it says that limiting time spent watching television to no more than one hour each day may lower the risk of heart attackPublished in the journal of the American Heart Association, it says that limiting time spent watching television to no more than one hour each day may lower the risk of heart attack One of my patients, who had come in for a review after undergoing a procedure to clear his blocked arteries, was happy to see that his parameters were not only in range but he felt much younger, refreshed and energetic. Not just because he exercised for 40 minutes every day. He made sure that the gains were not diluted by becoming a couch potato in his waking hours.

A desk job employee with eight hours of sitting, he made sure he took walking and stretching breaks at work and did not lounge around when home. He would do some chores or do some gardening instead of flopping down on the sofa. His parameters were the best he had ever had in his life because of his mobility and activity levels. And he wished that he had been as conscious before his heart attack. Now a new observational study by the School of Public Health at the University of Hong Kong has corroborated the need to not just cut down sitting time or sedentary behaviour at work but also during our waking hours or leisure time. Published in the journal of the American Heart Association, it says that limiting time spent watching television to no more than one hour each day may lower the risk of heart attack, stroke and other blood vessel diseases, even among people with a high risk of Type 2 diabetes.

Considering that a majority of Indians are prone to developing diabetes and have a sedentary life, this study highlights how we can restrict sitting behaviour by cutting down habits that encourage us to sit down, like watching TV or browsing social media. With diabetes already a comorbidity in most of us, we need to manage the second most modifiable risk factor — sitting. "Watching TV, which accounts for more than half of daily sedentary behaviour, is consistently associated with an increased risk of Type 2 diabetes and atherosclerosis," the authors said.



What does prolonged sitting or any sedentary behaviour do to the heart?

For starters, it slows down blood flow and circulation, allowing fatty deposits to sit in the arteries. It impairs the body's metabolism and ability to process fats, leading to pile-up of low density lipoprotein or bad cholesterol and triglycerides, which accelerate plaque deposition.


Prolonged sitting has been linked to weight gain and the development of metabolic syndrome or a cluster of conditions (high blood pressure, high blood sugar, excess body fat and unhealthy cholesterol levels) that increase the risk of heart disease. A sedentary lifestyle can lead to insulin resistance, where the body's cells don't respond effectively to insulin, potentially leading to type 2 diabetes, another risk factor for heart disease. It can lead to high blood pressure, which can damage blood vessels and contribute to plaque buildup. Studies have shown that sitting for many hours day after day is associated with increased coronary artery calcification, a marker of sub-clinical heart disease that can increase the risk of a heart attack. Yet, all of this is avoidable if you keep moving consistently through the day. Just break your rest periods with short burst activity.

Cancer centre at district hospitals: Trained staff, chemotherapy, 4-6 beds

Chemotherapy, counselling services and medicine; four to six beds each; every facility to have an oncologist or a trained medical officer, along with two nurses, a pharmacist, a counsellor and a multi-purpose worker. These are the key elements in the blueprint drawn up by the Union Health Ministry for the Government's ambitious initiative to establish cancer daycare centres in all district hospitals. These details were outlined in a Parliamentary Standing Committee report, tabled on March 12, pertaining to the demand for grants by the Ministry. According to the Health Ministry's submission to the committee, cancer treatment will be made accessible closer to patients' homes after an initial plan is finalised at tertiary care or state centres. Speaking to The Indian Express, experts described the initiative as "a very good way to ensure continuity", especially with many of the at least 764 district hospitals across the country currently not equipped to offer cancer care.

In her Budget speech, Union Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman had announced that these centres would be set up over the next three years, with at least 200 centres slated to come up during the current financial year. While the Government proposed that staff for these centres be drawn from the existing pool at district hospitals, the Parliamentary panel recommended "separate" recruitment. "The Committee also desires that separate human Resources (including health professional and nurse) may be provided instead of seeking from the pool of District Hospital for smooth functioning of the centre since there are already scarcity of health professionals in the District Hospitals where such professionals must be made available," the panel report stated. The establishment of such centres comes at a time when the incidence of cancer is on the rise, with one in nine people in the country likely to be affected. India sees over 14 lakh cases and 9 lakh deaths in



a year, according to data from the Global Cancer Observatory. The most common cancers among men are in the lip and oral cavity (15.6%), lung (8.5%) and oesophagus (6.6%) while for women, they are breast (26.6%), cervical (17.7%), and ovary (6.6%).

Reacting to the Government's initiative, Dr Sushma Bhatnagar, former head of the cancer centre at AIIMS, said, "Not all district hospitals in the country offer chemotherapy or other cancer treatment. If good quality care can be assured through these daycare centres at district levels, it will be a very good way to ensure continuity of care. Many times, cancer patients who come to AIIMS are unable to follow the treatment protocol prescribed by the doctor because they are unable to come back to Delhi."Being a palliative care specialist, she also suggested that these centres should also provide pain management, which is a "low-cost, low-resource intervention". "Nearly 60% to 70% of all cancer patients need pain management and it is easy to provide through such centres," she said.

According to Dr Abhishek Shankar, an oncologist from AIIMS, the medical staff should be trained in managing side-effects as well. "When we talk of starting such centres at district level

What is human coronavirus detected in a Kolkata woman? Here's all you need to know about this strain



There have been reports of a woman in Kolkata suffering from a human coronavirus or HKU1, a species of coronavirus. However, HKU1 is generally linked to milder respiratory illnesses and is not of pandemic potential. According to reports, the Kolkata patient is now stable. "There are many kinds of coronaviruses. But unlike Covid-19, which was a novel virus when the outbreak happened, HKU-1 was first identified in 2005 as a rare isolate. So you cannot call it a novel virus. Evidence indicates it is evolving steadily in humans, probably the only known reservoir. Most people get infected with these viruses at some point in their lives and these last for a limited duration. So there is no need to panic over it," says Dr Suranjit Chatterjee, senior consultant, internal medicine, Indraprastha Apollo Hospitals, New Delhi. "This generally affects the upper respiratory tract, causing symptoms similar to those of the common cold

What are the symptoms of human coronavirus?

They are similar to regular flu symptoms. So there is malaise, persistent cough, runny nose or nasal congestion, blocked sinuses, sore throat, fatigue, headaches and fever, usually low grade. In severe cases, the infection can lead to pneumonia or bronchitis. Since it infects cells along the airways, it can descend to the lungs, potentially causing pneumonia.

Who is at risk?

The disease is self-limiting and resolves on its own. But vulnerable groups like the elderly, children, pregnant women, those with immuno-compromised conditions or with co-morbidities need to be vigilant for severe manifestation of the disease.

How does the human coronavirus HKU1 spread?

It spreads like any other coronavirus. It is transmitted during direct contact with the infected person via respiratory droplets (coughing or sneezing), touching contaminated surfaces and then touching the face, mouth, or nose.

What are prevention methods?

Just revive the Covid time protocol. Which means follow strict norms of hand hygiene and wash your hands frequently with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. Or sanitise them. This is something we have become lax about. Wear a mask in crowded or high-risk areas. Cover your mouth and nose when coughing or sneezing or stay away from social interactions when sick. Yearly HIV prevention injection shows promise in clinical trial

A yearly injection to protect against HIV is safe and shows promise as a prevention method with long-lasting effects, according to the results of a clinical trial published in The Lancet journal. Lenacapavir was developed by Gilead Sciences, a research-based biopharmaceutical company in the United States, as a pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) medication to prevent infection in people at risk of exposure to HIV. It is administered as an injection into the muscle tissue. The drug, which works by blocking HIV from entering and multiplying in human cells, remained in the body for at least 56 weeks, according to the phase 1 randomised controlled trial.

Phase 1 trials assess how a new drug is absorbed and metabolised in a group of 20-100 healthy volunteers, along with its safety.HIV, or human immunodeficiency virus, attacks and weakens a person's immune system by targeting white blood cells. Acquired immunodeficiency syndrome (AIDS) is caused at the most advanced stage of HIV infection. Currently, there is no cure or vaccine approved for HIV/AIDS. The trial included 40 participants, aged 18-55 years, who did not have HIV. Two formulations of the drug were prepared -- one with 5 per cent ethanol and the other with 10 per cent. Half of the participants received the first formulation of lenacapavir, while the other half received the second. The drug was administered as a single 5000 milligram dose.

Samples collected from the participants for up to 56 weeks were analysed to assess safety and drug behaviour. Both formulations were found to be "safe and well tolerated." Pain at the injection site was the most common adverse event, which was generally mild, resolved within one week, and was substantially reduced by pretreatment with ice, the



authors reported. Further, after the 56-week period, the levels of lenacapavir in participants exceeded those in phase 3 trials of a different lenacapavir injection, which is administered twice a year underneath the skin and above the muscle tissue (subcutaneous injection). Results from the phase 3 trials, published in July 2024 in The New England Journal of Medicine, showed that the twice-a-year subcutaneous injection was safe and highly efficacious. "Following the administration of once-yearly intramuscular lenacapavir, median plasma concentrations exceeded those associated with efficacy in phase 3 studies of twice-yearly subcutaneous lenacapavir for PrEP for at least 56 weeks," the authors wrote in The Lancet study. The results indicate the potential of a yearly biomedical intervention for preventing HIV infection, the team stated. However, the small sample size of the study limits the broader generalisation of the results. Therefore, data from a larger, more diverse group is needed to assess the safety of this yearly lenacapavir injection, the authors concluded.

Ayush Ministry to evaluate potential of Ayurveda formulation for diabetes

New Delhi: The Central Ayurveda Research Institute (CARI), Kolkata, under the Central Council for Research in Ayurvedic Sciences (CCRAS) of the Ministry of Ayush, on Monday launched a research project to evaluate the potential of an Ayurveda formulation to treat diabetes. CARI signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the School of Natural Product Studies (SNPS), Jadavpur University, Kolkata to mark the beginning of a collaborative research project to probe the potential of "Vidangadi Lauham" – a classical Ayurvedic formulation — in the management of diabetes. This research project, to be launched in experimental animals, "holds immense potential in the field of Ayurveda research, aiming to establish a strong scientific foundation for the use of Vidangadi Lauham in diabetes

management," said the Ministry. The research aims to conduct biophysical characterisation and analyse the biological activity of medicinal plants. It will contribute significantly to the preservation and restoration of India's rich medicinal plant heritage. "The findings will be instrumental in developing high-quality, safe, and effective Ayurvedic formulations for combating diabetes and its complications," the Ministry said. Furthermore, the project highlights the need for a comprehensive database to validate the health benefits of medicinal plants, ensuring their credibility in the global healthcare landscape. "The ultimate goal is to popularise Ayurvedic formulations as natural health-promoting agents, fostering greater acceptance of traditional medicine worldwide," the Ministry said.

Ukraine Cease-Fire Hinges on Trump Call With Putin



WASHINGTON—President Trump's hopes of getting Moscow to agree to a 30-day cease-fire with Ukraine are pinned to a phone call planned for Tuesday with Russian President Vladimir Putin, who is likely to push for territorial and other concessions. In Moscow, the Kremlin dampened hopes of any breakthrough. On Monday a top foreign-ministry official said that any peace deal would have to guarantee Ukraine's neutral status and appeared to rule out any European peacekeeping force on Ukrainian soil, a key provision of Kyiv and Western allies of any peace deal.

Other Russian officials have been calling for a deal that addresses what Moscow calls the "root causes" of the conflict, signaling the Kremlin wants to retain key provinces of Ukraine and exert political influence over the rest of the country. With Moscow showing little sign of budging from its initial war aims, Trump's second official phone call with Putin since he was inaugurated is expected to end with some diplomatic niceties and a promise for more talks.

After agreeing earlier this month to a cease-fire plan promoted by the U.S., Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky has called on the U.S. to exert pressure on Russia to end the war. In a weekly video address he accused Putin of using talks with the U.S. in Saudi Arabia as a delay tactic and covering up its opposition to a cease-fire. "After the talks in Jeddah and the American proposal for a cease-fire on the front line, Russia stole almost another week—a week of war that only Russia wants," Zelensky said in his nightly video address Sunday.

Moscow's reticence comes despite Trump's warm words toward Putin and broad rhetorical concessions by the Trump administration to Russia as it bargains with Moscow for an end to the war. Over the weekend Trump's national security adviser, Michael Waltz, said that Ukraine would have to surrender "some type of territory" in a peace deal. Asked on Monday about reports that Trump on Tuesday would offer Putin territorial concessions, such as recognizing Crimea as part of Russia, National Security Council spokesman Brian Hughes denied the president planned to make any offer.

"We have made no such commitments and we will not negotiate this deal through the media," Hughes said. Trump's special envoy Steve Witkoff, who visited Moscow last week, told Face the Nation Sunday that it was "unfortunate" that some European leaders thought that Putin wasn't interested in a peace deal. "I know what I heard, the body language I witnessed," Witkoff told Face the Nation.

Trump's rhetoric, meanwhile, has bent toward the Kremlin's version of events in Ukraine as he pushes for a deal. In an Oval Office meeting with Zelensky last month, Trump blamed Ukraine for starting the war. Speaking to reporters on Monday, Trump said that he would be using the phone call with Putin to save the lives of Ukrainian soldiers who are "deep in trouble," apparently referring to a disputed report promoted by Moscow that Ukrainian forces have been surrounded by a Russian counteroffensive in Kursk and are on the cusp of being massacred."I believe if it wasn't for me they would be-they wouldn't be here any longer," Trump said of the Ukrainians. Kyiv has announced in recent days that Ukrainian troops withdrew from most of Kursk province in Russia, which Ukraine had hoped would serve as a bargaining chip in talks after seizing dozens of towns and villages there in August. Ukrainian officials have acknowledged a retreat there but repeatedly denied claims by Trump and Putin of a large-scale encirclement of troops.

John Herbst, a former U.S. ambassador to Ukraine who is now a senior director at the Atlantic Council think tank, said that the Kremlin's talks with Trump and Witkoff stand little chance of reaching a peace deal soon, but they do serve Moscow's interest in persuading them that Kyiv, not Moscow, is to blame for the conflict. Herbst noted that Witkoff, Trump's envoy, has spent eight hours in meetings with Putin in recent trips. He said Putin will now spend time on the phone with Trump as part of a delaying tactic. "He has wisely praised Trump's cease-fire plans, but says he has problems with the nuances," he said. "He wants to drag things out." Meanwhile, Secretary of State Marco Rubio told Fox News Radio: "I don't think there's been movement to our satisfaction from anybody yet. I think what we have seen is that we're closer—we're not close to peace. I mean, I think there's a lot to be worked on, but we're closer than we were two weeks ago or closer than we were six months ago."Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov said there are still no plans for a meeting between the U.S. and Russian leaders that would signal a wider deal in the offing. Though Trump has mentioned the possibility of a meeting, Peskov said there are no dates, according to the state-run RIA Novosti news agency. "There are not even any plans yet." In an interview with Russia's Izvestia newspaper published Monday, Russia's deputy foreign minister, Alexander Grushko, signaled that Moscow's aims, including a retreat of NATO from Russia's borders, haven't changed since 2021, shortly before Moscow's invasion of Ukraine.

Binyamin Netanyahu is leading Israel into (another) crisis

AT FIRST GLANCE it would seem that Binyamin Netanyahu, Israel's prime minister, was acting within his powers when he announced his decision on March 16th to fire Ronen Bar, the head of the Shin Bet, Israel's domestic-security service. The law allows the government to terminate the Shin Bet chief's five-year tenure prematurely. He answers directly to the prime minister and as Mr Netanyahu explained in a message to the nation, there was "ongoing distrust" between him and Mr Bar.

But the timing and motive of the prime minister's move are questionable. Shortly after Hamas's surprise attack on Israel on October 7th, 2023 Mr Bar accepted responsibility for his agency's failure to prevent it. He said he would recuring the release of 251 hostages snatched by Hamas. But 59 of them remain in Gaza (over half of them are believed to be dead). Why is Mr Netanyahu trying to get rid of his security chief now?Mr Bar, a career intelligence officer who became chief in 2021, is a member of two groups of senior defence and legal officials who are in Mr Netanyahu's sights. He is an appointee of the short-lived previous government, so his loyalties are regarded as suspect. He is also one of the main figures that the prime minister has tried to blame for the October 7th attacks, deflecting attention from his own responsibility for a long-term strategy of allowing Hamas to retain power in Gaza so that he could claim to have no suitable partner with whom to negotiate.Mr Netanyahu has largely succeeded in booting this second group of people out of power. In November he fired the defence minister, Yoav Gallant. Most of the officers who were in charge of the Israel Defence Forces or overseeing military intelligence on October 7th have already resigned. The two remaining targets are Mr Bar and the attorney-general, Gali Baharav-Miara, whom the prime minister is also trying

Getting rid of Mr Bar and Ms Baharav-Miara has taken on new urgency for Mr Netanyahu in recent days. The Shin Bet has been carrying out two investigations against some of the prime minister's closest aides who allegedly leaked classified documents to the media and received payments from the Qatari government. Mr Netanyahu has publicly denied having received anything from the Qataris but seems rattled by the investigation.

Mr Bar has refused to say whether he will accept his



ismissai. He nas simply insisted that he wil law. In a lengthy statement, he contradicted Mr Netanyahu's claim that the "distrust" between them was grounds for his removal. He stressed that his "loyalty is first and foremost to Israel's citizens." He referred obliquely to the allegations against the prime minister's inner circle, saying that among the missions he has to complete before resigning are "a number of sensitive investigations". The attorney-general also referred to these investigations in a letter to Mr Netanyahu, informing him that the firing of the Shin Bet chief must be put on hold since the process is "tainted by illegality and conflict of interest". Mr Netanyahu has already rejected the attorney-general's objections. But the issue is headed for Israel's Supreme Court, which has in the past overruled government personnel decisions. If the court accepts the attorney-general's legal opinion, Mr Netanyahu will have to decide whether to back down or defy the court. If he sticks to his guns, the next case on the court's docket will undoubtedly be a petition asking it to rule that a prime minister who refuses to abide by its rulings is unfit for office. That would cause a constitutional crisis that has been building up since Mr Netanyahu returned to office at the end of 2022. His coalition's major legislative aim was to pass sweeping legal reforms to weaken the powers of the Supreme Court. Widespread protests stymied their efforts at the time. After the war in Gaza began, most of the legislation was put on hold. Now a renewed clash between Israel's government and judiciary seems all but inevitable. By law, the Shin Bet's mandate includes protecting "Israel's democratic process and institutions". The agency may soon understand that to mean protecting Israel's democracy from

Are your lights making you sick? The shocking truth about LEDs

Additionally, incandescent bulbs, which closely mimic natural light, are a safer alternative as they limit adverse effects on the human body.

Andreeva puts the tennis world on notice

Mirra Andreeva likes to carry a little notebook with her to court. It contains handwritten notes on the opponents the 17-year-old has faced, and she often flips through it during mid-match changeovers (TV cameras snooped in to capture a page headlined, "INDIAN WELLS Rybakina"). Over the years, as the annals of women's tennis turn chapters on generational prodigies, Andreeva's name will stand out in the current era. As the youngest champion of the prestigious Indian Wells tournament since Serena Williams in 1999. As the youngest woman to win back-to-back WTA 1000 events since Martina Hingis in 1997. And as one of only three women aged under 18 to have beaten the world No.1 and No.2 in the same tournament. The other two? Serena Williams and Steffi Graf. That's some elite company to be in.

Andreeva was always looked at as a prodigious talent, and the Russian's sizzling run in the Californian desert could potentially light her path to making further inroads into such elusive clubs. When the teen turned the tables on Aryna Sabalenka 2-6, 6-4, 6-3 in the final on Sunday, she capped off a terrific week in which she took down world No.2 Iga Swiatek, Australian Open quarterfinalist Elina Svitolina, and 2022 Wimbledon winner Elena Rybakina. Make that a terrific month, swinging back to Dubai where she also won and went past Swiatek and Rybakina to become the youngest WTA 1000 champion. Sabalenka, Swiatek and Rybakina are currently the three most powerful pros on the women's tour flaunting Grand Slam-winning pedigree, and this babyfaced giant-killer has defeated them all over the past month two of them twice. No woman has won more matches so far this year than Andreeva. No teen has created quite a stir in recent times — perhaps with the exception of Coco Gauff, now 21 - since another Russian teen sensation turned star, Maria Sharapova. This rip-roaring Russian, now a world No 6, is on the fast lane. And she's loving it. "Maybe it's all happening a bit fast. But I like it," Andreeva said after winning Indian Wells, often described as the fifth Grand Slam. "It's not bad to win two tournaments in a row. If it's happening fast, I take it."It was always meant to happen for her; the question was when rather than if.

The rise and riseBorn in the Russian city of Krasnoyarsk, Andreeva started playing as a six-year-old along with her elder sister Erika (also a pro, currently ranked

95). Sensing the siblings' potential, the Andreeva family moved to the resort own of Sochi for better training facilities and then to Cannes, France, under coaches Jean-Rene Lisnard and Jean-Christophe Faurel. That's where Andreeva developed her craft which made her the topranked junior and the Australian Open girls' finalist in 2023. That season also gave the world the first signs of her potential, as she made the Round of 16 at WTA Madrid Open and then Wimbledon as a qualifier.

Those baby steps turned into giant strides with the arrival of Conchita Martinez as her coach last year. The Spanish 1994 Wimbledon champion had worked with former top 10 pros in Garbine Muguruza and Karolina Pliskova, and instantly saw a bright prospect and quick learner in Andreeva (the handwritten notes were Martinez's idea).

Blooming in this partnership, Andreeva reached the 2024 French Open semi-finals beating Sabalenka, captured her first WTA title at lasi in July and the 2024 Paris Olympics doubles silver. Her victory over Sabalenka at Indian Wells was only her second in six meetings, but one that is now accompanied by the belief that she can beat any player on her day. "I would say that now I'm sure that I can try and win really big matches against big players. Before I would just come out on court and try to win as many games as possible, because I had nothing to lose," Andreeva told WTA. There's also a Martinez mark on her game style, which features court movement and craft as her bigger strengths than raw power. It's a style that often elicits comparisons with another former teen sensation — Swiss great Hingis.

"I actually watched a lot of her matches," Andreeva had said. "I really like the way she plays." Trailblazer like no otherAndreeva is an anomaly at present, as the only teen ranked inside the top 100 of women's tennis which is increasingly getting physical. Andreeva has also had slightly divergent trajectory from the recent young breakout faces. While most have burst through almost overnight on one-Slam wonder moments (think Emma Raducanu or Bianca Andreescu) before losing their sheen to the rigours of the professional tour, Andreeva has been through a few deflating downs before this heady high. She has spoken about the junior Australian Open final defeat as being among the biggest learning lessons of her career. She broke down inconsolably during the presentation ceremony after losing the Ningbo Open final late last year on the back of some early tournament exits. The presentation ceremony at Indian Wells would bring out Andreeva's infectious smile, as also her unfiltered personality that adds to the charm of this star in the making shining brighter than ever. In the winners' on-court speech that often sees players deliver monotonous "thank you" sentences in a particular order (opponent, sponsors, crowd, and so on), Andreeva had a rather refreshing thank you reserved for the end."I would like to thank myself," Andreeva said, smiling. "For fighting until the end and for always believing in me and for never quitting." Fast lane or not, potential Grand Slam champion or not, this young talent is certainly a breath of fresh air. "I mean, it's

Rigorous fitness routine awaits Sunita Williams, Barry Wilmore on earth

The story so far: At around 3 am IST on March 19, a capsule bearing the astronauts Sunita Williams, Barry Wilmore, Aleksandr Gorbunov, and Nick Hague will splash down off the coast of Florida, US. The four will be returning from the International Space Station back to the earth. Of them, Ms. Williams and Mr. Wilmore will be wrapping up a roughly nine-month stay on the ISS, which they reached in June last year onboard Boeing's Starliner capsule. Mr. Gorbunov and Mr. Hague will be returning after a six-month stay onboard the ISS. NASA — which employs Mr. Hague, Ms. Williams, and Mr. Wilmore — has a regimen in place for the trio to follow now that they are back, to ensure they are in good health and are able to re-adapt to living with gravity after spending months in microgravity.

How does extended spaceflight affect humans?

The ISS is in low-earth orbit and its occupants experience microgravity, i.e. a very small but non-zero gravitational force. This affects the body in many ways, including allowing fluids to flow more easily towards the brain, reducing the tension acting on muscles, and lowering bone density. These consequences have cascading effects of their own. For example, the lower bone density causes more minerals to be deposited in the kidneys instead, leading to a higher risk of kidney stones. Thus, astronauts like Ms. Williams and Mr. Wilmore maintain a strict routine of exercises and dieting onboard the ISS, tailored among other things to help increase the blood-cell regeneration rate, work the heart, and engage the brain. NASA and other space agencies also have crafted specific programmes to make sure astronauts don't become stressed or anxious by their workload or by the confined space they're forced to occupy for months at a time. While more and more people have gone to space with each new decade, the data about the effects of spaceflight on their bodies and minds is insufficient to make proper conclusions with. This is because the number of spacefaring individuals is still much smaller than in a clinical trial; human bodies can differ on a variety of parameters; and different missions have different spaceflight profiles. Many agencies are currently pursuing programmes to systematically study astronauts' health, including a standardised set of tests and benchmarks.

How are astronauts monitored in space?

In September 2024, the Office of the Chief Health and Medical Officer at NASA released revised standards that specify the medical tests and checkups astronauts must undergo to stay fit before, during, and after spaceflight. The standards also say how astronauts should be treated once they return to the earth after either short (less than 30 days) or long (more than 30 days) missions. NASA regularly flies long missions: it rotates the crew onboard the ISS once every six months, for example. The standards also specify what tests and checkups need to be conducted for astronauts flying on private missions. One example of this is the upcoming Axiom Mission 4, which will carry a crew of four on a 16-day mission to the ISS. One of the crew members will be Indian astronaut-designate Shubhanshu Shukla.

According to the standards document, "The operational medical monitoring requirements for pre-flight, in-flight, and post-flight phases are used to establish flight readiness, establish baselines, effectively guide in-flight countermeasures and assessments, and guide rehabilitation of crew members to their baseline health status following spaceflight."In long-duration missions, astronauts like Ms. Williams and Mr. Wilmore are required to evaluate themselves two weeks, three months, six months, and nine months after launch and submit their reports to the crew

medical officer. There will be a private medical conference every day for the first week, then once a week, as well as before and after spacewalks. During spacewalks, their ECG and heart rate will be monitored. There will also be a hearing assessment once every three months and ocular assessments after one, three, six, and nine months. The body mass will be measured a week after launch, then monthly. The astronaut's blood and urine will be tested six months after launch and as and when clinically indicated, and they will be screened for deep-vein thrombosis and blood-flow anomalies one and two months after launch as well as 42 days before the return flight. In addition, the astronauts will be monitored for their strength and conditioning and their exposure to radiation.

How are astronauts rehabilitated post-flight?

Once Mr. Gorbunov, Mr. Hague, Ms. Williams, and Mr. Wilmore splash down on March 19 and are retrieved. they will need to undergo rigorous post-flight rehabilitation. This includes a slew of medical tests and physical rehabilitation procedures. According to NASA, "Post-flight reconditioning is unique for each astronaut and varies by individual. While most crew members reach their preflight fitness baseline within the first 45 days of returning to earth, it is not uncommon for NASA to extend reconditioning programs to meet an astronaut's specific needs and the pace of recovery." According to a chapter in the 2020 book 'Principles of Clinical Medicine for Space Flight', astronauts who have been in space for 20 days were able to regain their pre-flight fitness levels in a week. On the day they return, crew members will undergo a physical exam, a neurological assessment (which includes checking for headaches, vertigo, nystagmus, and dynamic stability), resting and ambulatory ECG, eye tests, checks of their skin, blood and urine tests, and tests to check for symptoms that appear when standing straight but not reclining (orthostatic tolerance). They will also have follow-up physical exams three days, one or two weeks, and two months after the descent. There will be follow-up tests on many of these counts as well as tests conducted according to the clinical indications. Depending on the parameter that needs to be checked, the tests are required to be conducted by the crew surgeon, the deputy crew surgeon or the partner flight surgeon. A mission psychologist may also perform psychological checks at one and 10 days after the return.

What does physical rehabilitation entail? The medical tests are accompanied by physical treatments to make sure the crew members' bodies are able to readjust to the earth's gravity after a long duration spent in microgravity. The corresponding facilities are available at, among other places, the Johnson Space Centre in Houston and the University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston, both in Texas. Just as their in-flight routines were carefully planned by experts, Ms. Williams and Mr. Wilmore will follow a pre-planned routine on the ground until they have recovered their pre-flight fitness levels. The latter routine includes, among other things, measures to minimise musculoskeletal and spinalcord injuries, to relieve stiff muscles and nausea, and improve bone and muscle strength. In 2024, four experts with the Indian Air Force published a paper in the Indian Journal of Aerospace Medicine, where they detailed the post-flight rehabilitation of an astronaut after six months onboard the ISS.According to this paper, the crew surgeon, the flight surgeon, and a physiotherapist may assess the need for massage therapy for crew members from the day of their return. In the subsequent week, crew members undergo a series of "physical reconditioning" exercises for two hours every day: warm-up exercises on elliptical,

Sensex, Nifty surge in early trade amid rally in global markets, buying in bank stocks



Equity benchmark indices Sensex and Nifty rallied in early trade on Tuesday in-tandem with a positive trend in global markets and buying in bank stocks. The 30-share BSE benchmark Sensex jumped 490.12 points to 74,660.07 in early trade. The NSE Nifty climbed 162.55 points to 22,671.30. From the Sensex pack, ICICI Bank, Zomato, Mahindra & Mahindra, Tata Motors, Larsen & Toubro, Hindustan Unilever, Power Grid and Adani Ports were among the biggest gainers. However, Bajaj Finserv and Bajaj Finance were the laggards. Among Asian markets, Seoul,

Tokyo, Shanghai and Hong Kong were trading in the positive territoryUS markets ended higher on Monday.

"Broad indications are that the market has bottomed out even though further corrections cannot be completely ruled out. Positive domestic cues like rebound on FY25 Q3 GDP growth to 6.2%, spurt in IIP, increase in gross tax collection, declining trade deficit and more importantly decline in CPI inflation to 3.6% are positive macro trends which augur well for the market," V K Vijayakumar, Chief Investment Strategist, Geojit Financial Services, said.But these domestic tailwinds are not strong enough to take the market to higher levels on a sustained basis since the global headwinds from tariff wars will counter the domestic tailwinds, he added.

Global oil benchmark Brent crude climbed 0.25 per cent to USD 71.25 a barrel. Foreign institutional investors (FIIs) offloaded equities worth Rs 4,488.45 crore on Monday, while Domestic Institutional Investors (DII) bought worth Rs 6,000.60 crore, according to exchange data. The Sensex climbed 341.04 points or 0.46 per cent to settle at 74,169.95 on Monday, snapping its five-day losing run. The Nifty rose by 111.55 points or 0.50 per cent to 22,508.75.

German insurance giant Allianz to sell stake in Bajaj JVs for Rs 24,600 crore

German insurance giant Allianz SE has decided to exit from its Indian insurance joint ventures with the Bajaj group. Nearly one and a half months after the government allowed 100 per cent FDI in insurance ventures, Allianz has decided to sell its 26 per cent stakes in life and non-life joint ventures with the Bajaj group for Rs 24,600 crore. Allianz entered into binding share purchase agreements with Bajaj Finserv Ltd to sell its 26 per cent stake in its successful non-life and life insurance joint ventures – Bajaj Allianz General Insurance Company (BAGIC) and Bajaj Allianz Life Insurance Company (BALIC) – to the Bajaj group for a total consideration of euro 2.6 bn. Allianz may receive the proceeds in several tranches, Allianz said in a statement.

Bajaj Finserv said it would be acquiring from Allianz 11.13 lakh equity shares of Rs 10 each in BAGIC at a price of Rs 4,808.24 per share and 15.22 equity shares of Rs 10 each in BALIC at a price of Rs 2,654.12 per share, amounting to 1.01 per cent equity stake in each of the companies, together with all rights, title, benefits and interest therein, as per the SPAs executed with Allianz.BAGIC had underwritten a premium of Rs 20,472 crore for FY2024. BALIC reported a premium income of Rs 11,492 crore in FY 2024, according to Life Insurance Council data.

With the above acquisition, the company would be holding 75.01 per cent of the total equity share capital in each of BAGIC and BALIC. "Further, after the structuring, it is proposed that Bajaj Holdings and Investment Ltd. and Jamnalal Sons Pvt Ltd will acquire approximately 19.95 per cent and 5.04 per cent of the paidup equity capital, respectively, in each of the two insurance companies," Bajaj Finserv said in an exchange filing.

The entire equity share capital in the said two insurance companies will be held by Bajaj Finserv (75.01 per cent) and the promoter entities (collectively 24.99 per cent). In addition, the board in line with the above decision, also approved acquisition of the entire equity stake held by Allianz in Bajaj Allianz Financial Distributors Limited (BAFDL) a 50:50 joint venture with Bajaj Finserv. It would be acquiring



12 lakh equity shares of face value of Rs 10 each in BAFDL for a consideration not exceeding Rs 12.5 crore from Allianz. After the acquisition, the entire share capital in BAFDL will be held by Bajaj Finserv.

"The decision to sell is the result of constructive and amicable talks with Bajaj Finserv Ltd. India continues to be one of Allianz's growth markets, and Allianz will explore new opportunities that strengthen its position in the market and expand its potential to serve not only as an investor but also as an operator," the Munich-based firm said.

"As the proceeds become available, Allianz will consider options for their deployment that support the company's strategic ambitions, in particular the reinvestment of sale proceeds into potential new opportunities in India," Allianz said. Allianz will adhere to its capital management policy as updated at the December 2024 Capital Markets Day, which includes a minimum level of distribution of earnings alongside the flexibility to fund disciplined deployment, it said. The transaction is subject to obtaining necessary regulatory approvals, which are expected to take a number of months. "Upon the transfer of shares and the cessation of Allianz being a promotor of the joint ventures, also the joint venture agreements between Allianz SE and Bajaj Finserv Ltd. will be terminated," it said.

India's trade deficit in Feb drops to \$14 bn; petroleum exports to Europe shrink by 30%



Driven by a steep 30 per cent decline in petroleum exports to Europe and an over 60 per cent decline in gold imports, India's merchandise trade deficit plummeted to a three-year low of \$14.05 billion in February, data released by the Ministry of Commerce and Industry on Monday

The sharp decline in petroleum exports, which was the key growth engine of India's exports following the war, comes a month after sweeping US sanctions targeting Russia's oil trade were announced on January 10, placing as many as 183 oil tankers under sanctions. Notably, India's petroleum imports also slipped by 26 per cent, data showed. While exports fell by 10.8 per cent to \$36.9 billion during the month, registering the fourth straight month of contraction, imports plunged by a sharper 16.3 per cent to \$50.96 billion, the lowest since April 2023. However, nonpetroleum and non-gems and jewellery exports registered a 5 per cent decline.

"It has been a very difficult year, but looking at the progress, overall exports this year will be more than \$800 billion," Commerce Secretary Sunil Barthwal said during a press briefing. "A portion of the year-on-year decline in merchandise exports can be attributed to the base-year effect related to the leap month. The trade deficit was also significantly lower than the average of over \$23 billion during the first 10 months of FY25. Given this print, we now expect the current account to post a surplus of about \$5 billion in Q4FY25, equivalent to roughly 0.5 per cent of GDP," Aditi Nayar, chief economist at ICRA, said.Data showed that chemicals exports were down 24.5 per cent to \$2.2 billion, while gems and jewellery exports contracted by 20.7 per cent to \$2.5 billion. Amid continued restrictions on steel imports, imports in the iron and steel category fell by 23 per cent.

Services exports in February were up 23 per cent to \$35 billion, while imports rose by 8.6 per cent to \$16.5 billion. Services exports in April-February were up 14 per cent year-on-year to \$354.9 billion, while imports increased by 13.3 per cent to \$183.2 billion.

"The big shift in US trade policy threatens to negatively impact global trade. The move has already resulted in many countries taking a protectionist approach to trade. All indications suggest that the US could further harden its

stance on tariffs, which will affect the world adversely. India has been one of the few major countries that has managed to do well on exports despite various back-to-back challenges," Pankaj Chadha, chairman of the Engineering Exports Promotion Council (EEPC) India, said. Ashwani Kumar, president of the Federation of Indian Export Organisations (FIEO), said that the dip in exports is primarily due to subdued global demand and ongoing challenges faced by key export sectors, including the impact of the global tariff war. Kumar said that the reduction in the trade deficit is a promising sign of India's trade sector beginning to rebalance. While exports have faced challenges, particularly due to the global tariff war, the sharp decline in imports signals a reduction in demand for foreign goods, presenting opportunities for domestic industries to grow, he said.

Suni Williams, Butch Wilmore on their way back to Earth

Cape Canaveral: NASA's two stuck astronauts headed back to Earth with SpaceX on Tuesday to close out a dramatic marathon mission that began with a bungled Boeing test flight more than nine months ago.

Butch Wilmore and Suni Williams bid farewell to the International Space Station — their home since last spring — departing aboard a SpaceX capsule alongside two other astronauts. The capsule undocked in the wee hours and aimed for a splashdown off the Florida coast by early evening, weather permitting.

Sunday's arrival of their relief crew meant Wilmore and Williams could finally leave. NASA cut them loose a little early, given the iffy weather forecast later this week. They checked out with NASA's Nick Hague and Russia's Alexander Gorbunov, who arrived in their own SpaceX capsule last fall with two empty seats reserved for the Starliner due.

"We'll miss you, but have a great journey home," NASA's Anne McClain called out from the space station as the capsule pulled away 418 km above the Pacific. Their plight captured the world's attention, giving new meaning to the phrase "stuck at work".

While other astronauts had logged longer spaceflights over the decades, none had to deal with so much uncertainty or see the length of their mission expand by so much. Wilmore and Williams quickly transitioned from guests to full-fledged station crew members, conducting experiments, fixing equipment and even spacewalking together.

With 62 hours over nine spacewalks, Williams set a new record: the most time spent spacewalking over a career among female astronauts. Both had lived on the orbiting lab before and knew the ropes, and brushed up on their station training before rocketing away.

India now exporting railway equipment to Europe, Australia and Saudi Arabia: Ashwini Vaishnaw



From metro coaches to Australia, locomotives to Myanmar and Bangladesh, passenger coaches to Mozambique and Sri Lanka, the Indian Railways' global footprint is expanding as export of rail equipment have surged, Minister for Railways Ashwini Vaishnaw said in Parliament on Monday. He said that India is supplying other rail equipment as well such as propulsion system and bogie or underframe to multiple European countries.

"Today, from our country, the metro coaches are being exported to Australia. The mechanical structure below the locomotive and coaches, which is called bogie or the underframe, is being exported to United Kingdom, Saudi Arabia, France and Australia. Along with this the propulsion system, an important part of power electronics, is being now exported to France, Mexico, Romania, Spain, Germany and Italy. It is a matter of great pride," said Vaishnaw during a discussion in the Rajya Sabha on Railways Budget.

He further said that passenger coaches are being ex-

ported to Mozambique, Bangladesh and Sri Lanka. Similarly, Indian locomotives are being sent to Mozambique, Senegal, Sri Lanka, Myanmar and Bangladesh. Vaishnaw also announced that locomotives manufactured at Marhowra factory — a public private partnership (PPP) mode production unit in Saran district in Bihar — will be exported in near future. "In the near future in Bihar, the Marhowra Factory, which was announced by Lalu Yadav (as then Railway Minister) and it got the momentum after Narendra Modi took charge in 2014, will export more than 100 locomotives soon. Thus, Made in Bihar locomotives will go around the world," said the Minister in Rajya Sabha.

Recently the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Railways also desired that Indian Railways should expand its business operation in exporting of rail components to enhance revenue without making any compromise on fulfilling of indigenous demand for rolling stock. In 2022, Indian Railways supplied one 3000HP diesel electric locomotive, manufactured at Banaras Locomotive Works (BLW) Varanasi, of Rs 30.59 crore and 58 passenger coaches & five diesel electric multiple unit (DEMU) sets (each DEMU set comprising of six coaches), manufactured at Modern Coach Factory, Raebareli, of Rs 293.32 crore to Mozambique. In the same year, Railways exported 40 broad gauge passenger coaches to Sri Lanka at a cost of Rs 164.77 crore. These coaches were manufactured at Integral Coach Factory (ICF), Chennai. In 2023 too, Railways exported passenger coaches to Mozambique for over Rs 120 crore. The Railway Minister stated that in FY25, Railways will transport 1.6 billion tonnes of cargo, making it one of the world's top three freight carriers, alongside China and

PM Internship Scheme a 'national cause', more companies need to chip in: Sitharaman


Union Finance and Corporate Affairs Minister Nirmala Sitharaman has called on more companies to participate in the PM Internship Scheme (PMIS), citing larger national interest. Now, in its second round – still at the pilot stage – the scheme has drawn internship postings from 327 companies, up from around 280 in the first round.

Announced in the Union Budget for 2024-25 last July, the scheme aims to provide internships to one crore youth in top 500 companies over five years. "In this second phase, more industries have come forward. I appreciate the industry's readiness to come forward and offer positions, but for a country of our size and with the objective that the top 500 companies participate, we still have some way to go," Sitharaman said at the launch of the PMIS mobile app on Monday.

"I would appeal to the industry to make sure that the rest of them, beyond those who have come forward, should also participate. This is a national cause. Nobody is expecting you to cut your profits. Nobody is expecting the industry to face loss. The government is chipping in money," she added. Under the scheme, an amount of Rs 4,500 will be provided per month by the Government of India to selected candidates through Direct Benefit Transfer (DBT), with an additional Rs 500 offset to be provided by the company's CSR (corporate social responsibility) funds.In the first round of the pilot, which was conducted between October and December last year, over 1.27 lakh opportunities were posted and over 82,000 offers were made to successful candidates. The number of candidates who accepted internship offers was lower than expected in the first round, with just around 8,000 taking up offers till February 6, The Indian Express had earlier reported.

In the second round, which began in January, around 1.18 lakh internship opportunities are up for grabs, spread across 735 districts. The application window for the second round will close on March 31.

"We need to give confidence to our youth... I would think Indian industry should participate in the larger interest of this country, use that demographic dividend which exists, so that their productivity and future can be better endured with our youngsters going there," Sitharaman said.Now, with the launch of the PMIS mobile app, users can also take advantage of the referral program recently announced by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs. "The referral program would enable the registered youth to refer other eligible candidates for the scheme and win rewards. The registered youth on the PM Internship portal (web browser) can also participate in this referral program," a note by the ministry said



The ministry has also taken steps to enhance access to the scheme in the second round. "The dashboard of the PMIS Portal has been simplified, made more user-friendly, and greater details of the opportunities and roles offered have been provided. Officials from the MCA, state governments, and industry partners interacted with the youth at more than 80 outreach events held at various educational institutes, such as colleges and Rozgar Melas," the note added. In the first round. Sitharaman said the process was automated, transparent, and designed to be inclusive. "The system was very clearly supportive of all the proactive provisions in the Constitution, so that nobody is missed out. People who needed that additional support were given. The reservation policy was also introduced into it. But the companies were given a shortlist, through which they could choose who they wanted to. There was no compulsion on the industry, no interference in their management process,'

"As much as possible, through the system itself, every intern applicant was tried to be placed in the area from which he came. Literally within the district, if not, the neighbouring district. No one was expected to get out too far, unless they chose to go far," she added. Under the scheme, the government also provides a one-time grant of Rs 6,000 per annum for incidentals to cover miscellaneous expenses incurred by selected candidates during their internship. The internship scheme was a part of the Prime Minister's Package for Employment and Skilling announced in the 2024-25 Budget with an overall outlay of Rs 2 lakh crore. Initially, Rs 2,000 crore was provided to the corporate affairs ministry for the ongoing financial year. In the revised estimates for 2024-25, the amount allocated for the scheme was scaled down to Rs 380 crore. For 2025-26, an amount of Rs 10,831 crore has been provided in the Budget, including Rs 59.77 crore of capital outlay.

Farmers struggle to sell mangoes due to lack of market in Mancherial

Mancherial: Mango farmers are struggling to sell their produce following lack of marketing facilities in the district, one of the largest producers of mangoes in Telangana.

The mango crop is being raised in 17,538 acres in the district this year as against 18,000 acres and 17,000 acres cultivation in 2024 and 2023 respectively. Around 50,000 tonnes of mangoes are expected to be produced this year. Nearly 1,000 farmers from Nennal, Jaipur, Bheemaram, Bellampalli, Thandur and Mandamarri mandals have been growing the crop in orchards for many decades.

The industrially-developed district is known for producing over 60 varieties of mango fruits including Banganapalle, Kala Mamidi, Dasheri, Totapuri, Goa, Panchadara, Cherukurasam, Malgova, Jishan, Mallika, Sundari, Himayat, Neelam etc., The value of the mango fruit production is assessed to be Rs 200 crore per annum.

Farmers of the fruit crop, however, are facing inconvenience due to lack of marketing facilities in the district. They are registering poor profits in raising the crop. They stated they were now forced to depend on markets located in Hyderabad and Nagpur of Maharashtra to sell the produce by shelling huge amounts on transportation and shelter. Madhukar, who raised the mango crop in his 4 acres of farm, hired a vehicle to sell the produce weighing 20 tonnes in Nagpur of Maharashtra. He opined that he could have earned more profit if a market was set up in the district.

He stated that depending on the far-flung markets was affecting their profits and requested officials to ensure marketing opportunities in the district. Officials said that a market was sanctioned for the convenience of the mango farmers in 2015, but it was yet to become operational. They

stated that due to fund crunch, the facility was under construction. A water purifying plant, compound wall, internal CC roads and a mango cover sheet have been constructed so far. Officials of the marketing department traders were not coming forward to obtain licenses to buy mangoes from the farmers for unknown reasons even as awareness was being created among them.

However, efforts are being made to begin the process of procurement of the mangoes in the district, officials said.

No 18-year-old has captured the imagination of a country since Sachin Tendulkar than IPL. It is as though yesterday that IPL was born, with a swirl of sixes into the Bangalore night skies, the iconic ground heaving to the newborn raptures. Seventeen seasons have passed, and the league would embrace adulthood when the fireworks whizz into the Kolkata skies on Saturday. Like exhausted but relieved parents, the league's swarming audience would sigh, "how time flies" and marvel at the fully-formed specimen imposing on cricket's landscape. And probably poke their touch-screen phones to make changes in their fantasy teams.

The loathers have turned lovers with converts' zeal. It has cord-cut the traditional cricket-watching audience. As much as 43 percent of the audience is women. The cricket world has gravitated to the IPL universe, the global calendar kept largely abreast of the league. In the country of its birth, it is the rite-of-passage age when you could drive, enter a polling booth, open a bank account, or be sentenced to prison. But IPL has lived the life of an adult for most of its existence, leaping over the traditionally accepted stages of life at maddening speed like an ethereal wunderkind. At 18, it radiates the glow of a prince assured of his inheritance.

Eighteen years is not a lifetime, but perhaps a third or fourth of all the years an average human would live. The IPL has already lived quite a life, its great success is that it has blended the different worlds of sports, entertainment and business, without each other intruding too much into the other's space. Entertainment has not diluted the sport, just as sport has not impeded business. Everything coexists in inorganic but synchronised harmony. The league is more constant than the passage of sea-

sons, change of governments, equations of politics, immune to recession, inflation, and pandemic. From the subconscious it has waltzed into the waking consciousness, from summer pastime it has swung into an unshakeable obsession. It thrives in popular culture, seeps into everyday conversations, sweeps into prime time television, displaces soap eras on viewership scale, and forces film producers to keep off high-budget films from the IPL window. Even festivals could have been kept aside, had any coincided with the league. In essence, IPL defines the Indian summers. It reflects the country too, its virtues and vices, its stupefying consumerism as well as its unhindered ambition, its expansionist fervour, it's the pop event that most Indians, whatever their beliefs, circumstances, or motivations, can gather around, it caters to their sporting ideals of heroism and popularity. No cultural product unites India as IPL does

Some would say it symbolises greed—but then it has not pretended otherwise or claimed it's the reincarnation of the Mahatma. After all, it was a concept designed specifically to attract advertisers, cricket reimagined as a billboard, where everything sellable was sold, from sixes and fours, catches and breaks. The popularity is easy to configure in economic terms. The league's brand value is pegged at \$3.4 billion by Houlihan Lokey's 2024 IPL Valuation Study. Its cumulative value shot to \$16.4 billion. In the last team auction in 2022, Gujarat Titans was bought for a staggering US\$ 940 millions, which was roughly \$200 million more than the combined cost of all franchises in the inaugural edition. The costliest franchise is Mumbai Indians, worth \$ 1.3 billion, which is more than Inter Miami FC, the football club Lionel Messi turns up for and the most expensive of all MLS teams. So a league Jasprit Bumrah turns up for 10 weeks is more expensive than the one Lionel Messi appears for ten months a year.

It's the second richest television sport, after the NFL, in the world too. The media rights for the 2023-2027 blocks were dispensed for US\$ 6.1 billion a year. The annual broadcast revenues is on par with top leagues like the N.F.L. (\$10 billion a year), England's Premier League (about \$6.9 billion) and the N.B.A. (\$2.7 billion). It's the six-fold Sony had paid (\$1bn) to broadcast the first ten editions. The astonishing part is that the league has little traction outside the country or in other cricketing nations, unlike the NBA or EPL. None of the teams have any connection globally, apart from expats, but still the sums remain astronomical. The range of advertisers jostling for IPL is a vast and varied spread— a 10-second ad on television costs ?18-19 lakhs. It has veered from the soft-drink and sport-shoe staple to

endorsing dairy, women's beauty products, cooking oil and multivitamin tablets. Investments have begun to pour from overseas. American money has discovered IPL-private investment firm RedBird Capital Partners, which has stakes in Liverpool and AC Milan has acquired a 15 percent stake in Rajasthan Royals. If Americans stop by, can Saudi Arabia be far behind? On cue, Aramco, the largest oil company on earth, has hopped into the show. If the league stands as a metaphor of free-market capitalism-by a mammoth distance the most commercially successful cricketing venture ever— it functions as the democratic, even socialistic, talent spotter. It has mobilised the scouts across the cricketing map, who have unearthed uncut diamonds from unsuspecting places and fast-tracked them to sporting mainstream. Jasprit Bumrah's fragrance would have blossomed and wasted unseen; Varun Chakaravarthy could have been designing skyscrapers; Suryakumar Yadav would have retired as a domestic stalwart.

The IPL 2024 final on Sunday witnessed some unusual scenes, such as Aryan Khan, usually seen with a serious demeanor, laughing and Gauri Khan strictly monitoring and gently scolding Shah Rukh Khan whenever he took off his face mask. Actor Shah Rukh Khan greets the crowd after KKR's victory in the IPL 2024 final in Chennai, May 26, 2024. The ecosystem it has spawned is extensive and pervasive, bolstering a host of associated industries like tourism, hospitality, textile and clothing, ticketing and sporting technology. Stadiums began to hire more hands. Former cricketers were spoilt for post-retirement career choices, they could join the backroom staff, and pick the microphone or start an academy. Or perform all of these. Fantasy gambling leagues have established themselves as a parallel industry; parents are less disruptive of their children choosing sport as a career. The sport alone has seen the mushrooming of similar leagues, at the international, domestic, local and panchayat levels. Other sports copied the models with varying levels of success as well.

As significantly, its staunchest critics have stopped owing every ill in the game to the league. It is far from perfect, suffocatingly showy, but it does get along with the older siblings of the game, even exchanging tricks and tactics. It's not quite the darling of the cricket world, but it does not matter because it is arguably the most powerful (and moneyed) entity in the game. And it is just 18, just an adult, the whole youth stretched in front of it, the best days yet to be. The irony is we would be repeating these same lines on its 100th birthday too. Happy 18, but were you not an adult already? Even though it seems as though you were born yesterday.

What happened?

When Chris Gayle opened for RCB, facing a target of 210, Pollard began attempting to unsettle him from the first over. The on-field umpires, Richard Illingworth and Vineet Kulkarni, expressed their disapproval and instructed Pollard to cease his verbal exchanges. Instead of simply stopping, Pollard applied duct tape to his mouth, a gesture more commonly associated with public protests. He maintained this silent protest until he began bowling the final over of the match, at which point he removed the tape. Taping his lips was his way of indicating to the umpires that he would refrain from talking or sledging. When he needed to communicate with a teammate, Pollard briefly removed a portion of the tape, conveyed his message, and then promptly reapplied it. Harbhajan Singh, who was named Man of the Match, was asked for his opinion on the incident. "The umpire told him to stay quiet, so he wanted to ensure he put the tape on his mouth and was quiet. He is a bit of a character. He likes to do things like that. The IPL brings out the best flavors of the West Indies boys, and this was something very different and unique, which was in good taste," the off-spinner said after the match.

'Felt career was hanging by a thread, spent three weeks crying daily'

World No. 2 Iga Swiatek pulled back the curtain on her emotional struggles in a raw and revealing social media post on Monday. She opened up about the challenges she's faced in recent months— from a doping suspension to the realisation that reclaiming the World No. 1 ranking this season may be out of reach. She even admitted to enduring "three weeks of crying daily." Swiatek found herself at the center of controversy during her Indian Wells semifinal clash against 17-year-old rising star Mirra Andreeva. Frustrated after losing a point, Swiatek angrily struck a ball, which narrowly missed a ball boy. The crowd responded with loud boos, and social media erupted, accusing her of "poor sportsmanship."

Realizing the weight of the moment, Swiatek immediately apologised on court and later took to Instagram to further address the incident. "I expressed frustration in a way I'm not proud of," she admitted, clarifying that she hadn't intended to target anyone but had simply let her emotions get the best of her. She also noted making eye contact with the ball boy to express her regret. Beyond the incident, Swiatek shed light on the broader scrutiny she faces. "When I'm highly focused and don't show many emotions, I'm called a robot—inhuman. But when I express feelings or struggle, suddenly I'm labeled immature or hysterical," she pointed out. "That's not a healthy standard — especially considering that just six months ago, I felt my career was hanging by a thread, spent three weeks crying daily, and didn't want to sten on the court."

Swiatek found herself embroiled in a doping controversy last year after testing positive for the banned heart medication trimetazidine (TMZ) during an out-of-competition drug test in August. The news sent shockwaves through the tennis world, but after an investigation, the International Tennis Integrity Agency (ITIA) ruled that the positive test was unintentional—traced back to contamination in the melatonin she had been using to combat jet lag and sleep issues. "The second half of last year was extremely challenging for me, especially due to the positive doping test and how circumstances completely beyond my control took away my chance to fight for the highest sport goals at the end of the season," Swiatek wrote.

on all cylinders if it were to be a force to reckon with. The presence of England allrounder Will Jacks, South African wicketkeeper-batter Ryan Rickleton, New Zealand pacer Trent Boult, and left-arm spinner Mitchell Santner, who led New Zealand to the Champions Trophy final recently, does ensure the needed variety and depth to the squad. Post IPL, India A to play two four-day fixtures before first Test against England

With the five-match Test series against England starting soon after the Indian Premier League, India players are likely to get a minimum of two practice matches before the first Test begins at Leeds on June 20. The Indian Express understands that a shadow tour of India A will begin in the first week of June with frontline India players expected to take the trip. Post the IPL season India are set to travel to England to kick-start a new World Test Championship cycle. The five-match Test series beginning on June 20 makes it one of the earliest starts for India in the English summer with their last two Test tours mostly being played in the months of August. However, with India arriving in the early part of the English summer when the pitches will be fresh and aiding movement and on the back of a white-ball season, the India A fixtures will be their only preparation ahead of the Test series.

It is understood that India A will take on England Lions in a four-day fixture tentatively on June 4 followed by an intra-squad match before the first Test. The second India A fixture against the Lions team will happen there after. While the selectors are keen to reward the consistent performers

Shekhar Kapur calls Netflix's Adolescence 'a truly great series'; Sudhir Mishra says, 'Nobody'll let us make something like that' in India

Adding to the growing chorus of praise for the British crime drama miniseries Adolescence, Indian filmmakers Shekhar Kapur and Sudhir Mishra have also given the show heartfelt endorsements, lauding its exceptional execution. However, while praising the series, both legends lamented the constraints that prevent Indian filmmakers from pursuing similarly ambitious projects. "I'm not the first one to say this but Adolescence from Netflix redefines what a truly great series can achieve. It defies the regular 3-act structure of cause and effect and plunges you deeply into the minds of the characters and allows you to reflect upon yourself. It's next-level storytelling.

Echoing Kapur's sentiments, Mishra, in a quote tweet, observed that such bold storytelling would never be permitted in India. He argued that the only viable path for Indian filmmakers to explore this level of artistic freedom is through independent movies. "Something of our own which wanders, stops, digs and goes where the smell takes us," he noted.

Building on Mishra's point, Kapur questioned whether today's OTT platforms would allow him to make a film like Bandit Queen (1994) under the same creative conditions. He also criticised Amazon Prime Video for censoring and significantly altering Bandit Queen's OTT print without his consent. Condemning streaming platforms for their treatment of Indian filmmakers, he wondered if they would dare to impose similar changes on works by Western filmmakers.

"I wonder Sudhir Mishra if OTT platforms would let me make Bandit Queen the way I made it years ago. Bandit Queen on Amazon Prime is unrecognisable from my film. Someone has cut it beyond recognition. And yet it car-



ries my name as director. And no one asked me! Are we lesser beings than Western directors? Would they have the guts to cut a Chris Nolan film without his permission," Kapur

When Shashi Kapoor had Amitabh Bachchan's scenes removed from his film: 'I am not going to let you to do this'

Shashi Kapoor would have been 87 today if he was alive; the actor died at the age of 79 in 2017. He was among the greatest actors of his time and his pairing with Amitabh Bachchan was a fan favourite. The actor-duo collaborated on several films including Deewar, Suhaag, Roti Kapda Aur Makaan, Kabhie Kabhie, and Trishul, among others. Not just on screen, but their camaraderie was also seen off screen. The two were inseparable, and shared a great friendship. The two often spoke about each other in several of their interviews and blogs. This included a time when Amitabh Bachchan was in desperate need of money and had taken the role of an 'extra' in one of Shashi Kapoor films.

On December 6, 2017, a heartbroken Amitabh Bachchan dedicated a blog to his late friend Shashi Kapoor. In the blog he recalled, "Ismail Merchant the producer of the film called us one fine day and said there some small parts which we could do and that he would pay us Rs 50 for it. I needed the money so desperately to feed myself, I readily agreed."He explained the scene was of Shashi Kapoor's death where his body was being taken in procession for cremation. He wrote, "I was asked to be among those that formed the pall bearers along with several other junior artists in the sequence, to carry the body."

"Shashi ji was not at the shoot, obviously, but dropped by later at the location. When he saw what we



had been asked to do, he walked up to me in the crowd of mourners where I was standing as a junior artist, or the 'extra' and asked me to move. 'Don't do these bit parts' he advised, 'you are made for better things'; and then spoke to the director to delete those portions of mine from the film."He recalled, "He once came on the sets of my film Bombay Talkies made by Ismail Merchant. I asked him, 'What are you doing here?' He said he had to say this line and he would get Rs 50 for it. I said, 'Don't be silly. I am not going to allow you to do this. You are destined for better things.' He didn't like it. He wasn't too happy to lose out on the money."The friends turned family after Amitabh Bachchan's daughter Shweta married Ritu Nanda's son, Nikhil Nanda. She was the niece of Shashi Kapoor. Amitabh Bachchan often shares posts remembering his dear friend.
