Hyderabad: Once sold like hot cakes, residential properties of Hyderabad appear to have gone out of favor with property seekers these days. And the once most sought after property destination, Hyderabad has now won the dubious distinction of being the only city among major metros of the country, to have its unsold property stocks go up sharply. Across the country, the latest Anarock research highlights a promising trend of unsold inventory in the affordable housing segment (< Rs. 40 lakh) falling by 19 per cent across top seven cities in the past year, from 1.40 lakh units (Q1 2024-end) to 1.13 lakh units (Q1 2025-end).

CM Revanth reprimands Congress MLAs over poor style of functioning

New Delhi: Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath on Tuesday launched a scathing attack on the Opposition over their silence on the violence in West Bengal's Murshidabad.During the inauguration of various development projects at the Amar Senani Raja Narpati Singh Memorial site in the Hardoi district, he referred to the ongoing communal tensions in Bengal, where Hindus were attacked during protests against the Waqf Act.

CM Yogi lambasted political opponents for what he called "selective outrage" and "appeasement politics". Addressing a large gathering, the CM said, "Those who create unrest and incite violence, their only treatment is with the danda (stick). You've all seen how West Bengal is burning, yet the Chief Minister there remains silent."

He further criticised Mamata Banerjee's stance, adding, "She calls the protesters and those causing unrest 'peace bearers'. But those who deserve a danda cannot be handled with words. In the name of secularism, they have given complete freedom to the unruly elements of society.""Murshidabad has been burning for a week, yet the state government chooses to stay quiet. Such intolerance cannot be accepted in a democratic society," CM Yogi added.CM Yogi also thanked the judiciary for stepping in to ensure the safety of citizens. "I would like to express my gratitude to the court for deploying Central security forces and taking action to ensure the security of Hindus."

Turning his criticism toward Congress and the Samajwadi Party (SP), the Chief Minister said, "Congress is silent on Murshidabad; SP is silent too. These are the same people who supported the unrest in Bangladesh. It seems they would rather go to Bangladesh than stay in India; why be a burden here?"Praising the Central leadership on the Waqf Act, CM Yogi stated, "I am indebted to Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Union Home Minister Amit Shah for passing the Waqf Amendment Bill. It's a significant step to reclaim land that was forcibly taken from the poor."On Sunday, CM Yogi lashed out at his West Bengal counterpart Mamata Banerjee over the Murshidabad violence and said that the Hindus being targeted in Bengal were Dalits, who stand to gain the most from the amended Waqf Act.

Chief Minister A. Revanth Reddy has expressed discontent with Congress MLAs regarding their ineffective approach to governance and their tendency to publicly discuss party matters.During a meeting of the Congress Legislature Party (CLP) held at a hotel in Shamshabad on Tuesday, the Chief Minister emphasised that the MLAs' behavior would not be tolerated if they continued to speak freely about internal party issues. He voiced concerns about the conduct of numerous MLAs, noting that none of them were utilising social media to highlight the developmental works and welfare initiatives being carried out by the Congress government. The Chief Minister criticised the MLAs for failing to counteract negative narratives aimed at the government and pointed out that

He highlighted the long-term benefits of distributing quality rice to the people and advocated for improving the accessibility of the 'Bhu Bharati portal' for farmers.

Revanth Reddy also emphasised that the

However, the developing ountries' experience, especially India, shows a growing hare of the private sector in education. Digital education echnologies have become an integral part of modern edu ation systems across the world over the last few decades. vith the rapid evolution in teaching systems. Covid-19 has only accelerated their adoption. As the quality of educaion is increasingly tied to digital, universal access to techology has become a necessity. Therefore, public investnent in digital education technologies has become exremely critical. Most participant countries, about 133, in he Transforming Education Summit-2022 committed to naking necessary arrangements and finances for digital ducation technologies.For various reasons, State govrnments in India continue to languish in providing proper puildings and other infrastructure in public schools. Furher, they have also been unable to invest much in digital education technologies


Tiruchanur police cleverly brought back children who had run away from home.

Six platforms to remain shut for over four months at Secunderabad **Railway Station**

Hyderabad: The railway passengers arriving at the Secunderabad Railway Station are likely to face temporary inconvenience as six platforms will be closed for nearly 130 days due to the redevelopment works being carried out at brisk pace in the station. The routes of at least 60 trains were being diverted from Secunderabad to Cherlapalli, Kacheguda and Nampally railway stations. In particular, more trains will start running from Cherlapalli to decrease the load on Secunderabad railway station.

As per available information, a huge two-storied sky concourse is going to be built at the station as part of the redevelopment project. This concourse will have all the facilities for passengers, such as restaurants, kiosks, escalators, lifts, foot over bridges, etc. Plans are made to connect all the sky concourses.

A huge 500-tonnes capacity heavy-duty crane is being installed between Platform Nos. 5 and 6. For this, the gap between the platforms will be filled with sandbags and construction work will be carried out with the help of a crane.

To relieve rail passengers from this temporary inconvenience, the South Central Railway (SCR) has made arrangements to run trains from Charlapalli, Kacheguda and Hyderabad railway stations.

Two-day protest rally against Waqf Amendment Act, 2025 held

The two-day protest rally, held under the Congress party's national campaign 'Jai Bapu, Jai Bhim, Jai Samvidhan', witnessed strong participation from across communities. People joined on foot, bikes, and cars, carrying placards demanding the repeal of the Waqf Amendment Act. Amer Ali Khan said the Wagf Amendment Act was not

only a legal assault, but also a calculated political move to weaken the Muslim community. "We cannot stay silent while our protections are dismantled. Let us rise, protest, and reclaim the idea of India," he urged.

Referring to widespread poverty among Muslims, especially in Hyderabad, he raised serious questions about the effectiveness of previous government efforts. "BRS says it spent Rs 12,000 crore on minority welfare. But why are Muslims still living in poverty and miserable conditions?" he asked. He also announced a commitment to bring one lakh Muslim families living below the poverty line out of deprivation. "Why have minorities fallen so low in every sector of life?" he asked. "Is it because of government negligence, failed Muslim leadership, or our own silence? We must ask ourselves these tough questions."

Amer Ali Khan said the rally was not the end, but the beginning of a broader national campaign against the Waqf Amendment Act. ready occupied a large part of the 200 acres of government land in Survey No. 255/1 near Kuravi Gate and had tried to sell it and added that out of the remaining land , only 20 acres were occupied by the poor, who have built huts and have been living there for the past three years. He alleged that the previous BRS government also tried to demolish the huts 19 times and claimed that It filed illegal cases against 200 people and sent them to jail. The poor are living there, resisting the government's detention. After the Congress came to power, it tried to demolish them twice. The CPI(M) is warning that the government should not indulge in a conspiracy to remove the huts and bind some followers to them," he said .Wesley said that When the local MLA brought it to the attention of the current Chief Minister Revanth Reddy to issue land titles and build houses for these poor people, he assured them that steps would be taken to provide the house sites to the poor.

When the walls came down, unheard voices found their way in



For 46 years, K.Pitchaiah has clutched onto hope the way most people might hold on to a fading photograph — weathered, creased but never discarded. Now a frail septuagenarian, the farmer still makes the arduous journey to government offices to secure a patta (possession document) for a modest one-acre of land in Errasanigudem village in Telangana's Nalgonda district. Assigned to him in 1978, the land in survey number 215/3 remains his, yet the pattadar passbook — his legal entitlement — continues to elude him. For the 74-year-old, it is not a mere document; it is the key to dignity, ownership and closure. But despite changing governments, shifting policies and decades slipping by, Pitchaiah's quest continues, lost in the maze of files and official apathy.

His case is not an exception. In late 2020, Rukmini,a middle-aged resident of Edulabad village in Medchal Malkajgiri district near Hyderabad, was shocked to find that her 16 guntas of land — her only asset — no longer belonged to her, at least on paper. The Dharani portal, touted as a revolutionary land records system by the previous Bharat Rashtra Samithi government, had erroneously recorded someone else's name in her pattadar passbook. For over three years, Rukmini, who hails from a farmer's family, made rounds of sub-registrar offices, pleading for a correction. Dharani, meant to be a one-stop solution, turned into a bureaucratic nightmare. Then there was Juman Bi,a grocery shop owner in Saidabad area of Hyderabadwhose struggle was of a different nature. Coming from an economically disadvantaged background and having lost her husband a few years ago, her 14-year-old daughter's critical illness became an unmanageable financial burden. Corporate hospitals were beyond her reach, and there was no place she could turn to for the treatment of her child's neck tumour.

CM Revanth leaves for Japan to attract investments

Hyderabad, April 15 : Chief Minister A. Revanth Reddy began his trip to Japan on Tuesday night. During his weeklong visit from April 16 to 22, the Chief Minister will head an official delegation to Tokyo, Mount Fuji, Osaka and Hiroshima.As part of the visit, the Chief Minister will inaugurate the "Telangana Pavilion" at the Osaka World Expo 2025. Aiming to attract huge investments , the Chief Minister's delegation will meet with leading company managements, industrialists, and several representatives of Japan. In scheduled meetings with the prospective investors, the official team led by the Chief Minister will explain the investment prospects in Telangana and also industrial and technical cooperation offered by Telangana State to Japan companies to set up their manufacturing units in the Telangana State

We won't spare anyone, who

These are not isolated incidents, but indicative of a larger picture that defined much of Telangana's first decade as a separate State. Since its formation on June 2, 2014, thousands like Pitchaiah, Rukmini and Juman Bi found themselves adrift, with no formal channel to take their woes to the corridors of power. The then Pragati Bhavan, official residence of the Chief Minister, remained off-limits for the public. An intimidating fortress, access was restricted not just for ordinary citizens, but also elected representatives and senior bureaucrats, unless invited. It was, for most, a symbol of how far the State had moved from the people who had once fought for it. This wasn't always the case. Many remember how the same premises once echoed with the footsteps of the poor and ailing during the tenure of the late Y.S. Rajasekhara Reddy. Patients would line up with hope, and YSR would refer their cases for treatment under the Chief Minister's Relief Fund, an initiative that laid the foundation for the pioneering Rajiv Arogyasri health scheme, later emulated across the country.

Change finally came when the Congress party took the reins of the State after the last Assembly elections. One of the first decisions by Chief Minister A. Revanth Reddy was to dismantle the physical and metaphorical walls around the Jyotirao Phule Praja Bhavan (previously Pragati Bhavan). Rejecting its exclusivity, he chose not to reside there himself. Instead, the space was repurposed, to serve the very people it had once shut out. On December 8, 2023, just a day after Revanth Reddy took oath as CM, the complex reopened under a new name and purpose. Pragati Bhavan became the beating heart of Prajavani, a citizen grievance redressal platform that allows people to walk in, voice their struggles and seek support from the government. Since then, a steady stream of people - farmers, widows, the sick and ailing, the displaced - have found their way to this newly accessible hub, holding onto documents, and hope. Prajavani, literally translating to "voice of the people", has become a powerful symbol of Telangana's evolving relationship with its citizens, one that is rooted not just in governance, but in empathy. And it's working: Pitchaiah finally received his long-pending pattadar passbook, the error in Rukmini's land records was corrected, and Juman Bi secured free treatment for her daughter all within days of registering their respective complaints.Every Tuesday and Friday, the once-distant corridors of power now open their doors wide as citizens line up to submit their petitions, each a story of struggle, loss or hope. At the heart of this weekly ritual is a renewed promise: that no voice will go unheard.Each petitioner receives an acknowledgment slip bearing a unique ID, a small but significant assurance that their plea is part of an accountable process. These grievances are then routed to the relevant authorities, be it heads of departments, district collectors or mandal-level officials, based on the jurisdiction from which the grievance had been received.But the government hasn't merely built a funnel for grievances; it has also created a mechanism of response. Realising that certain departments such as Revenue and Welfare attract a heavier flow of petitions, specialised desks manned by senior officials have been set up within the complex. These are active helpdesks where officials offer immediate solutions, guidance, and, often, resolution.All grievances are recorded and updated on the Prajavani portal (prajavani.cgg.gov.in), adding a layer of transparency and efficiency that has been missing from such public systems for years. To ensure follow-through, the government has mandated the presence of top-level officials, including the State Planning Board vice-chairman holding a Cabinet rank, to promptly handle urgent or complex matters.Beyond merely receiving petitions, the initiative emphasises direct human engagement. The officials concerned interact with citizens, understand the depth of their issues and commit to a time-bound response. Help desks assist those who may struggle to articulate their problems in formal language, ensuring that technicalities do not drown out genuine voices. Recognising that not all of Telangana's citizens live within its borders, the government has also created a separate 'Pravasi Prajavani' counter for grievances related to migrant workers in the Middle East and Gulf countries. It is perhaps one of the most telling gestures of an administration trying to bridge distances, both literal and figurative.Getting to the root of issuesTo many bureaucrats, Prajavani has evolved into more than a complaint redressal platform. "It is a vital barometer of governance," says one senior official, adding, "It allows us to spot gaps, tweak policies and design better systems."One of the defining features of the programme is root cause analysis - an attempt not just to resolve the grievance at hand, but to dig deeper into why it occurred in the first place. This proactive approach feeds directly into policymaking and ensuring that services reach marginalised communities effectively. A case in point is the launch of Indira Giri Jalavikasam, a scheme specifically tailored for tribal farmers cultivating podu lands. Based on patterns in grievance data, the government realised a glaring need for irrigation support.

Amravati airport set for commercial operations from tomorrow

After years of planning and multiple delays, Amravati in Maharashtra will finally join the aviation map with scheduled commercial flights set to begin operations from Belora Airport on Wednesday, April 16.

A 72-seater plane run by Alliance Air will take off from Amravati at 11.30 am and touch down in Mumbai, situated over 690 km away, in just 1 hour and 45 minutes, marking a major step towards improved connectivity and growth in the Vidarbha region. Union Civil Aviation Minister K Ram Mohan Naidu will flag off the inaugural flight under the Ude Desh ka Aam Naagrik (UDAN) regional connectivity programme in the presence of Maharashtra Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis and other state and Civil Aviation ministry officials. According to sources, all 72 seats for the first flight were booked by Tuesday, well before the launch. The fare per person is Rs 2,100, ensuring affordable travel for a larger segment of the population.After the first flight, Alliance Air will have regular flights between Amravati and Mumbai on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. "Mumbai flights will leave at 2.30 pm and reach Amravati by 4.20 pm. The return flight will leave Amravati at 4.50 pm and arrive in Mumbai at 6.35 pm," a spokesperson for Alliance Air told The Indian Express.

Located 15 kilometers from Amravati, Belora airport is constructed by the Maharashtra Airport Development Company (MADC) to meet the air connectivity requirements of Amravati and neighbouring Vidarbha districts with a new 1,800×50 meter runway and safety features like the Precision Approach Path Indicator (PAPI).MADC vice-chairperson and Managing Director Swati Pandey inspected the facility last week and called the launch "a new era" for Maharashtra's aviation sector. "The airport was first developed in 1992 for non-scheduled operations. With UDAN funding and state support, we have transformed it into a fully operational commercial hub," she said. The airport will become a multi-purpose facility with South Asia's largest pilot training academy — Air India's Flying Training Organisation (FTO) — with 34 aircraft by the end of 2025, and the soon-to-be-completed 1,000-acre PM MITRA Mega Textile Park expected to draw global investment, create jobs, and benefit farmers, traders, and tourists through improved connectivity.

Besides trade, the airport will also increase connectivity to tourist spots such as the Melghat Wildlife Sanctuary and the Ambadevi Temple in Amravati.

Pune man booked for tearing passport pages to hide Bangkok trips at Mumbai Airport

Mumbai passenger tears off passport pages to hide Bangkok tripsThe immigration officer, while checking his passport, learnt that the passenger had arrived from Indonesia via Vietnam. During questioning, the passenger allegedly admitted to tearing out certain pages nearly a year ago to hide details of previous trips to Bangkok from his family, according to the FIR.Describing the act as illegal tampering with official travel documents, immigration authorities filed a complaint with Sahar Police Station. The man has been booked under Section 12 of the Passports Act and Section 318(4) of the Bhartiya Nyay Sanhita (BNS).

Telecom operators publish mobile network coverage maps in accordance with TRAI mandate



Hyderabad: In a landmark step toward greater transparency and consumer empowerment, mobile network coverage maps have been published by the major Telecom Service Providers (TSP). This step, after all, was brought into force by the mandate of the Telecom Regulatory Authority of India (TRAI) to aid users make informed choices regarding mobile and broadband services.

The initiative was in accordance with TRAI's revised regulations known as 'The Standards of Quality of Service of Access (Wireline and Wireless) and Broadband (Wireline and Wireless) Services Regulations, 2024 (6 of 2024)' that became effective from October 1, 2024, across the country for wireline and wireless services alike. According to the

new rules, all service providers implementing wireless access would be required to post service-wise geospatial coverage maps on their websites. These maps should clearly offer a visual representation of areas were wireless voice or broadband services could be subscribed for under a standard format issued by TRAI. The final date for publication has been set for April 1, 2025. In the spirit of common execution, TRAI directed extensive technical guidelines for format and structure of the maps via Direction no. RG-17/ (3)/2022-QoS, dated November 22, 2024. This document is accessible via the official TRAI website. In an effort to ease access, TRAI also provided the links to all operator coverage maps under the "Mobile Coverage Map" section available at its website (www.trai.gov.in) under the path: Consumer Info ? Mobile Coverage Map ? Debt, despair and the dark side of online gambling in Telangana



him ?200. It was their final conversation. Moments before his death, Sai Kiran told his grandmother he was drowning in debt.Police linked his suicide to online betting, but Laxmi isn't convinced. "At the morgue, police said his friends mentioned gaming and betting. That's what went into the report, but no one ever told me. If he had, I would have done anything to save him."Sai Kiran wasn't alone. Since 2020. Telangana has recorded 42 gambling-related deaths, eight in 2025 alone. Illegal betting spikes during IPL season, indicating a surge in market activity.Just days before Sai Kiran's death, Chenamoni Shivalingam, 28, of Thulekalan village in Telangana's Ranga Reddy district met a similar fate. On December 15 last year, he stepped out of home, doused himself in diesel, and set himself ablaze. His family managed to put out the flames and rushed him to Osmania General Hospital, but he succumbed after three days. His brother later revealed Shivalingam had been trapped in online betting, buried under debt he couldn't escape. Like Sai Kiran, Shivalingam showed no signs of struggle until it was too late. Lured by the promise of guick money, both fell into a system designed to keep players chasing losses. What seems like chance is, in reality, a rigged game where the house always wins. Illegal betting platforms use sophisticated algorithms to create an illusion of near-wins, keeping players hooked while pushing them deeper into debt.With instant loans just a click away, many don't realise the trap until they are drowning in losses. For families like Laxmi's and Ramalingam's, the realisation came too late. Their sons, once full of promise, are now just statistics in a growing crisis. As illegal betting thrives, fuelled by aggressive ads and an unchecked digital ecosystem, one question lingers: How many more lives will it claim before action is taken?Gambling addiction among Telangana's youth is rising, driven by easy access to online platforms. Once confined to matka dens, betting now requires nothing more than a smartphone, making it dangerously convenient. Diana Monteiro, a Hyderabad-based counseling psychologist who has seen a surge in young clients struggling with gambling-related debt, says: "More people are coming in with major financial stress, and it's only going to grow. The lure of fast money makes gambling seem like an easy solution."She links the problem to a digital upbringing that fosters instant gratification. "From birth. they have been exposed to quick rewards - games, social media, entertainment. Gambling operates on the same principle: thrill, anticipation, and the rush of winning. Their brains are wired to seek these highs, making addiction almost inevitable." Academic, professional and social pressures add to the problem. Many struggle to keep up chasing the latest gadgets, social status or even family expectations to earn early. Purnima Nagaraja, a psychiatrist in Hyderabad, says, "This pushes them toward quick money-making methods, and gambling becomes an easy escape."Dr. Monteiro warns of another alarming trend: Young people are bombarded with offers of instant loans - no paperwork, no questions asked. This ease of access to both gambling and quick money is a dangerous mix."The warning signs are often clear. Addicts may withdraw socially, take loans, steal money or sell valuables. "If someone constantly talks about quick money, borrows frequently or has extreme mood swings, they might be struggling. Lying to family, risking jobs or relationships, and chasing losses - these are all red flags," she says.

4 arrested for killing man with choppers in Bandra, dargah land dispute behind attack: Mumbai police

Tears brim in Edire Laxmi's bloodshot eyes as she stands outside the gate of the house where her son took his last breath. "I cannot open the door and see inside. It is too traumatic," murmurs the frail 39-year-old from Pochamma Basti, Maheswaram, about an hour's drive from Hyderabad. Unable to return home, she now stays at her mother's house in a maze of narrow lanes lined with small dwellings in the prosperous village.Inside a cluttered room filled with rice sacks, utensils and a faded calendar, Laxmi squats beside her mother, staring blankly at her phone. Memories flood in — of her quiet, brooding son, Sai Kiran, juggling three mobile phones, worrying constantly about money, and rarely meeting friends.

December 19 had started like any other day. That morning, her 21-year-old son skipped college and stayed home. "I made him breakfast and left for the farm around 9 a.m.," she says. Then came the call. Her son had set himself on fire. When she reached home, she found thick grey smoke pouring from the house, the acrid stench of burning flesh and petrol filling the air. Neighbours threw water, but inside, Sai Kiran sat still — legs stretched out, hands slightly raised, body burnt beyond recognition. Against the sootstained wall, he remained unmoving.Laxmi's mother trembles as she recalls his final words: "I have a lot of debt. I can't take it anymore," he had whispered through scorched lips.The day before, he was seen with a friend. He later stepped out to buy petrol for his motorcycle, but instead he doused himself in it and set himself ablaze.

Financial struggles weighed heavily on him. His father, a groundskeeper in Shankarpally, couldn't afford medical college, so he switched from engineering to a commerce degree in Hyderabad's Narayanguda. But money woes followed him.He persuaded his family to buy him a ?2-lakh motorcycle, promising to handle the payments. What they didn't know was that he had taken loans against it, leading to relentless calls from lenders. "I assumed it was just ?16,000 in monthly installments," Laxmi says, adding, "But later, I found out he had taken a ?1-lakh loan on it. He borrowed another ?40,000 from a friend. He never told me the full story."The debts kept piling up. Sai Kiran had borrowed 50,000, ?20,000, ?30,000 and ?15,000 from different sources to buy an iPhone and other devices. When the pressure mounted, he admitted he couldn't go on. Laxmi borrowed ?2 lakh from a village elder to clear his debts, thinking it would end there. "I told him to stop taking loans, to focus on studies, that we would get him married at the right time. But he wanted to earn. Money came and went. What was the point?"The last time his father saw him, he gave trict Inspector (DI) of schools at Kasba to protest against the state government. The office was locked, and the protesters allegedly tried to break the lock.

When police resorted to lathi-charging to make the protestors disperse, the teachers alleged that one of the officers kicked a teacher and that many of the teachers were injured. After this, DI Sanjay Chattopadhyay lodged a complaint with police, where he wrote, "This is to inform you that today (April 9) at about 12.11 pm, all of a sudden, a crowd of nearly 400-500 protestors assembled at the gate of Siksha Bhavan and started slogan saying 'Ajke DI office bhenge debo, eder jonne amader chakri geche' (Today we will break the DI office, we lost our jobs because of them) loudly, and then without any provocation, instantaneously broke the locked main gate of the campus. They rushed to the ground floor of this office and abused and attacked the working employees of the office."The complaint further read, "At that time, a few (police) tried to pacify them, but the protestors began to beat the office employees and police personnel with fists and blows and as a result, one policewoman fell down on the ground and policemen were also injured while trying to pacify the protestors. Thereafter, the protestors tried to vent out their anger by damaging the furniture of the office."

The Kasba police station filed an FIR against protesting teachers. Ritan Das was named as the IO, but after protests from people, including from some Opposition party members, the IP was changed. A senior official of Kolkata police said, "Kasba PS was told to change the name of the IO from the headquarters. Top officials of Kolkata Police are not happy with this decision."The FIR was filed under sections 190 (unlawful assembly guilty of offence committed in prosecution of common object), 191(2) (rioting), 115(2) (voluntarily causing hurt), 132 (assault or criminal force to deter public servant from discharge of his duty), 121(1) (voluntarily causing hurt or grievous hurt to deter public servant from his duty), 351(2) (criminal intimidation), and 285 (danger or obstruction in public way or line of navigation) of the BNS.

Punjab deputy commissioners list challenges as HC cracks whip on highway construction

The deputy commissioners and police chiefs of the districts in Punjab where national highways are under construction reported a range of local challenges - from land disputes and compensation issues in Sangrur and Fazilka to possession delays and negotiations in Gurdaspur, Ludhiana, and Moga. They filed the report before the Punjab and Haryana High Court last week following criticism over repeated obstructions in the construction of the Delhi-Amritsar-Katra Expressway and related highway corridors across Punjab. The court, during the hearing, directed the officials to hand over all land acquired for National Highway Authority of India (NHAI) projects without delay.Sandeep Rishi, Deputy Commissioner, reported obstruction on a 70metre stretch in Jhaneri village, where farmers objected due to lack of approach to their remaining land and low compensation. He stated a notification for the approach road would be issued within two weeks, resolving the issue.

Viraj Shayamkarn Tidke, Deputy Commissioner, said that issues across 836 metres had largely been resolved, except for five locations where farmer protests continued. He sought 20 days to clear the remaining stretches.Rahul, Deputy Commissioner, and Abhimanyu Rana, Senior Superintendent of Police (SSP), sought time until May 3 to hand over possession, citing standing crops and compensation disbursal issues. They affirmed continued efforts to support the NHAI.Dalwinderjit Singh, Deputy Commissioner, detailed ongoing work across multiple expressway packages. Hindrances stemmed from standing crops, partition-related disputes, and inadequate compensation. He reported progress following intervention meetings and sought four weeks to resolve pending issues.Himanshu

Jain, Deputy Commissioner, and Abhimanyu Rana, SSP (Rural), said around 86 per cent of land had been taken. Pending areas included stretches in Rajgarh and Kaind villages due to illegal occupation and demands for higher compensation. For the Ludhiana-Bathinda and Ludhiana-Rupnagar projects, officials cited resistance from farmer unions and ongoing arbitration as reasons for partial delays.Himanshu Aggarwal, Deputy Commissioner, reported that land in Lohian Khas, Domana, Phull, and Gudhuwal was yet to be handed over. He committed to completing the process by April 30 after crop harvesting.Amit Kumar Panchal, Deputy Commissioner, said only an 80-metre stretch in village Meera remained. The possession was delayed due to the presence of a mint plant and machines. Notices had been issued, and possession was expected within four weeks.Showkat Ahmad Parray, Deputy Commissioner, confirmed that all possession issues in the district had been resolved. Amarpreet Kaur Sandhu, Deputy Commissioner, and Varinder Singh Brar, SSP, said a 1.77-km stretch in Abohar-2 (Pakka Seed Farm) remained due to occupation by 'Gair Marusi' cultivators demanding compensation on a par with private owners. They expected to secure possession after crop harvest or through police assistance if needed.

T Benith, Deputy Commissioner, listed several meetings that were held between March 7 and 28 to resolve resistance in villages such as Badhata, Senha, and Ramgarh. The administration engaged directly with farmer unions and landowners and undertook repeated site visits to defuse opposition.Sagar Setia, Deputy Commissioner, and Ajay Gandhi, SSP, reported that 98.06 km out of 99.9 km had been handed over.

China warns Hong Kong's last major opposition party to disband, members say

HONG KONG, GNS News Agency, April 15, Five senior members of Hong Kong's Democratic Party, the city's biggest and last remaining major opposition party, say Chinese officials or middlemen have warned the parties to disband or face serious consequences, including possible arrests. The Democratic Party, which was founded in 1994 in the years before Hong Kong's historic return from British to Chinese rule, has over the past few decades been the flagship opposition party that has united the city's democratic forces to

Amid a years-long national security crackdown by China after pro-democracy protests in 2019, the Democratic Party will hold an extraordinary general meeting on April 13 to seek members' views and possibly pave the way for the group's dissolution. The group's chairman, Lo Kin-hei, has not given a concrete reason for the likely disbandment, but five senior Democratic Party members told Reuters they had been told in meetings with Chinese officials or individuals linked to Beijing in recent months that the party should close.Fred Li, a veteran democratic party member and former lawmaker, said a Chinese official had told him this should be done before this December's legislative elections."The meaning is that we should be gone by then," Li told Reuters. "The message was very direct."Li declined to identify the individual but said the tone was very different from frequent exchanges he has had with Chinese officials over many years. There were no immediate responses to requests for comment from the Hong Kong Liaison Office, China's main representative body in Hong Kong, or from the Hong Kong government. Charts showing the Pro-Democracy camp's vote share in direct Legislative Council polls and voter turnout in Hong Kong's legislative elections over time.Four other senior Democratic Party members also said they had been warned in recent months by middlemen linked to Beijing, some of whom warned the party would face "serious consequences" if it didn't disband. Three declined to be identified given the sensitivity of the matter.Yeung Sum, one of the founding members of the Democratic Party, said Beijing's move in 2021 to overhaul the city's electoral system to only allow "patriots" to run for public office had effectively marginalised the party by removing it from mainstream politics.

"We just keep a voice of advocacy for the people of Hong Kong on social and political issues, but still we are under pressure," Yeung, who was also approached by a middleman, told Reuters. Two Asian and two Western diplomats say they are aware of the veiled threats to the Democratic Party."For a long time it seemed like Beijing could

live with the situation of having the party around as a figment of opposition," said one Western envoy."It seems they are leaving nothing to chance. The message is it is time to close down once and for all," said the diplomat, who was not authorised to speak publicly. The envoys see the demise of the Democratic Party as further denting Hong Kong's international reputation amid U.S.-China geopolitical tensions. China's recent criticism of CK Hutchison's port sale to a U.S. consortium has also raised questions about the city's autonomy, they say. Founded in 1994 and led by barrister Martin Lee, the democratic Party has played a pivotal role in Hong Kong's transition from British to Chinese rule, shaping the financial hub's democratic development and civil society. Emily Lau, a former Democratic Party chairwoman, said she was saddened by the likely dissolution, as she had always believed in engagement rather than confrontation with Beijing, including a 2013 meeting with the deputy head of the Liaison Office, Li Gang."What we want is to see a safe, just and ultimately free Hong Kong," she said. Lau declined to comment on whether she'd been approached about disbanding.If the democrats disband, it would mark the end of nearly 30 years of opposition party politics in Hong Kong.

At least five democratic party members are currently in jail or held in custody under the national security law. 26/11 attacks shocked entire world; America supports India's pursuit of justice: US on Rana extradition



GNS News Agency, April 15New York/Washington: The 26/11 terror attacks shocked the entire world and America has long supported India's efforts to ensure that those responsible are brought to justice, the US has said, as Pakistani-Canadian Tahawwur Hussain Rana was extradited to India to face justice for his involvement in the Mumbai carnage.On April 9, the United States extradited Rana, 64, to India "to face justice for his role in planning the horrific 2008 Mumbai terrorist attacks," US Department of State Spokesperson Tammy Bruce said Thursday."The United States has long supported India's efforts to ensure those responsible for these attacks are brought to justice, and as President Trump has said, the United States and India will continue to work together to combat the global scourge of terrorism," she said.

Rana is in India's "possession and we are very proud of that dynamic," she said.Bruce added that some people may not remember the attacks that resulted in the tragic loss of 166 lives, including six Americans, that shocked the entire world. "I encourage you to look them up and to find out exactly how horrible this was in the importance of this situation today," she said.Earlier, a spokesperson for the US Department of Justice said in a statement to PTI that Rana's extradition is a "critical step toward seeking justice" for the victims of the heinous attacks.

The DOJ spokesperson said that the US extradited the convicted terrorist and Pakistani-Canadian citizen to stand trial in India on 10 criminal charges stemming from his alleged role in the 2008 terrorist attacks in Mumbai."Rana's extradition is a critical step toward seeking justice for the six Americans and scores of other victims who were killed in the heinous attacks," the spokesperson said. A team led by NIA authorities landed in India late Thursday with Rana who will now face justice in the country for his role and involvement in the 26/11 Mumbai attacks carried out by Pakistan based LeT terrorists. The multi-agency team from India had gone to the US and all paperwork and legalities to bring Rana back to India were completed. The hugely significant development comes just days after Rana's last-resort attempt to evade extradition to India failed after the US Supreme Court justices denied his application, moving him closer to being handed over to Indian authorities to face justice in the dastardly attacks.


Rana was lodged in the Metropolitan Detention Center in Los Angeles and had submitted an 'Emergency Application For Stay Pending Litigation of Petition For Writ of Habeas Corpus' on February 27, 2025 with Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States and Circuit Justice for the Ninth Circuit Elena Kagan. Kagan had denied the application earlier last month.Rana had then renewed his 'Emergency Application for Stay Pending Litigation of Petition for Writ of Habeas Corpus previously addressed to Justice Kagan', and requested that the renewed application be directed to US Chief Justice John Roberts.An order on the Supreme Court website had noted that Rana's renewed application has been "distributed for Conference" on April 4 and the "application" has been "referred to the Court." A notice on the Supreme Court website Monday said the application was "denied" by the court.

In his emergency application, Rana had sought a stay of his extradition and surrender to India pending litigation, asserting that if extradited to India, he will be "in danger of being subjected to torture" and "the likelihood of torture in this case is even higher though as petitioner faces acute risk as a Muslim of Pakistani origin charged in the Mumbai attacks". The application also said that his "severe medical conditions" render extradition to Indian detention facilities a "de facto" death sentence in this case. It cited medical records from July 2024 that confirm Rana has multiple "acute and life-threatening diagnoses", including multiple documented heart attacks, Parkinson's disease with cognitive decline, a mass suggestive of bladder cancer, stage 3 chronic kidney disease, and a history of chronic asthma, and multiple COVID-19 infections. Rana, a Canadian national of Pakistani origin, is known to be associated with Pakistani-American terrorist David Coleman Headley, one of the main conspirators of the 26/11 attacks.

Trump's week of tariff turmoil rings recession alarm

BEIJING/HANOI/WASHINGTON, GNS News Agency, April 15,A week of turbulence unleashed by U.S. President Donald Trump's tariffs showed little sign of easing on Friday, with financial markets again whipsawing and foreign leaders grappling with how to respond to a dismantling of the world trade order. A brief reprieve for battered stocks seen after Trump decided to pause duties for dozens of countries for 90 days quickly dissipated, as attention returned to his escalating trade war with China that has fuelled global recession fears.

Sign up here.U.S. Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent tried to assuage sceptics by telling a cabinet meeting on Thursday that more than 75 countries wanted to start trade negotiations. Trump himself expressed hope of a deal with China, the world's No.2 economy.But the uncertainty in the meantime extended of the most volatile trading since the early days of the COVID-19 pandemic.down 4%, though markets in Taiwan and Hong Kong turned positive and European stocks were set to open slightly firmer. A sell-off in government bonds which caught Trump's attention before Wednesday's pause - picked up pace on Friday with U.S. long-term borrowing costs set for their biggest weekly increase since 1982. Gold, a safe haven for investors in times of crisis, scaled a record high "Recession risk is much, much higher now than it was a couple weeks ago," said Adam Hetts, global head of multiasset at investment fund Janus Henderson.Bessent on Thursday shrugged off the renewed market turmoil and said striking deals with other countries would bring certainty. The U.S. and Vietnam have agreed to begin formal trade talks, the White House said. The Southeast Asian manufacturing hub is prepared to crack down on Chinese goods being shipped to the United States via its territory in the hope of avoiding tariffs, Reuters exclusively reported on Friday.Japanese Prime Minister Shigeru Ishiba, meanwhile, has set up a trade task force that hopes to visit Washington next week. Taiwan said it also expects to be included in the first batch of trading partners to hold talks with Washington.

Death toll from US airstrikes on Yemen's port city rises to 14

Sanaa: The death toll from US airstrikes on the Red Sea port city of Hodeidah has risen to 14, with 15 others wounded, Houthi-controlled health authorities reported. The majority of the victims were women and children, they said on Thursday, adding that the death toll increased after the badly injured died in the hospital, Xinhua news agency reported.

The tragedy occurred when US military warplanes struck homes in the Amin Muqbil residential neighbourhood, according to health authorities and local residents, who also shared video footage on social media following the airstrikes. These strikes on Hodeidah were part of a broader series of 50 US airstrikes across northern Yemen, including the capital Sanaa and the provinces of Amran, Dhamar, and Ibb, as reported by Houthi-run al-Masirah TV.Local residents said the strikes specifically targeted telephone network facilities in Amran and Ibb.It marks the latest round of US airstrikes since March 15, when the US resumed attacks aimed at deterring the Houthi group from targeting Israel following the collapse of the Gaza ceasefire deal.



Houthi drone struck a residential house in Yemen's Red Sea province of Hodeidah, a local government official told Xinhua news agency. The official, who requested anonymity, confirmed that the drone was launched by Houthi forces but missed its intended target and instead hit a civilian dwelling in Hays district of Hodeidah. "The drone attack claimed the lives of three children from a single family and left two others wounded." the official said.

CHINA DEAL?

As Trump suddenly paused his 'reciprocal' tariffs on other countries hours after they came into effect earlier this week, he ratcheted up duties on Chinese imports as punishment for Beijing's initial move to retaliate. Trump has now imposed new tariffs on Chinese goods of 145% since taking office, a White House official said. Chinese officials have been canvassing other trading partners about how to deal with the U.S. tariffs, most recently talking to counterparts in Spain, Saudi Arabia and South Africa. This map shows the percentage of reciprocal tariffs imposed by the U.S. administration on each economy. Trump told reporters at the White House he thought the United States could make a deal with China, but he reiterated his argument that Beijing had "really taken advantage" of the U.S. for a long time.

"I'm sure that we'll be able to get along very well," Trump said, adding that he respected Chinese President Xi Jinping. "In a true sense he's been a friend of mine for a long period of time, and I think that we'll end up working out something that's very good for both countries."China, which has rejected what it called threats and blackmail from Washington, restricted imports of Hollywood films, targeting one of the most high-profile American exports. The U.S. tariff pause also does not apply to duties paid by Canada and Mexico, whose goods are still subject to 25% fentanyl-related tariffs unless they comply with the U.S.-Mexico-Canada trade agreement's rules of origin. With trade hostilities persisting among the top three U.S. trade partners, Goldman Sachs estimates the probability of a recession at 45%. Even with the rollback, the overall average import duty rate imposed by the U.S. is the highest in more than a century, according to Yale University researchers. The pause also did little to soothe business leaders' worries about the fallout from Trump's trade war and its chaotic implementation: soaring costs, falling orders and snarled supply chains. One reprieve came, however, when the European Union said on Thurs-

The EU had been due to launch counter-tariffs on about 21 billion euros (\$23 billion) of U.S. imports next Tuesday in response to Trump's 25% tariffs on steel and aluminium. It is still assessing how to respond to U.S. car tariffs and the broader 10% levies that remain in place. Finance ministers from the 27-country bloc will brainstorm on Friday how to use the pause to get a trade deal with Washington and how to coordinate their efforts to handle tariffs if they do not.European authorities estimate the impact of the U.S. tariffs its economy would total 0.5% to 1.0% of GDP. Given the EU economy as a whole is forecast to grow 0.9% this year, according to the European Central Bank, the U.S. tariffs could tip the EU into recessionA table showing sectors of imported products and the corresponding estimated price increases that could result from Trump's sweeping tariffs, ranging from 10% for medical diagnostic equipment to 30% for computer parts and toys & video games.

Israel's military strikes threaten Syria's fragile political transition: UN official

United Nations: Israel's continued military strikes are threatening Syria's fragile political transition and undermining its efforts toward peace and stability, a senior UN official warned.

Briefing a Security Council meeting on Thursday, Khaled Khiari, assistant secretary-general for political and peacebuilding affairs, said that hundreds of reported Israeli airstrikes have taken place across Syria since the fall of the Assad government in December 2024, namely in the southwest, the coast, the northeast, Damascus, Hama, and Homs, Xinhua news agency reported.

On April 3, there were reports that Israel carried out multiple airstrikes in Syria, including in Damascus, the Hama military airport, and a military airport in Homs, marking one of the most extensive escalations in recent months. Simultaneous attacks in Daraa reportedly resulted in nine civilian casualties. The Israel Defence Force (IDF) has publicly confirmed it has built multiple positions in the area of separation on the Golan Heights, while Israeli officials have also spoken about the country's intentions to stay in Syria "for the foreseeable future," Khiari said. "Such facts on the ground are not easily reversed. They do threaten Syria's fragile political transition.""Syria's opportunity to stabilise after 14 years of conflict must be supported and protected, for Syrians and for Israelis," he stressed. "This is the only way regional peace and security can be realised." Jean-Pierre Lacroix, under-secretary-general for peacekeeping, also told the Security Council that the IDF currently occupies 12 positions that they established on the Bravo side, located east of the area of separation, and continues to construct countermobility obstacles along the ceasefire line, and have flown, on several occasions, aircraft across the ceasefire line and helicopters into the area of separation.

Iran's 'master negotiator' tasked with averting war

DUBAI, GNS News Agency, April 15, Abbas Araqchi, Iran's seasoned top diplomat, faces one of his most delicate challenges ever this weekend as he prepares to lead talks with the U.S. to secure a new nuclear deal and avert a military strike against the Islamic Republic.His country's clerical establishment is approaching the talks in Oman warily, sceptical of progress and suspicious of U.S. President Donald Trump, who has repeatedly threatened to bomb if no deal is reached.

Sign up here.Whether the talks are direct, as Trump says they will be, or indirect, as Tehran insists, Araqchi will be squaring off with U.S. envoy Steve Witkoff, a real estate magnate without previous experience in foreign policy - let alone of the thorny, long-running dispute over Iran's nuclear ambitions.The stakes could hardly be higher for Araqchi, the scion of an Isfahan bazaar family who joined Iran's 1979 Islamic Revolution as a teenager and fought in the 1980s Iran-Iraq war before embarking on a dazzling diplomatic career.Although there is little optimism in Tehran that the talks will go far, the political establishment appears confident in Araqchi's ability to play Iran's hand with deftness and guile.

"Araqchi is the right person in the right position at the right time," said Iran-based analyst Saeed Leylaz, who is also a political insider."He is one of the most powerful foreign ministers in the Islamic Republic's history, with full authority from the supreme leader and a deep knowledge about all aspects of the nuclear issue."Picked as foreign minister last year by new President Masoud Pezeshkian, the mild-mannered Araqchi cultivated a reputation as a master of tough negotiations when playing a key role in talks that led to a nuclear agreement in 2015.

Western diplomats involved in the talks between Iran and six world powers described him as "serious, technically knowledgeable and a straightforward diplomat". The agreement, which traded sanctions relief for curbs on Iran's uranium enrichment programme, was torn up by Trump in 2018 during his first White House term and the crippling sanctions were reimposed. Araqchi was also the point man for ultimately unsuccessful indirect talks meant to resurrect the deal during U.S. President Joe Biden's 2021-25 administration, but was replaced with an anti-Western hardliner. Soon afterwards, Araqchi was named secretary of Iran's Strategic Council on Foreign Relations - a key body advising Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei, pulling



him into the inner orbit of the country's ultimate authority.Born in Tehran in 1962 to a wealthy religious merchant family, Araqchi was only 17 when the Islamic Revolution washed over Iran and filled many of its youth with radical fervour.Inspired by the ousting of the U.S.-backed Shah's dynastic regime and the promise of a new future, he enlisted in the Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps, Iran's military vanguard, to fight in the bloody attrition of the 1980-88 war with Iraq.

After the conflict ended he joined Iran's foreign ministry in 1989 and served as ambassador in Finland from 1999-2003 and Japan from 2007-11 before becoming Foreign Ministry spokesman in 2013. He took a doctorate in politics from the University of Kent in Britain and was appointed deputy foreign minister in 2013.

A devout Muslim who staunchly believes in the ideals of the Islamic Revolution, Aragchi has served under presidents whose instincts have ranged from pragmatic to hardline. Throughout his tenure, Iran's relationship with the wider world has been partly defined by its nuclear programme - which it says is only for civilian purposes but many Western countries maintain is aimed at developing the means to build atomic bombs. His reputation in Tehran may shield him from internal criticism if Iran is forced to concede on key issues in the talks with the United States.Despite being a political insider with close ties to Khamenei, Araqchi has kept himself distant from "political frays and infighting" between factions, according to a senior Iranian official."He has good relations with the supreme leader, the Revolutionary Guards and all political factions in Iran," the official said.





Living with leopards in Mysuru



For a city recognised as a tourist destination for all seasons, Mysuru is also the gateway to famed tiger reserves and elephant sanctuaries like Bandipur and Nagarahole — both of which are just a short drive away.While the city is no stranger to wildlife, which is part of the region's identity, Mysuru was in the spotlight in recent times due to high frequency of leopard sightings in its industrial and residential localities.

It is not that leopards have suddenly made their way into Mysuru — they have long been a part of the region's landscape. But with unchecked urbanisation and the city's horizontal sprawl steadily encroaching upon their natural habitats, encounters between leopards and residents have become increasingly common. A leopard sauntered into the 350-acre campus of Infosys forcing the company employees to work from home. The Forest Department scoured the campus for almost a month, deployed its staff on a 24x7 basis to monitor the site, installed camera traps and checked for fresh pugmarks but only to draw a blank after which the search operation was disbanded.Within weeks, another leopard slipped into the woods surrounding the Reserve Bank of India' currency note printing unit. However, the leopard was not as lucky as its counterpart at Infosys, and after a few weeks of persistent effort, the forest department managed to outwit the big spotted cat and capture it much to the relief of the employees.

Leopard sighting and their capture from the industrial areas in and around Mysuru are not new, and multiple incidents - of leopard capture - have been reported from the BEML campus alone. In November 2022, a leopard sneaked into Brindavan Gardens, a popular tourist destination, and forced the authorities to close the gardens for public for a prolonged period. In addition, presence of wildlife in industrial areas such as Metagalli, Hootagalli, Belawadi, Kadakola etc have been reported in the past and is not hard to explain as these were villages surrounded by scrub vegetation. They were developed into industrial layouts only in the recent decades. And contrary to prevailing narrative it is not that leopards stray into villages or cities, but it is human intrusion in to their territory that has increased sightings and augmented conflict. Multiple incidents of leopards being captured from the BEML campus in Mysuru have been reported over the years.

Even today, scrub forests and agricultural fields extend to miles on end beyond the factory clusters. Though the habitat has eroded over the years, leopards have adapted to the changing milieu and thrived, according to forest department officials.Mysuru is about 80 km from both Bandipur and Nagarahole, but the forest boundaries are linked by stretches of scrub jungle, which in turn connect to agricultural lands with a mosaic of sugarcane fields, fallow plots, and patches of wilderness. This landscape continuity provides crucial connectivity for leopard movement and dispersal.Within the city, Chamundi Hills, designated as a reserve forest, along with its surrounding areas, also serves as a green pocket within the urban sprawl-offering cover, prey, and passage for wildlife all of which have combined to create a unique setting where humans and leopards increasingly cross paths. In addition, Chamundi Hills itself is surrounded by a landscape marked by agricultural fields and patches of wilderness that connect to reserve forests including Arabhitittu, facilitating free movement of leopards.

While the proliferation of CCTV surveillance cameras and the social media have played a role in high rate of detection of leopards and dissemination of the news, the reality is that the big spotted cats have for long lived alongside humans, silently navigating the fringes of the city.Experts and wildlife biologists have emphasised that, unlike tigers, leopards are the most adaptable of the big cats as they can survive not only in dense forests but also in agricultural fields, farmhouses, and semi-urban areas. And from the leopard's perspective, Mysuru ticks all the right boxes as it provides the perfect blend of conditions required for them to thrive. That leopard population is significant in the landscape around Mysuru is evident in the statistics provided by the forest department. According to Dr. I.B. Prabhugoud, Deputy Conservator of Forests and head of Leopard Task Force, nearly 150 leopards have been captured and translocated from Mysuru and surrounding regions in two years. The Leopard Task Force was established in January 2023 as in the preceding few months, four people were killed in leopard attacks in T. Narsipura taluk alone. And ever since it was established, the LTF has attended to nearly 2500 complaints pertaining to leopard sighting - though a majority of them could not be described as a conflict.

Though the LTF handles cases in Mysuru, Mandya, Chamarajanagar districts, out of 150 leopards that were capured till the end of March 2025, 122 of them were captured in Mysuru district. Of these, 48 were from Mysuru taluk which underlines how the landscape was suitable for leopards to survive and live cheek-by-jowl in a human-dominated landscape.But for wildlife like leopards to survive, there should be adequate prey population and Dr. Prabhugoud pointed out that livestock is their first preference, as evident in the number of complaints pertaining to cattle kills by leopards. Around the city, leopards prey on street dogs apart from poultry waste that is dumped on the city outskirts.While increase in leopard sighting heightens tension in the local community, forest department has made efforts to educate the public about leopard behaviour and the dos and don'ts that need to be complied with, to evade a conflict. The key is to stop dumping poultry and meat waste on the outskirts of the localities which draws dogs and in turn, are preyed upon by leopards. There is a surge in leopard sightings during winter as it is mating season and hence people are adised to walk in groups during dawn and dusk, which is when the leopards are most active. Farmers have been instructed to be in large groups in their fields during sugarcane harvesting which is where leopards tend to leave behind their cubs. Or the mother could be with the cubs making it susceptible to be more aggressive when it senses danger from humans. But generally, leopards tend to slither away at the sight of a crowd and hence people are advised to seek security in numbers. Keeping livestock tethered in secure enclosures is another advisory to reduce predation on domestic animals and mitigate conflict. The landscape surrounding Mysuru includes agricultural fields and reserve forests where leopards come to dwell.

While the forest department is pursuing a "capture and relocate" protocol with regard to leopards in human landscape, there is also a proposal to create an enclosure or sanctuary to house leopards captured in conflict situations.A 92-acre plot of land which is part of territorial forest at Yelwal, on the outskirts of Mysuru city, has been identified for the purpose. The facility will have a capacity to house 100 leopards and cost ?73 crore in the first phase. Though it may appear to be a practical solution, experts aver that housing leopards in confined spaces or in cages was not the way forward to redress the problem. A more realistic approach is to protect the wilderness of the city through habitat conservation, besides strengthening and securing wildlife corridors through scientific landscape management. This could be reinforced by implementing conflict mitigation strategies such as early warning system, reduction of prey animals in peripheral areas by adopting animal birth control measures for dogs, garbage management etc and nudge the leopards toward their natural habitat, rather than allow them to e lured to the city periphery due to easy availa animals.Experts believe such an approach offers a living example of co-existence with wildlife. It also represents a sustainable alternative providing a win-win situation for both humans and leopards and should be pursued, instead of locking them in cages

Trade wars benefit no one: Italian Deputy PM and Foreign Minister Antonio Tajani



Trade wars benefit no one, said Italian Deputy Prime Minister and Foreign Minister Antonio Tajani who landed in Delhi on Friday for a bilateral visit, stressing the hope that after pausing reciprocal tariffs for 90 days, the US can engage with the European Union for an agreement, and that India and the EU also conclude the BTIA this year. In a written interview to The Hindu, Mr. Tajani admitted that it would be hard to achieve the India-Middle East- Europe Corridor (IMEC)'s potential until there is peace in West Asian countries, but said Italy is keen to promote Trieste port as a hub for the trading route.My dream is to see zero tariffs! Tariffs hurt both consumers and businesses alike. We firmly believe in the power of open markets, free and fair competition, and a level playing field for all.

President Trump's decision to pause his tariffs plan for 90 days is a signal that we want to interpret positively, hoping that it will facilitate negotiations. Trade wars serve no one's interests, especially when it comes to the vital transatlantic trade relationship. Italy fully supports the European Commissioner Sefcovic's efforts to initiate a positive dialogue with the US. We are confident that through constructive negotiations, we can find mutually beneficial solutions. PM Meloni has said that she often gets asked where Italy stands- with Europe or with US. Given that Ms. Meloni even attended US President Trump's inaugural, is Italy disappointed that the US has not consulted the EU more, leading to many public differences in the past few months, including over Mr. Trump's claims on Greenland?

Italy, like India, has already built strong ties with the Trump Administration. At the same time, Italy remains steadfast in its commitment to supporting an effective dialogue between Europe and the US on key issues, from security to trade. President Trump is driving a bold agenda both domestically and internationally, which can sometimes cause friction, even with close partners like the EU. However, we have also seen a genuine willingness from Washington to collaborate with Europe. An example is the series of Quint meetings convened by Secretary of State Rubio, which I have praised as a significant step forward.We must do everything we can to prevent a transatlantic divide. Regarding President Trump's tariff policies, our approach must be one of constructive engagement, not confrontation, prioritizing open and honest dialogue with Washington. I firmly believe there is room for mutual understanding and greater reciprocity. The transatlantic relationship needs to evolve and find a new equilibrium, and I am optimistic that this process will unlock fresh opportunities for cooperation-opportunities we must be ready to embrace.

During her visit to India in February, EC President Ms. Von Der Leyen and PM Modi set a year-end deadline for the EU-India BTIA to be finalized. How likely is this, given previous delays and in what sectors could India and Italy most benefit from a trading agreement? We recognize that past negotiations have not always gone as planned, but it is undeniable that the political momentum behind the current talks is stronger than ever. The visit of the entire European Commission to New Delhi last February was a powerful signal of trust and political will directed toward the Indian leadership. The EU is determined to be a key partner to India, and there is broad consensus across Brussels and European capitals on the importance of securing a meaningful agreement. Italy fully supports the Commi sion's ef forts in these negotiations, eager to see them reach a successful conclusion.

the India-US BTA is being negotiated this year as well, would Italy and EU expect the same terms as those being offered to the US in BTA negotiations?

Every trade relationship is unique and we do not assume that what works for India and the US will automatically benefit the EU as well. In the context of ongoing negotiations, what we seek is the flexibility needed to achieve the mutually beneficial agreement we all aspire to. On our part, we are fully committed to going the extra mile to secure a meaningful and balanced EU-India trade agreement, and we are confident that our counterparts share this same determination.

Can any progress be made on IMEC between India and Italy's Trieste without peace and stability along the route between UAE, Saudi Arabia, Jordan and Israel's Haifa Port, countries that have tense ties at present?

Of course, until peace in the Middle East is established, it will be hard to achieve the full potential of the Corridor. Nevertheless, for the Italian Government, this project represents a beacon of hope. It holds the promise of acting as a catalyst for stability across the broader region. It is essential to start shaping a new vision for progress todayone that focuses on strengthening geo-economic and intermodal connectivity between Asia, the Middle East, and Europe. This is why we are offering the port of Trieste as a hub to support the "Cotton Road". Trieste is a key port in Northeast Italy, a region that leads in our economy and drives growth and innovation. Our newly appointed Special Envoy will focus on key areas, including the development of vital port, railway, and digital infrastructure, as well as securing the necessary financial support, with a strong emphasis on the EU's Global Gateway initiative. I plan to organize a Ministerial meeting with all countries part of the Cotton Road with the goal to strengthen further our cooperation!

Do you support the US's negotiations with Russia on Ukraine?

I look forward to discussing the war in Ukraine with Minister Jaishankar, we appreciate very much the role of India in fostering peace and dialogue in the international arena. We deeply appreciate Washington's efforts to foster confidence-building measures between the parties, with the ultimate goal of achieving a just and lasting peace. The Black Sea deal and the prisoners exchange were encouraging first steps, facilitated by the US, but much more goodwill is needed, particularly from Moscow. This war must come to an end, and the tragic loss of lives must stop. Achieving this requires a genuine commitment from all sides, along with good-faith negotiations and concrete actions that follow through on the agreements made.

Your visit to India comes a few months after PM Modi and PM Meloni adopted the Joint Strategic Action Plan on the side-lines of the G-20 in Brazil. How much has been done in concrete terms to take it forward since then?

Sabha: A new public space for arts and culture in Bengaluru

"With the world getting very polarised, arts and the humanities are extremely important," says Ravichandar V., explaining the raison d'être behind Sabha, a new arts and community centre in Bengaluru, which is all set to host its first open house this weekend. And it is why places like Sabha, envisioned by Ravichandar as a "privately enabled, public purpose space," with a "focus on arts, crafts and culture," are needed.

As someone who has been deeply invested in organising and promoting cultural events in the city for decades, Ravichandar firmly believes that there are simply not enough public spaces for the arts in Bengaluru. Unfortunately, it is also an area where overall philanthropic funding is traditionally low in India. "We have a lot of problems in health, education, livelihood, and so on, so understandably, the bulk of philanthropic money goes towards them," says the Bengaluru-based civic evangelist and cultural advocate, a trustee of Ammini Trust, which has spearheaded and funded this project."So, my wife and I decided that our family trust, Ammini Trust, would help create public spaces in Bengaluru for arts, crafts and conversations," he says, adding that Sabha will be primarily geared towards showcasing visual and performing arts and for artisans to display their work. "The primary motivation really was to create a public space since we don't have enough," he says. "Of course, other people are doing amazing work, but we could do much more for a city of 14 million."On a warm weekday afternoon, I visit Sabha, located on the Kamaraj Road in Shivajinagar, flanked by shops and houses, a light-filled, airy oasis of calm in the city's busy commercial hub. Ravichandar shows me around the place, highlighting the attempts to retain the original structure and repurpose already-existing material, a nod to minimal environmental impact and heritage preservation. The property, which consists of two buildings, one with a flat Madras Terrace and the other with a pitched roof, linked by a courtyard, retains its old-world charm, thanks to its carved wooden pillars, large windows and heavy doors. But there is no stinting on contemporary accoutrements, either, including a retractable platform, air conditioning, a projector screen and top-class lighting and sound systems. According to Ravichandar, the school, the first building of which was built over 160 years ago, belongs to the RBANM's Educational Charities, founded by Dharmarathnakara Rai Bahadur Arcot Narrainsawmy Mudaliar, one of the most wealthy gentry of those times. Narrainsawmy Mudaliar, a self-made man who had started his life as a vegetable trader, was deeply invested in education, especially for the less fortunate, and went on to establish many educational institutes in the city.

"His descendants continue to run these schools as nonprofits, focusing on education for the underprivileged," he says. "Among their many properties is this one on Kamaraj Road, which has now become Sabha. "

Some of the changes that were made included restoring the 160-year-old Madras Terrace of the first building, using the original construction method, and redoing the new roof of the second building to make it a performance space. The property, which has been in disuse for over 20 years, was in bad shape when the Ammini Trust took over. The wood had given way, the structures were damaged, there were a lot of leakages," recalls Ravichandar, listing some of the changes that were made, which included restoring the 160-year-old Madras Terrace of the first building, using the original construction method, redoing the new roof of the second building to make it a performance space, doing a damp proof course to prevent water seepage into the walls and raising the plinth of the building to make it flood proof. Architect Bijoy Ramachandran of Hundredhands, the same person who did BIC, was roped in to restore this property with minimum waste, he explains. "We also had a well-respected conservation consultant. Professor Rabindra Vasavada, based out of Ahmedabad, who guided us through this whole process," he says.

While Ravichandar prefers not to disclose the actual cost of the entire restoration, he does mention that restoration is around 40% more expensive than constructing a new building from scratch. However, he is also convinced that the additional expense is worth it and hopes that it will inspire more philanthropists to go down the heritage-restoration route. "I wouldn't look at it as an expensive project, but one worth investing in because the city benefits, there is this learning moment about heritage conservation and a connection between past traditions and current modernity. You cannot put a value to those things."As far as ensuring economic sustainability is concerned, Ravichandar says that they plan to cover the running costs of Sabha by "renting the place out, carefully curating this by ensuring that the people who come fit into our larger ethos," he says. Additionally, any surpluses generated will go towards bringing arts and crafts to underprivileged children. "We have built a community here of 60 kids from relatively disadvantaged backgrounds and do art classes for them," says Ravichandar.

Sabha, which was finished in March 2024 and has already hosted several events, including those that were part of the BLRHabba and Bangalore Art Weekend, is now all geared towards hosting its first open house weekend. "This

is the first time Sabha is doing its own programming," says Dipti Ramesh, Ravichandar's daughter-in-law, who has curated this event. "We decided to do a little bit of our own programming to showcase the full capacity of what Sabha has to offer."The lineup for this open house weekend, to held on April 12 and 13 from 10 am onwards, will have something for both children and adults, free of cost, including music performances, sketching sessions, talks, heritage walks, a flea market, storytelling and magic shows and a book launch by a young author. Some of the highlights include a special morning walk through the neighborhood around Kamraj Road led by Arun Pai of Bangalore Walks; a show by young magician Jayant Patwari, all of 14; a traipse through the Bangalore Cantonment area at night, led by Gully Tours; a talk about the city's temples and a performance by Susheela Raman, Sam Mills and Jeet Thayil, titled A Golden String, which delves into the prophetic words and vision of the poet William Blake. According to Dipti, two main ideas went into the programming. "We wanted to stay rooted in RBANM's value system of this being an educa-



tional space, so we wanted to keep the doors open for children," she says. Additionally, there is a lot of focus on the city of Bengaluru. "The idea was to keep us rooted in the culture of the children and the culture of heritage, and how we were placed at the juxtaposition of those two," says Dipti, who believes that while this is the first of Sabha's original programming, more such will follow.

Meet the man who made music portable: MP3 format co-inventor in Hyd

Hyderabad: Remember the times when music was downloaded, stored, and shared as MP3 files? While streaming services and newer formats have become more common, MPEG-1 Audio Layer III - popularly known as MP3 is still in use due to its compatibility, simplicity, and small file size. The mention of it brings back many memories for a lot of people, especially millennials, who used the format extensively for consuming music before gradually shifting to streaming services. One of the fathers of the revolutionary invention that made the storage of music more personal and portable, Prof. Karlheinz Brandenburg, was in Hyderabad, attending the International Conference on Acoustics, Speech, and Signal Processing (ICASSP) as one of the speakers. Speaking with Telangana Today at the event, Prof. Brandenburg shared his experience of being the co-inventor of software that changed the way the world listened to music." I still have to pinch myself to believe that our work at the Fraunhofer Institute in Germany has yielded such results and is still popular to this day," Brandenburg says, talking about the MP3 format. Talking about the future in the field of audio technologies, he says: "There is a lot

more to be discovered, a lot more to be developed, and a lot more to be invented, since sound is perceived by humans in different ways, based on different factors such as their location, noise in the background, etc."When asked about the impact of Artificial Intelligence in the fields of audio engineering and psychoacoustics, he says that at this point, AI is just one of the tools used in developing better sound solutions. On being asked where India stands in the field of audio engineering, Prof. Brandenburg stresses the importance of introducing more detailed courses on the subject at the college level in universities across the country. He believes that India has a lot of potential to become more prominent in the field of sound engineering at the global level, and that programmes like ICASSP help draw more and more youth toward the field."Youth should stick with their fields of interest even if they are not the most popular ones, and always remember to work very hard," he says when asked to give tips for young Indians interested in sound engineering.Currently, Prof. Karlheinz Brandenburg is working on intelligent headphones for super hearing with his team at Brandenburg Labs.



The issue with delimitation's population-based process

Delimitation, enshrined in Articles 82 and 170 of the Constitution of India, has stirred unprecedented passions that have taken shape in both serious and ludicrous ways. The serious ones stem from what the Constitution provides and its possible implications if implemented as provided. The ludicrous ones include calls by some who are asking people to 'multiply' rapidly to deal with the fear of being outnumbered..

As passions run high, there is a need to look at the issues dispassionately. Ironically, those who had hitherto accused the government of flouting constitutional principles, now want that the government does not act in accordance with the Constitution. Are the 'protectors of the Constitution' chasing their tail in asking for the 'freezing' or 'postponing' the delimitation exercise for sound reasons?The Constitution provides that "upon the completion of each census, the allocation of seats in the House of the People to the States and the division of each State into territorial constituencies shall be readjusted". A similar provision exists for the Vidhan Sabhas. Through the 42nd and subsequent amendments, this 'readjustment' was deferred till 2026. The Census after that will be the basis of any future delimitation, which has also caused much apprehension in the southern States. There is little evidence to justify their apprehensions but there is no reason to dismiss their fear.

There is heated debate, justifiably so, on the principle of population proportionality and federalism and whether any principle enshrined in the Constitution should be used to undermine the other. It is clear that a mathematical approach to delimitation and allocation of seats based on population alone will benefit States where population growth has been faster than the rest.

The data published by the Election Commission of India show that in the first general election in 1951-52 there were 489 Lok Sabha seats; 494 in 1957, and 520 in 1967 (as per the Delimitation Commission's Report of March 21, 1963 based on the 1961 Census). Thirty-one seats were added and five reduced from the previous election. Andhra Pradesh went down from 43 to 41, Madras, 41 to 39, and Uttar Pradesh, 86 to 85. Assam, Maharashtra, Gujarat, Kerala, Mysore, Rajasthan, West Bengal, Delhi, Himachal Pradesh made gains. Besides, seats were added in new States such as Haryana, Jammu and Kashmir, Nagaland, Andaman and Nicobar Islands, Chandigarh, Dadra and Nagar Haveli, Goa, Daman and Diu, Lakshadweep and Pondicherry. In the 1971 Lok Sabha election, two seats were reduced in Himachal Pradesh bringing the total to 518. In the 1977 election, 24 seats were added, taking the number to 542. Andhra Pradesh, Bihar, Maharashtra, Gujarat, Kerala, Madhya Pradesh, Karnataka (erstwhile Mysore), Orissa, Rajasthan, West Bengal and Haryana made gains, and new States such as Sikkim, Arunachal Pradesh, Meghalaya, and Mizoram got additional seats. Daman and Diu was allotted a separate seat much later to take the total to 543 — which is the current strength of the Lok Sabha based on the 1971 Census.An analysis of these trends suggests that any debate on delimitation must consider three issues: the principle of population as the basis of allocation of seats; the impact of public policy on the population criterion, and the 'representative' hue of those who are elected.

The increase in the number of seats between 1951

is divided by the number of Lok Sabha/Vidhan Sabhas seats, the average goes up from 7.32 lakh per seat in 1951 to about 8.70 lakh in 1967, and 10.10 lakh in 1977. In 2024, this is about 27 lakh per Lok Sabha seat. Similarly, the number of Vidhan Sabha seats have increased from 3.283 in 1951-52 to 4,123 in 2024, tripling the average population that a Vidhan Sabhas member represents. Going by the nearly 98 crore electors in the 2024 general election, each Member of Parliament on an average represented about 18 lakh electors; Lakshadweep had 57,760 electors and Malkajgiri 29.5 lakh. This shows that while population was chosen as the primary principle of representation, it has not been followed without accommodating other concerns such as geographical contiguity and political boundaries. The Census-based population criterion was the only basis that had no qualifications attached, unlike in the past where voting rights were based on religion and educational background. It was the simplest criterion to ensure universal franchise and one vote, one value. Is the criterion so sacred that it does not permit any adjustment based on current circumstances to avoid fissures in our polity, creating distortions in the representative federal character of the Parliament, and the feeling of regional injustice? After all, the Finance Commission, set up every five years, keeps modifying its criteria for financial allocation and devolution based on changing reality, regional aspirations and national priori-

The question that also needs to be debated is this: "what does it mean to 'represent' a constituency"? The Lok Sabha/Vidhan Sabhas are essentially law-making bodies and the representative weight of the elected person does not change because of the number of people in the constituency. Also, the constituency size does not influence the other functions that elected representatives perform namely asking questions or being a part of various House committees. There are no surveys to show that a smaller constituency is better represented than a larger one. For example, let us evaluate how the people of the tenth parliament constituency created in Haryana in 1977, or the Daman and Diu constituency benefited because of having a Member of Parliament represent them in the Lok Sabha? Or whether in Haryana, Narnaul Assembly segment with 1.6 lakh voters is better served by its elected representative than Badshahpur with 5.2 lakh electors. In the first-pastthe-post system, numerical strength of the constituency is immaterial to 'representativeness'. Moreover, how many times do citizens need the Lok Sabha/Vidhan Sabha representative to deal with day-to-day problems? The importance of population as the primary criterion needs moderation because the population control policy was promoted by the central government. Raghavendra (name changed), 73, is part of around six WhatsApp groups for the elderly. An electrical engineer who spent more than 30 years in Mumbai, he moved to Bengaluru post-retirement to live with his daughter. In a city of 1.4 crore people, the septuagenarian was starting to feel lonely given his daughter's busy work schedule and his wife's demise eight years ago. Then, he found his tribe online. "They get me a cake for Christmas. I get Tirupati laddus for them. We are all now planning a trip together to Vietnam," says a very cheerful Raghavendra, during a meetup held by Sukoon Unlimited, a city-based start-up building a community for seniors.

Research on longevity has been receiving unprecedented attention across the world. In 2024, the Indian Institute of Science (IISc) announced the launch of the Longevity India Initiative, a project focused on efforts to extend human 'health span' and combat ageing-related challenges. Maverick millionaires like Bryan Johnson have even been attempting anti-ageing experiments.But the elderly in India have been at an interesting, or rather puzzling, cross-section. With social structures changing and families shrinking to nuclear, how to productively use the silver years without feeling isolated and not burdening others has been a question troubling many lately.

Age-tech, a new and emerging sector, hopes to answer this question with the help of technology and ease the problems of people like Raghavendra.Neeraj Sagar, founder of Wisdom Circle, started an online group of age-tech founders in India about two years ago. The group had its first offline meetup last year in Bengaluru where almost 40 founders showed up."In a year that number has become 100," says Sagar. According to estimates, India currently has about 15 crore senior citizens (people above 60 years), a number which is expected to more than double to 32 crore by 2050. A changing demography means the average age going up and the market needs shifting, prodding entrepreneurs to be early movers in the space. From physical health to emotional well-being to cognitive skills to the employability of seniors, age-tech start-ups attempt to address a spectrum of challenges faced by seniors. In 2022, WHO revealed that 1 in 4 older people experience social isolation, seriously impacting their health and longevity, with effects on mortality comparable to smoking, and obesity. Vibha Singal, founder of Sukoon Unlimited, points out that people with ageing parents often give importance to the latter's physical health and financial and logistical needs, but are not always in a position to help them with their emotional wellbeing.

"When a person is 60, their kids are between the age of 30 and 40 trying to build their own families and careers."There is also a growing segment of elders who are financially independent and prefer being on their own rather than moving in with their children or uprooting their lives to a different place, Singal notes. "We see if we can help the parents beat loneliness so that they age slower. Finding purpose and community are the fulcrums to beating loneliness. That's what Sukoon is out to do."Started in 2024, Sukoon, according to Singal, is India's first platform for seniors by seniors offering services such as emotional support, counselling, group therapies, volunteering opportunities, and concierge services. tance to marry, and loss of spouse. The company has also invested in a proprietary AI tool which can respond in more than 100 languages. Singhal notes that more than 65% of the community members talk to it. There have been instances of users talking to it like a friend, naming it and even spending hours with it.

Miranda's concerns are shared by many. Neeraj Sagar of Wisdom Circle notes that not only is there a significant population who prefer to work even after retiring from their permanent roles, but also quite a few companies who are looking to tap into the experience of the elderly.Wisdom Circle, which helps retired professionals find employment opportunities, has been around for three years now. Around 95,000 people and 1,500 companies have registered on the platform which has listed about 2,500 roles. According to Sagar, the demand mostly comes from small and medium businesses and start-ups who are looking to hire specialists for a few days of the week. As far as the elders are concerned, he says, there is a lot more openness to hybrid roles.But what motivates people to continue working postretirement? Is it the money or is it something more?"Money is important to everyone, not always to meet the financial ends, but to feel valued," says Sagar.

It's often a bid to continue to feel respected and relevant, backed by the impulse to impart the skills they have acquired over a lifetime and give back to society."What we are observing is that people who are worth way more are applying for roles that are not paying them as much. So, staying relevant takes priority over getting paid highly. We are also seeing a lot of people apply to nonprofit roles which pay lesser."Keeping the brain sharpIn 2023, a study by Jinkook Lee and others showed that more than 80 lakh Indians suffer from dementia. As the Indian population looks at an increased lifespan and the elderly population is estimated to be 20% of the total population by 2050, the burden of neurodegenerative diseases is also high."Typically, when somebody in your family reports having memory issues, you just brush it off as something normal with ageing," points out Issac John, cofounder of cognitive health start-up Ivory. "But ways to assess if it is normal ageing or accelerated ageing is still not prevalent India."Co-founded by John and Rahul Krishnan, Ivory offers neuroscience-backed assessments that claim to help keep the brain sharp and identify neurodegenerative risks early. The duo who up-close witnessed close relatives suffering from neurodegenerative diseases wanted to build a differentiated product for the segment aged above 45 years.

The users first take a simple assessment which tells them their cognitive age. People who are found at risk are suggested to take up a clinical grade assessment."We work very closely with the medium and high-risk customers, get them to do a health and lifestyle profiling and recommend things that they need to change in their life, along with a personalized cognitive brain training session available for them on the app," John explains. The app currently has about 30,000 users with two-third of them females and 60% from tier-1 cities.Easy on the kneesWhen it comes to physical health, orthopaedics forms a crucial need for the elderly. Statistics show that around 50% of the senior population need assistance with basic tasks like sit-to-stand."In the larger scheme of things, the inability to carry out this function by yourself has two implications. Apart from the physical exhaustion and the strain, there is the risk that if you do not perform it safely, you could either fall into or out of the chair and end up injuring yourself," notes Sanchit Jhunjhunwala, co-founder at Translead Medtech, a deeptech spin-off from IISc, Bengaluru."This also leads to a hesitation to participate socially, culturally and economically. Behind the scenes of India's 73year-old travelling Gemini circus

"Do you know the Kamal film Apoorva Sagodharargal? He shot it at our theatre. With us. It was magical," says Lakshmanan Chakyiath, the 77-year-old production manager of Gemini Circus. Referencing this 1989 tragic Tamil classic set in the contrastingly exuberant world of a circus, Lakshmanan launches into a long conversation about the history of one of India's oldest modern circuses which began in Billimoria, Gujarat in 1951. But this story of the likes of former Prime Ministers Jawaharlal Nehru, Indira Gandhi and Atal Bihari Vajpayee having watched the performances is one that has been oft-repeatedThe more fascinating tale is that of its people. Composed of many different physical attributes, the circus folks of Gemini have worked and trained with this company for years, beginning usually as little clowns and working their way up the ladder, sometimes quite literally, to perform stunts and become heroes of wideeyed young children who watch the two-hour long shows in utter rapture.We meet artists who hang from the pinnacle of the circus tents, form human pyramids and pedal cycles with their hands, to tell you their story.

The popular phrase 'joint at the hip' needs to be modified to fit Asmani (30) and Yaseen (25), two Swahili-speaking Tanzanians who have been part of the Gemini circus for a year now. These two acrobats who stun audiences with audacious stunts are joint at the head instead."I joined the circus when I was seven," says Asmani who is from Kilimanjaro. "I was 10," chimes in Yaseen from Zanzibar. Both these young acrobats would do flips and gymnastics to elicit claps from friends and neighbours. When the call to join a touring circus company arrived, the two jumped at the opportunity as it meant helping the family out financially."Tanzania did not have these big circuses. We would instead go as a group, performing fire dances, bamboo dances and other conventional acts at hotels to entertain tourists who'd arrive from different parts of the world. We learnt to do acrobatics by experimenting around each other. It was fun in the beginning. Now, it is a job like any other," says Yaseen who is more comfortable speaking in English than Asmani is.

As part of its six member crew that continues to do fire dances and pyramids at the circus, Asmani says that it is the joy they see on people's faces that keeps them going. They have travelled to England, Scotland and India for their performances and enjoy being in London and Liverpool the most because they find pockets of home in the land of their colonisers. "Many come up to us and want to take selfies. They want to touch our hair. It is amusing," says Yaseen.Asmani wants to go home and begin a hardware store. Yaseen is into fashion and would like to set up a busi-



ness selling "beautiful shoes to the ladies". Until then, the selfies will have to do.

Arthi Matho, a 40-year-old cycle stunt artiste from West Bengal is one of the senior-most woman performers in Gemini circus and is well-respected for her politeness."When I joined the circus, I was five. I was reluctant to leave my home and parents. But circumstances were dire at home and I had no choice. When I saw my father leave, I was actually sad. But five minutes later, I encountered lions and monkeys at the circus. I completely forgot everything else. The circus has been my life since," she says.Arthi does not intend to make these statements seem grand. She is just as sincere about them as she is about the cycle she performs tricks on. When she is on stage, she says that she feels a firecracker burst inside her. The energy of the stage is something she truly cherishes. Arthi has travelled across India for her performances but is in love with Kerala as she likes the greenery. It is also very walkable and the crowds are sweet, she says.She says that her son who has just finished his Class X exams is in Chennai for his break and to watch his mother perform. "Life has been on the road so he must travel to me. It is difficult but I know no other life," she says.

This loving couple that met at the circus, is up at 6am each day to ensure that the dangerous stunts they do land well. "I am concerned for both our safety so practice is key," says Bikram (40) from Assam's Mojai region. This flying trapeze artiste spends much of his time high up by the 'big top' of the cylindrical tent jumping from bars suspended at the top and being caught mid-air. No single performance scares him though as he has been training since he was 10 years old. "When I was young, the circus was a whole world of possibilities. The lights, music, the public and animals. What more could a child want? I was in wonderland," he says. " Both the service providers and service takers are

Drop the piecemeal ways to social security for workers

India's efforts to establish social security for online (appbased) gig workers are gaining momentum, with the central scheme awaiting Cabinet approval. Benefits announced include health coverage under Ayushman Bharat, registration on the eShram portal for access to various social security schemes, and a transaction-based pension policy, where a universal account number assigned to each gig worker helps track their earnings across platforms for deductions and company contributions. This pension scheme is particularly notable because, in a way, it acknowledges that gig workers (operating outside traditional employeeemployer relationships) can have multiple employers, and ensures that each contributes, albeit in a limited capacity, towards worker welfare. In a country where social security is typically tethered to formal employment and informal workers are excluded or otherwise disadvantaged, this is clearly a step forward. However, this progress highlights the reactive nature of current social protection systems which tend to respond only when new worker categories emerge. This underscores the need for India to proactively reimagine its social security framework to address these evolving challenges

Despite being a founding member of the International Labour Organisation (ILO), India is yet to ratify the Social Security (Minimum Standards) Convention, 1952 (No. 102), the ILO's Convention aimed at establishing basic social security principles. India's Code on Social Security (Code), one of its four new Labour Codes, enacted nearly 70 years after the 102 Convention, intends to provide a comprehensive framework for social protection. But it has faced significant criticism for its ambiguous definitions, watered down protections, and on-going implementation challenges. One of the Code's most prominent features is its insistence on relying on welfare boards for the distribution of social welfare — a process that has long been found falling short of its intended goals. For instance, a recent Right To Information petition showed that Welfare Boards for Building and Other Construction Workers of various States were yet to use ?70,744.16 crore worth of cess they had collected from employers for the welfare of workers. In another instance, a Comptroller and Auditor General (CAG) 2024 report found that 99 local bodies in 10 districts had delayed remittance



payments to the Tamil Nadu Construction Workers Welfare Board (TNCWWB), amounting to ?221.8 crore. Even in Kerala, with its strong thrust on worker welfare, only five out of its 16 boards were found to function effectively, with some boards (as per 2016-17 data) not reporting any beneficiaries at all. This has led to repeated calls from activists and advocacy groups for improvements in the management and the functioning of welfare boards. One of the main arguments in favour of India's fragmented, welfare-board run social welfare systems is its ability to provide targeted relief to segments of workers in need - for example, beedi and cigarette workers of Karnataka have sought the revival of a defunct welfare fund to deal with their welfare woes. Today it is the gig worker; but new worker categories are bound to emerge with advancements in technology or other forces of disruption.So, relying on a piecemeal approach as opposed to a combination of universal social protection and targeted support - can fail to account for the precarious nature of all informal work. Such an approach could also create artificial distinctions between different types of informal work such as between gig work and domestic work, and in turn impose arbitrary thresholds on who is deserving of social protection, and who is not.It is also risky to assume that focusing on just one worker segment will automatically solve the challenge of formalising informal labour. Because right now, there is understandably growing excitement about how gig work will employ more people in the future. But banking on it as a solution to formalising informal labour is overly optimistic.

Early screening for gestational diabetes can ensure healthy and happy future for mother and child

This World Health Day (April 7) the World Health Organization (WHO) in its wisdom, has chosen an apt theme: Healthy Beginnings, Hopeful Futures. As diabetologists, we have, for decades, been propounding the theory of primordial prevention, or preventing diabetes in the womb itself, in order to ensure a happy and healthy future for both the mother and the baby. We see the WHO's choice of theme for this World Health Day as a vindication of the work and advocacy campaigns we have undertaken towards this goal. Diabetes has long been a silent epidemic, affecting millions worldwide, but its roots often lie much earlier than commonly recognised. Gestational diabetes mellitus (GDM) is a high risk for type 2 diabetes in mothers and metabolic disorders in children. GDM is usually diagnosed between 24 to 28 weeks of pregnancy. However, current evidence also points to the ability to prevent its onset during the first trimester or even earlier, and its impacts on both the mother and the child are profound and lasting.

Research in the growing body underlines that maternal glucose levels should be carefully regulated as early as the eighth week of pregnancy. An early intervention that would help prevent foetal hyperinsulinemia, a metabolic disturbance that occurs in the 11th week, might avoid this and reduce the risk of the child developing diabetes and other non-communicable diseases (NCDs) later in life. Given India's recent burgeoning diabetes burden, this matter needs immediate attention from the medical community and policymakers.Existing GDM management is based on screening in the second trimester and commencing treatment. Nevertheless, it may be too late. Maternal hyperglycemia in the first trimester appears to program the child's foetal metabolism, increasing the risk that the child will be obese and insulin-resistant or develop diabetes later in life.Leading endocrinologists concur that glucose intolerance

should be screened much earlier-at about the eighth week of pregnancy. Reasonable justification exists because, by the 24-week time point in GDM, the foetus has been exposed to excessive glucose for months. This results inexcessive foetal insulin production, which can lead to lifelong metabolic disorders. The "Foetal Origin of Adult Diseases" (Barker's Hypothesis) suggests that conditions during gestation will affect the child's health over the long term. Early in development, if a foetus is exposed to high blood alucose levels, the programming will be to store more fat. resist insulin, and form metabolic disorders later in life. As a result, researchers have called for a rethink of prenatal care, with glucose control as a primary concern right from the start of pregnancy. Our aim is not only to deal with diabetes in pregnancy but to prevent it before it starts, as stated earlier, through a policy called primordial prevention. The goal of primordial prevention is to prevent diabetes from ever developing in the first place and decrease risk factors before they occur. To mitigate these risks, a new model of early GDM intervention has been proposed, focusing on a key eight-point agenda. These include: Firstly, glucose testing by eight weeks of pregnancy. That way, anything potentially wrong could be picked up before it starts harming the development of the unborn.

Secondly, doing so will prevent foetal hyperinsulinemia, and no long-term hypoglycemia (low sugar levels) is observed. If the 10-week glucose control of postprandial blood sugar remains below 110 mg/dL, metabolic risks will be limited. In case the post prandial blood sugar levels are over 110 mg/dL, medical nutrition therapy and low-dose metformin (250 mg twice daily) can halt the rise of glucose to prevent the development of GDM later in pregnancy. There is clinical evidence that this strategy has been effective in preventing GDM in the third trimester with less probability. It



further prevents the necessity of insulin therapy since it is at this stage that GDM is mostly diagnosed.

Currently, India has more than seventy-seven million people with diabetes, and the numbers are increasing. It is pretty alarming that about 20% of pregnant moms in India develop GDM, exposing both the mothers and their offspring to long-term health burdens related to metabolic disease. One reason this is so is because the maternal care checklists and prenatal care guidelines remain anchored to traditional screening times. There are several issues which are prevalent only in India that make early intervention all the more important. Lack of early care: The majority of women of Indian origin do not go for antenatal checkups until the second trimester, thereby missing the screening period. Indian women are more vulnerable to insulin resistance and diabetes profile than any other racial group. Therefore, colourful efforts should be made in early diagnosis and intervention. Not only patients but also healthcare providers lack sufficient knowledge of first-trimester hyperglycemia and its possible consequences. Therefore, the development of the early GDM screening and intervention policy across the country is now absolutely critical.Diabetologists have lately urged early detection and intervention of blood glucose levels. While concluding the 18th Annual Conference of Diabetes in Pregnancy Study Group India (DIPSI 2024), the delegates and experts stressed on the following points: Risk modification through the pre-conception period concerns dietary control, exercise, and preventive medication before conception; Long-term monitoring of blood glucose levels in high-risk pregnant mothers to trace glucose levels throughout pregnancy.Some measures are recommended in the national guidelines to implement them and standardise the care in India.

The facts regarding the matter are evident and vividtimely interventions are well capable of eradicating lifetimelong complications regarding the health of both the mother and the child. To ensure that this new approach works, there is a need for a new conceptualisation of maternal care involving all the stakeholders, including the care providers, policymakers, and the general public. Key steps include: Developing educational programmes to encourage healthcare providers in primary and remote areas to use early glucose screening; changing the guidelines for pregnancy care across all the states and territories to provide glucose screening by the eighth week. Making all tests and treatment accessible and affordable for the mother and the foetus is another key recommendation. Diabetes prevention starts even in the womb. Consequently, the first eight weeks of pregnancy pose a critical period that we have no reason to disregard. However, by moving to early screening and testing, glycemic control, and early interventions, we can stop the cycle of diabetes development. Since diabetes is a major emerging epidemic in India, adapting this standard of maternal care for the country is no longer a choice; it is a must. If allowed to fight diabetes, we should do it right from the roots, or in this case, from the womb

RRI scientists develop affordable device for preliminary screening of sickle cell disease



Scientists at Raman Research Institute (RRI) have developed an affordable electro-fluidic device that aids in preliminary screening of Sickle Cell Disease (SCD).According to RRI, the innovative, cost-effective electro-fluidic micropore device, quantifies whole-cell stiffness with high-resolution and high-throughput, with specific focus on screening for SCD.

"This technology has the potential to change preliminary diagnostic methods for blood disorders," RRI said.Gautam Soni, S. Kaushik, and A. Mishra from the Soft Condensed Matter Theme at RRI, Bengaluru developed this device and R. Ross, S. Srivastava, and C. R. Ross from St. Johns Medical College Hospital, Bengaluru helped with testing the device on real-world samples by comparing blood cells from SCD patients to that of healthy donors."This new technology makes high-resolution measurement on changes in RBC physiology and cell stiffness and connects it to the underlying disease-state" said Gautam Soni, Lead Investigator.RRI said that the researchers were able to create a system that effectively differentiates SCD and healthy donor RBCs, due to differences in their inherent stiffness with high precision."They studied the samples in free-flight and constricted-flight modes to measure cell volume and stiffness, respectively. They used Latrunculin A (an actin inhibitor, that reduces cell stiffness) treated RBCs, to first guantify the correlation between flight time in the micropore and cellular stiffness," RRI said. Using the above methodology, they showed that their device allows for the rapid alternative detection of mechanical abnormalities in RBCs and hence, can act as a preliminary screening device for multiple blood conditions"The portability and cost-efficiency of the device would make it an attractive option for massscreening leading to early detection of SCD in both rural and urban areas of the country," RRI said.It further said whole cell stiffness, being a ubiquitous parameter for cell's health, may be applied beyond SCD screening, such as, in areas of tumor cell detection and veterinary blood disorders."The device principle has possible non-medical applications as well, for example, in improving the hydrogel materials used in drug delivery systems," RRI said.

Understanding what drives the fascination for fairness and skin lightening

The debate over how the preference for fair skin impacts on those who are a darker shade was alive recently, after Kerala's Chief Secretary Sarala Muraleedharan called out colour and gender bias. Across much of the world, and particularly in India, skin colour remains quietly powerful - shaping ideas of beauty, respectability, and even social mobility. In this environment, the desire for lighter skin has fuelled a booming market of creams and combinations, many of which are not only ineffective, but actively harmful.

But understanding this trend — and challenging it requires more than dermatological guidance. It calls for an interdisciplinary approach, one that draws on anthropology to trace the cultural roots of colourism, and on dermatology to address its consequences.Between evolution and meaningHuman skin colour is, in evolutionary terms, a remarkable adaptation. Populations in equatorial zones developed more melanin to protect against ultraviolet radiation, while those further from the equator evolved lighter pigmentation to aid in vitamin D synthesis.Yet over time, skin tone came to signify more than just geography. As S. Sumathi, Professor Emeritus of Anthropology at the University of Madras, explains, "The idea of colour has historically been linked to opposites - fair and dark, good and bad. These dualities became part of how communities organised themselves socially." In the Indian context, she notes, these ideas were reinforced by colonial rule and social hierarchies Early British ethnographers classified populations based on skin tone and other features, embedding a value system that persists subtly to this day. "Fairness gradually came to be associated with refinement, aspiration, even moral character," she says. "Unfortunately, those perceptions were absorbed across communities and continue to influence how we see ourselves and each other."The quiet cost of fairnessWhile cultural beliefs sustain the demand for lighter skin, dermatologists are increasingly concerned with the health risks that follow.Ramesh Bhat, head of research at Father Muller Medical College and former International Director (2019-2024) of the International League of Dermatological Societies (ILDS), has been witnessing a steady rise in patients suffering from the misuse of topical corticosteroids - powerful prescription drugs intended for con-



ditions like eczema or psoriasis. "These are Schedule H medications, meant to be used under medical supervision," he explains. "But they're often sold over the counter or even used in salons, particularly for skin lightening."

The consequences can be serious. "Prolonged use leads to thinning of the skin, acne, infections, and uneven pigmentation sometimes worsening the very issues people are trying to treat," says Prof. Bhat. Even more concerning is the growing trend of combination creams, which blend steroids with antifungals or bleaching agents. "These irrational mixes not only damage the skin but also promote resistance, especially to fungal treatments."Longterm misuse can also affect internal systems. "We've seen cases where extended use leads to elevated blood sugar, high blood pressure, and suppression of adrenal function," he warns. "It's a quiet but growing public health concern — rooted not just in access, but in aspiration."Global industry, a local psychology Across Asia, Africa, and Latin America, fairness continues to be marketed as desirable - often as a symbol of progress or modernity. In India, those messages are reinforced through advertising, films, and matrimonial listings. "Even today, fairness is casually equated with success and desirability," says Prof. Sumathi. "It's internalised from a very young age, especially among girls. But increasingly, boys are not immune either."At the same time, skin tone plays a different role in how masculinity is constructed. "Dark skin is sometimes culturally coded as rugged, strong, or masculine - especially in film and popular culture," she notes. "But that doesn't offer immunity. These stereotypes also box men into narrow roles and exclude those who don't fit the mould." While women are often pressured to lighten their skin to appear delicate or refined, men may feel compelled to embody a darker, hypermasculine ideal - leaving little room for nuance, choice, or vulnerability.

metic — it's socially symbolic. "It becomes a way to navigate society. Lighter skin is seen as an asset in work, in relationships, in everyday interactions," Prof. Sumathi explains. "That's why changing these attitudes isn't just about products, but about perception."

India's MMR comparison to Nigeria unfair, says Health Ministry



Comparing India's Maternal Mortality Ratio (MMR) to Nigeria is unfair, the Union Health Ministry said on Wednesday, while reacting to the recently released United Nations Maternal Mortality Estimation Inter-Agency Group (MMEIG) report titled 'Trends in maternal mortality 2000-2023', which has indicated that India has made significant strides in reducing MMR but it registered 19,000 maternal deaths in 2023 contributing almost 7.2% to global mortality.

The biggest contributor was Nigeria (28.7%), followed by India and the Democratic Republic of Congo (7.2%), and then, Pakistan (4.1%). "The comparison is not entirely fair when considering the total populations of the two countries (Nigeria: 23.26 crore, India: 145 crore)," said the Ministry, in its statement. India has made significant strides in reducing MMR going from 103 per lakh live births to 80 per lakh The MMR of India has now declined by compared to the global reduction of 48% over the past 33 vears from 1990 to 2023. Also, the number of estimated maternal deaths in India has also reduced from 24,000 to 19,000, states the report. However, India is still contributing 7.2% (19,000) of total maternal deaths worldwide, ranking second after Nigeria, which has 75,000 maternal deaths, it adds.The MMEIG comprises World Health Organisation (WHO), the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), the World Bank Group and the United Nations Department of Economic and Social Affairs and Population Division (UNDESA/Population Division). In collaboration with technical experts, they developed global, regional and country-level maternal mortality estimates for the period 2000 to 2023. Maternal mortality rate is defined by the WHO as the death of a woman while pregnant or within 42 days of termination of pregnancy, from any cause related to or aggravated by the pregnancy or its management, but not from accidental or other causes. "It's a crucial metric to track the progress of maternal health and identify areas for improvement in healthcare systems," it notes. The report adds that every day in 2023, over 700 women died from preventable causes related to pregnancy and childbirth - meaning that approximately one woman is dying every two minutes. Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) target 3.1 is to reduce maternal mortality to less than 70 maternal deaths per 100,000 live births by 2030.

Non alcoholic fatty liver disease on the rise, Apollo Health of Nation report

Hyderabad: Cases of non-alcoholic fatty liver (NAFLD) disease, which is connected to obesity, overweight, and diabetes, are on the rise not only in Telangana State but even in other parts of the Country, the fifth edition of Health of Nation 2025 report released by Apollo Hospitals on Monday indicated. The Health of Nation report, based on the health screenings of 2.5 million individuals at Apollo Hospitals in the Country, has indicated that NAFLD has emerged as an important health issue linked to obesity, diabetes, and hypertension."Of the 2,57,199 individuals screened across all the units of Apollo Hospitals in the country, about 65 per cent had fatty liver, and 85 per cent of those were non-alcoholic," the report said. In Telangana and Andhra Pradesh, nearly 1 in 2 individuals (47 per cent) showed signs of Grade I fatty liver, an early-stage condition tied to obesity and metabolic imbalances. About 24 per cent of the individuals in TG and AP had hypertension while a combined 82 per cent of the screened were obese and overweight. Study on women relates poor oral health with chronic pain

A new study conducted on women has found a significant association between poor oral health and chronic pain conditions, including migraine and fibromyalgia.Using genomics, the research from the University of Sydney, Australia, examined the oral microbiome of nearly 160 women in New Zealand and identified specific microbes that were correlated with chronic pain.Lipopolysaccharides (a toxin) from cell walls of certain bacteria in the mouth are known to impact immune responses and have been studied to contribute to pro-inflammatory cytokines in fibromyalgia -- in which one feels widespread pain and fatigue, the authors said. Findings published in the journal Frontiers in Pain Research suggest a potential relationship between the oral microbiome and the nervous system. The study also highlights the importance of good oral health towards addressing pain and improving overall well-being.

"This is the first study to investigate oral health, oral microbiota and pain commonly experienced in women with fibromyalgia, with our study showing a clear and significant association between poor oral health and pain," said lead researcher Joanna Harnett, associate professor at the faculty of medicine and health, University of Sydney.First author, Sharon Erdrich, a PhD candidate at the university, said, "Our findings are particularly important to fibromyalgia which, despite being a common rheumatological condition. is of-



ten under-recognised." Fibromyalgia is also marked by mood, cognitive and sleep disturbances.For the study, the women responded to the World Health Organization's questionnaire on oral health. Body and abdominal pain, headaches and migraines were measured using surveys, including one created by the International Headache Society.

Women having the poorest oral health were more likely to suffer from higher pain scores: 60 per cent were more likely to experience moderate to severe body pain, and 49 per cent were more likely to experience migraine headaches, the researchers said.



Dollar sinks to decade-low as US faces loss of confidence: impact on Indian rupee, other currencies

US President Donald Trump may have hit the pause on his trade vacillations, but there seems to be a lingering deleterious effect on the American Dollar, which has slumped sharply. Reason: waning confidence in the American economy is leading to a huge flight out of the greenback to other safe haven currencies and gold.

This is reflective of a breakdown of a fundamental assumption underpinning global finance - that when there are serious bouts of volatility in the forex markets and a spike in the VIX (volatility index), it normally leads to a surge in demand for dollar assets. Over the last week, the trend has been exactly the opposite. On Friday, the dollar slumped as investors ditched US assets in favour of other alternate safe havens including the Swiss franc, the Japanese yen and the euro, as well as gold. Gold recorded a new all-time peak, and the Swiss franc notched a fresh decade high, according to Reuters data. Also, investors dumped Wall Street stocks overnight after the strong relief rally on Wednesday in the aftermath of Trump's pause. Longer-dated US Treasuries are also selling off, putting 10-year yields on course for their biggest weekly jump since 2001, Reuters said. The rupee opened weak on Friday, even though it is projected to strengthen if the sharp decline in the dollar index and a slide in oil prices continue. The dollar's slide "will obviously"

lend support to the rupee at open, an FX spot trader at a Mumbai-based bank quoted by Reuters said, adding that it is unlikely that the rupee will move past 86. The dollar index, a tracker of the US dollar value relative to a basket of foreign currencies, was down over 3 per cent Thursday, falling to the 99.70 level - its biggest dip in over 12-months that took it below the 100 level for the first time since July 2023. Trump's sudden climbdown on reciprocal tariffs is said to have been triggered by the selloff in American bonds, as confidence in the US economy plummeted and bond holders waned. Foreign holders, including Japanese and Chinese investors, are among those said to have dumped US government debt amid spiralling concerns over the impact of Trump's tariffs. A government bond is essentially a debt instrument, issued by a sovereign government to raise money from financial markets to finance public spending, in return for which interest is paid. According to the US Department of the Treasury's Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC), the Indian national—Jugwinder Singh Brar-owns multiple shipping companies that cumulatively have nearly 30 vessels, many of which operate as part of Iran's "shadow fleet".

Apart from Brar, four of his companies—India-based Global Tankers and B and P Solutions, and UAE-based Prime Tankers and Glory International-have also been sanctioned by Washington as part of the Trump administration's "maximum pressure campaign" on Iran, which has now seen five rounds of sanctions against individuals and firms in less than three months. For instance, in February, the OFAC and the US Department of State had imposed sanctions on over 30 persons and vessels in various countries, including four India-based firms . Then in March, the US sanctioned a Chinese refinery for buying and processing large volumes of Iranian oil, which is under US sanctions that were imposed in 2018 during the first Trump presidency. According to the OFAC, Brar's four firms that have been sanctioned own and operate vessels that "transported Iranian oil on behalf of the National Iranian Oil Company (NIOC) and the Iranian military".

The OFAC claimed that Brar's vessels engage in highrisk ship-to-ship (STS) transfers of Iranian petroleum in waters off Irag, Iran, the UAE, and the Gulf of Oman, following which these cargoes reach other facilitators who blend the oil or fuel with products from other countries and falsify shipping documents to conceal links to Iran. The US agency also accused Brar of coordinating with the "illicit shipping associates" of Sa'id al-Jamal, who is claimed to be an Iran-backed financier for the Yemen-based Houthi militia."The Iranian regime relies on its network of unscrupulous shippers and brokers like Brar and his companies to enable its oil sales and finance its destabilizing activities...The United States remains focused on disrupting all elements of Iran's oil exports, particularly those who seek to profit from this trade," said US Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent.

"OFAC is committed to aggressively targeting Iran's oil supply chain, including imposing sanctions on those enabling Iran's export of its oil to key third countries and the wider international market. These shipments rely on an intricate and extensive web of shell companies, clandestine smuggling, STS transfers, oil storage and blending, and document falsification," the OFAC said. The shadow fleet refers to vessels involved in Russian, Iranian, and Venezuelan crude oil and petroleum products trade. With Western fleet operators loath to get involved in the oil trade of these countries due to sanctions of varying degrees, obscure operators from countries like Greece, Russia, and China, and tax havens like Marshall Islands, Liberia, and Panama have emerged as the major players. The oil and gas industries of Russia, Iran, and Venezuela have been under sanctions or restrictions from international powers, particularly the US.

A large number of opaque fleet tankers have complex and obscure ownership structures and are registered in geographies with lax regulatory oversight. Often, such vessels, which are quite old, operate with substandard insurance and certifications. Even prior to Trump's administration's campaign against Iran's oil trade, a few Indian companies had been placed under sanctions for involvement in sanctioned energy transportation and trade through the so-called shadow fleet of tankers. For instance, in October, India-based Gabbaro Ship Services was sanctioned for alleged involvement in transportation of Iranian oil. In August and September, three India-registered shipping firms were sanctioned by the US over their alleged involvement in transporting liquefied natural gas (LNG) from Russia's Arctic LNG 2 project, which is under American sanctions.Most of the Indian companies that have been sanctioned by the US over purported violations of energy sector-related sanctions appear to be small and hitherto little-known entities set up in recent years, and not large enterprises. It is in line with the trend observed in other countries where shipping entities have been sanctioned for facilitating trade that is restricted or under sanctions.

Inflows into equity mutual funds declined by 14.4 per cent on a month-on-month basis to Rs 25,082.01 crore in March, compared to Rs 29,303.34 crore in February, the latest data from the Association of Mutual Funds in India (AMFI) showed. The inflows in equity schemes in March were lowest in 11 months. The decline in inflows was witnessed despite the Sensex and Nifty rising 5.76 per cent and 6.3 per cent, respectively in March.In March, inflows through systematic investment plan (SIP) stood at Rs 25,926 crore compared to Rs 25,999 crore in February 2024

Net assets under management (AUM) of the mutual fund industry increased by 2 per cent to Rs 65.74 lakh crore in the reporting month compared to Rs 64.53 lakh crore in February.Within equity mutual fund schemes, inflows into small cap funds stood at Rs 4,092.12 crore in March, compared to Rs 3,722.46 crore in February. Flows into mid cap funds was Rs 3,438.87 crore as against Rs 3,406.95 crore in the previous month.Large cap funds witnessed inflows of Rs 2,479.31 crore compared to Rs 2,866 crore in February.Inflows into sectoral/thematic declined 97 per cent to Rs 170.09 crore in March from Rs 5,711.58 crore in the previous month. India set to 'expedite' relief on quality norms as sought by US and EU

Amid flaring trade wars that have heightened the urgency for trade diversification globally, India has hinted at greater flexibility in accommodating trade concerns - such as quality control orders (QCOs) - raised by Western partners including the US, UK, EU, and New Zealand, all of whom are negotiating a trade deal with India, The Indian Express has learned. This comes after the conclusion of initial talks between India and US when officials from the US were here in March to finalise the scope of the trade agreement. The US had then sought a range of commitments from the Indian side to ease market access for American goods into India.

In its report on foreign trade barriers, the United States Trade Representative (USTR) had particularly pointed out flaws in QCOs stating that the Bureau of Indian Standards (BIS) norms are "not always fully aligned with international standards" and "without a clear demonstration that the international standards would be ineffective or inappropriate"."A number of concerns were raised by exporters on QCOs, who find it difficult to source input materials due to these norms, during a meeting with government officials on Wednesday. The government said it would expedite concerns raised by Western partners, as there are not many quality-related challenges originating from them," a source said, indicating that QCOs may primarily be targeting goods from China and the ASEAN region. QCOs, which typically require foreign exporters and domestic producers to mandatorily meet specific quality norms, have been a source of major concern for both domestic manufacturers who import input materials and foreign countries looking to access the growing Indian market. In recent years, India has dramatically ramped up the use of QCOs to prevent the influx of low-quality goods and simultaneously build a domestic manufacturing base, in tandem with schemes such as the Production Linked Incentive (PLI). However, the US, EU, and UK have raised as many as 10 trade concerns over QCOs at the World Trade Organisation (WTO). These cover a range of products including furniture, automotive parts, man-made fibres, cookware and utensils, toys, chemicals, and footwear. The USTR said QCOs often lack "clear means of establishing conformity" or involve significantly burdensome requirements. "For example, India requires chemicals to have BIS marks prior to importation, which necessitates a site visit to the manufacturing facility by an Indian inspector," the USTR said. "India's National Pharmaceutical Pricing Authority (NPPA) caps prices of coronary stents and knee implants. US companies have raised concerns, noting that the price controls have not kept pace with inflation and do not differentiate based on production costs or technological innovation, which discourages US firms from serving the market," the US flagged. Earlier, the US had also asked India to "ensure" that QCOs "do not create unnecessary barriers to international trade", in a trade concern raised over QCOs on chemicals and petrochemical products during a June 2024 meeting of a WTO committee. Similar concerns were raised by the US, EU, and five other countries. At the same time, even the domestic industry has raised red flags over certain QCOs that apply to key input goods such as chemicals and man-made fibres. Domestic users of such goods have long called for these QCOs to be scrapped, arguing they restrict access to raw material imports and undermine export competitiveness. The EU, alongside Indonesia, has raised a trade concern over India's QCO on viscose fibre and supported South Korea's concern over QCOs on chemical fibres and yarns, including polyester. Viscose and polyester fibres are key inputs for synthetic textiles. In a WTO meeting held in November 2024, the EU said India's "policy of adopting" QCOs across sectors "continues to send worrying signals to EU industry, EU investors, and EU Member States, as the majority of QCOs introduced by India appear to have a protectionist orientation"."The EU regrets that significant issues faced by EU exporters of viscose staple fibres persist and cause major problems in accessing the Indian market. The EU



also regrets that India has not responded to questions raised by Members in their statements on this issue," it said. The EU further described the current certification process carried out by BIS as "excessively burdensome and

"Kuldeep actually asked to bowl to me (in the nets) because the last time he bowled to me was in the World Cup final. Honestly, if you can get through that next session, you're in a really good position," hesaid. "You feel really confident because they are bowling really well and then if you walk out of that session feeling good, you are in a good space," he added.

More women than men at 2028 Los Angeles Games; 'merit based', says IOC

The Los Angeles Olympics are more than three years away. But already, the Games have secured a place in the history books — for the first time, there will be more women competing at the Olympics than men.Following years of steady rise in their participation numbers, the scale tipped in the favour of women athletes after the International Olympic Committee (IOC) on Wednesday decided to shrink the men's football competition from 16 teams to 12. At the same time, the Olympic body expanded the women's tournament by four teams, taking the total to 16. The addition of two teams in women's water polo and one extra weight category in women's boxing, taking the total to 12 and 7 respectively, meant that women will have more spots (5,655) than men (5,543) over 36 sports. 'Momentous decision'

"It's a momentous decision, one that will encourage a lot of women to get into sports," boxing legend Mary Kom, who won the bronze medal at the 2012 London Olympics, told The Indian Express. "The current generation will get opportunities we didn't get. I wish I was competing right now just so that I didn't have to wait for so long to compete at the Olympics."Mary, a women's boxing pioneer who won five World Championships between 2002 and 2010, had to wait till 2012 to compete at the Olympics. Until then, women boxers were not invited to the biggest sporting party. And even after their inclusion, only three categories were approved for women as opposed to 10 for men.But the addition of women's boxing to the 2012 programme ensured the first big step towards gender parity was taken. It meant that women, after first competing in 1900, finally were able to vie for a medal in every event at the Olympics. Twelve years later, another landmark was achieved at the 2024 Paris Olympics, which saw an equal number of events for both genders for the first time. If Paris marked the culmination of a 128-year battle for equality, Los Angeles would go a step further and have 50.5 percent women representation

At Paris, India fielded 45 women in a contingent of 110. The number is likely to increase in LA if the women's hockey and cricket teams qualify. The IOC's sports director Kit McConnell said 'every single one of those decisions was merit based.' "All of these decisions are supported by numbers. The ticket demand — the incredible success of Paris across all venues including every single session focussed on women sports. We have seen the broadcast numbers of women's sport being absolutely equal if not even stronger and we've seen the media coverage increase exponentially. All reflective of participation and popularity,"



McConnell said.Interestingly, most professional sports, which ironically also form the core Olympic disciplines, cite the same points – ticket demand and broadcast numbers – as reasons for not being able to strike gender parity in their own events. Stories of unequal pay, discrimination and lack of opportunities are rife across sports, including football, tennis and cricket.Yet, the symbolism in the IOC's decision is hard to miss, especially in relation to football.The US is where one of the biggest and landmark gender equality battles took place. The USA women's football team dragged the country's federation to courts over equal pay and rights. In 2022, after six years of legal wrangling, they finally reached a landmark agreement where their demands were met.

The US is also where women's football was introduced in the Olympics programme, back in 1996. The hosts went on to win the gold medal, the first of their record five titles, including the top-of-the-podium finish at Paris 2024. Come 2028, the Stars and Stripes will headline the largest ever women's Olympic competition. The IOC acknowledged the increasing popularity of women's sport, especially the US women's football team. "We wanted to do something to reflect that growth and equally with the United States being the home of the highest level of popularity of women's football," McConnell said. He added that the decision will also lead to an increase in overall participants as more teams will compete for the additional spots."We have seen the incredible growth of women's team sports around the world - women's football being a leader in that regard," McConnell said. "For every single one of those quota places in the Olympic Games, there's a number of countries that are investing in women's sports to chase that qualification. So when we add two teams in water polo, it's not just further investments in two countries... four women's football teams, that's not just another four countries that are chasing those places.

Tanisha-Dhruv journey ends in quarters, but Ningbo will remain memorable for precedent

The Chinese 'rural' city of Ningbo has held some eyepopping surprises for a large number of Indian students last few years (more on that later). But the city's personal interest in the progress of badminton's mixed doubles pairing of Tanisha Crasto and Dhruv Kapila peaked when they remained the only Indian shuttlers in the Badminton Asia Championships draw on Friday. Ningbo city social media handles noted their impressive buzz in a close first set with fiery exchanges.

Norway Chess organisers exploring possibility of a chess tournament in India

The organisers of Norway Chess, one of the most prestigious tournaments on the chess calendar annually, are exploring the possibility of hosting an event on Indian shores next year. The top management of Norway Chess - including founder Kjell Madland, co-owner Hogne Hide and marketing manager Dea Maioli Egeli - were in Mumbai on Thursday to meet with potential partners. The push to have an event in India comes from India's growing footprint on the chessboard. First started in 2013, Norway Chess has become an annual fixture on the chess calendar with some of the world's greatest players like Garry Kasparov, Viswanathan Anand and Magnus Carlsen competing at the event in the past, with Kasparov famously calling it the Wimbledon of Chess. While Anand has competed at the event in Stavanger eight times in the past, he is going to be in the commentary panel this year. Last year, there were three Indians in the fray, including Praggnanandhaa. This year, the event will see four Indians competing, including world champion Gukesh, Arjun Erigaisi, Koneru Humpy and Vaishali."We have done Norway Chess for many years. It has been a very well known name and we are exploring the possibility to do something more. Of course, India is very interesting for us because there are so many chess fans and so many good players. So we are exploring the possibility of doing something in India maybe next year. And of course, we are looking if there are some possible partners, sponsors, things like that, to be a part of the event. We have some meetings and it's interesting for us to meet people who could maybe help us and maybe are interested to be a part of this," Madland told The Indian Express on the sidelines of an event in Mumbai before clarifying: "We don't want to move the actual Norway Chess tournament.'

This year, the Norway Chess event will see former world champion Magnus Carlsen take on Indian stars like world champion Gukesh and Arjun Erigaisi. This will be the first time Carlsen will face Gukesh in classical chess after the 18-year-old became the world champion. Last year, Praggnandhaa had created a flutter at Norway Chess by defeating Carlsen for the first time in classical chess.

Former world champion Anand, who would be doing commentary at this year's Norway Chess event, said he



was looking forward to the battle between the Indian prodigies and the Norwegian, who succeeded him on the world champion's throne."I expect a very exciting battle. Gukesh will not lack motivation or the determination to go after Magnus Carlsen. But Magnus is also highly motivated by the challenge of playing against our young players. I've seen him in multiple tournaments, whether it's Kolkata (Tata Steel Rapid and Blitz) or World Rapid and Blitz, he eagerly looks forward to these match-ups and so we have the perfect storm," he said. Thanks to Salah banging in a league-high 27 goals so far this campaign, Liverpool command an 11-point lead in the Premier League as they chase their record-tying 20th English league title. Over the past three Premier League seasons, Salah has been the league's top scorer. At Liverpool, he has helped the club win seven major trophies including the Premier League in 2020 and the Champions League in 2019. Club manager Arne Slot said: "Mo Salah is such a great player that as a free agent he can go probably to every club in the world, wherever he wants to. But he stayed at our club."

The White Lotus Season 3 might have ended with an underwhelming finale, but behind-the-scenes drama seems to be compensating for it. Many found it odd, considering they had shared screen space, posted tributes, and spoken warmly about each other during the press tour. Did Rick and Chelsea's romance turn sour offscreen?

It was just days ago when Aimee Lou gave an interview to The Hollywood Reporter, expressing her sadness over Walton skipping the White Lotus Season 3 finale viewing party, saying she missed him since it was something they did together. "Like, of course Walton had to watch it alone, and of course I had to watch it in the group, because there is so much Aimee in Chelsea and so much Walton in Rick."Now, a subtle change on social media guickly snowballed into full-blown speculation. Some even noted the absence of tags in recent posts where the actors posted each other's photos and pointed out that Aimee Lou's past comments on Walton's posts had mysteriously vanished. A section of fans is convinced that the beloved on-screen couple has blocked each other. It's worth mentioning that even months earlier, their bond appeared solid. In August 2024, Walton left a glowing comment on one of Aimee Lou's posts: "You are the brightest light in every room. A Human's Human. Miss you.

Naturally, Reddit and X (formerly Twitter) had thoughts. Some fans believe a fallout may have occurred during or after filming. "They used to idolise each other," one Reddit user wrote. "It's so weird that all of a sudden there's this switch up." One user even broke down all the changes in bullet points-like how he was the one who blocked her, and skipped the finale only to end up watching it with another co-star. The same user also hinted there might be trouble in paradise for Walton, pointing out that "Leslie Bibb, his co-star, absolutely loves Aimee Lou, always brings her

up in interviews, and was apparently close with Walton's wife before." The Reddit user mentioned how Walton's wife recently posted twice, and both times he commented, "I love you so much."Just last week, he also shared an Instagram story about leaving for another trip and said again how much he loved her. And then, both Aimee and Walton ended up posting tributes to their characters using Fleetwood Mac's "Silver Springs"-hers was a post, his was just an Insta story. But, amid all this just a few days ago, Walton shared a carousel of behind-the-scenes photos from their time filming in Thailand, calling their story "a love story... hindered by unresolved, childhood trauma." In a long, handwritten post, he thanked series creator Mike White and Aimee Lou, writing, "Thank you Aimee Lou for being my partner... a journey I will never forget." She also reciprocated the feeling and shared her own tributes. A simple caption—"The perfect storm ?? ?? ??"—on a photo of their on-screen characters walking together, and another image of graffiti that read, "I love you. Forever," signed off with "R and C forever ??.'


In an appearance on The Happy Hour on SiriusXM, Jason Isaacs (Timothy Ratliff) seemingly acknowledged that "there were tense dynamics during production." Warfare movie review: Bareboned film on battle of **Ramadi accurately showcases futility of war**

Stripped literally to the bones, here is a film about war that does not feature grand battles or majestic battlefields. All of its action involves an ordinary house on an ordinary street on an ordinary day, and surviving that one day, through one battle and then the next and the next. With limited dialogues, no showboating, and neither moralising nor lecturing, it illustrates the futility of America's foray(s) into Iraq, with scared men on both sides shooting at each other, often randomly and repeatedly, blinded by smoke and sweat. Of talk there may be little, but with sound, writer-directors Garland and Mendoza (hat-tip to sound effects editor Danny Freemantle) mount an assault all its own. The night is dotted with scattered gunshots, but as the day dawns, every sound carries a warning. A Navy SEALS team cooped up inside a house in Ramadi, Iraq, that they have taken over to prepare for a Marines ground operation - shepherding the two Iraqi families sharing the house into one room - must keep their eyes open and ears cocked for the scenes outside.

Does the busy street market have too many young men walking around? Now, does it have too few? Is the market emptying? Why are all the men going into one building? What is that car driving up to this building, and what is the thing being taken out of its boot? And the call to prayer, what is that about?

If quiet fills the house, but for the scribbling of notes about the operation and the peeing of SEALS into bottles as they take duty breaks, sound bombards and stuns when the men call in a "show of strength" and US planes fly in for that, zooming close to the ground and rattling every living being and standing structure. An IED blast hits a tank and day turns instantly to night, with the men taking their time waking up to distorted, muddled senses and the sounds of their own screaming. There is no hiding those screams as pain and fear wipe away any stoicism, with streaks of blood on the floor and the insides of a body on the street staring the men in the face. The determination of the men to not leave their severely injured buddies behind is the one flourish of heroism in Warfare. For the most part, shot almost in real time as the SEALS team is ambushed, and waits desperately for a difficult rescue, Warfare wants us to look past the helmets, the bullet-proof jackets, the gear and the guns, at very young men just trying to survive.



being as spare and as unsparing as Mendoza and Garland want them. Woon-A-Tai plays Mendoza himself, with this film a real account of a day survived by Mendoza, a former Navy SEALS, in Ramadi. Jarvis plays the sniper Elliott, the man who almost died that day, and to whom this film is dedicated. Mendoza has talked about making Warfare to honour the real Elliott who, apart from his legs, lost his memory of what had happened that day of November 16, 2006, in Ramadi. Warfare, the filmmakers say, has been made with "as much accuracy as memory allows".Of course, Mendoza's memory does not extend to the scared Iraqi family and their destroyed home. But it is telling that as that fateful day ends, the family and the other Iraqis emerge haltingly from their homes, left with the losses. The Battle for Ramadi was one of the fiercest chapters in the US invasion of Iraq, and while it pushed the pendulum a bit, it swung right back soon after. It also saw one of the first deaths of a Navy SEAL in the Iraq war.In its ambition, Warfare is smaller than Garland's recent Civil War, which had Mendoza as a consultant on the battle parts, and which faltered when it strayed into politics. However, it's good to remember that it is the ambitions of men that have led mankind into battles like Ramadi's. About time we had this brutal look at the cost.



Actor Hrithik Roshan, who is on tour in the US currently, attended a fan meet-and-greet event in New Jersey. So, I would just go outside and audition. I went to my friend Daboo Ratnani, and we did a photo session. I had no money to pay him, so I said if I earn some good bucks once I become an actor, I will pay you back, he said 'Don't worry about it'."

he called me while I was in the audition. He said, 'Hello, where are you?' I told him that I am auditioning for Shekhar Kapur's film. He said, 'What? Come back now, don't do such things'. I think my dad felt a sense of loss that somebody else is going to take his son away and make a film for him. Before that, he only thought of a film for me. I always feel great and want to pat myself on the back because I did not get an offer from the father Rakesh Roshan, I got an offer from the director Rakesh Roshan. That is something I am always going to be proud of."

When the host pointed out his versatility in different films, Hrithik said that he is just doing his job as an actor. "I don't think it should be a problem that I am doing my job. The job is to get into the character and getting paid for it. You are paying to go into a theatre and to get some honesty and integrity. You want to watch something that entertains you. I love my job, I love being an actor and getting into a character," he said. Expressing his happiness about the love that the Krrish franchise has received, Hrithik said, "I am so full of gratitude that all of you have kept the idea of Krrish alive. Also, thanks to social media I think. I keep hearing about Jaadu and Krrish, so we are on the heels of beginning the journey of Krrish 4 now, as soon as I go back. I hope and pray that you will give it as much love as you did to the previous ones."Talking about turning director with Krrish 4, Hrithik said, "Deep inside, I think I am a filmmaker. I don't know what to say. I am afraid, I am nervous. I am back to kindergarten. There will be so many uncertainties and new things. The moments where I face fear, I will remember you all. It is going to be a new challenge." Hrithik recently made headlines with his Dallas show, when the attendees returned unhappy due to mismanagement by the organisers. Several fans took to social media to complain and express disappointment about the event.

Karan Johar, Akshay Kumar clap back at General Dyer's granddaughter calling Jallianwala Bagh massacre victim 'looter': 'How dare she?'



At the Kesari 2 press conference, Karan Johar expressed his anger over General Dyer's granddaughter calling the Jallianwala Bagh genocide victims 'looters'.

Kesari 2 actor Akshay Kumar and producer Karan Johar strongly criticised the comments of General Reginald Dyer who recently called the victims of the Jallianwala Bagh massacre as 'looters'. Akshay plays C Sankaran Nair in the film who sued the British Empire for carrying out the genocide in Amritsar in which at least 1,650 people were killed. Talking about the film and the Jallianwala Bagh incident, Karan Johar said, "I have heard stories of true valor and bravery of unsung heroes various times. These stories have been embedded in the archives of history and not portrayed on celluloid. This took me back to a few stories that came on my table like Raazi, that film went on to prove that true stories resonate gorgeously, it could strike a chord with the audience. There was also The Ghazi Attack, and Kesari.

"This one is an absolutely outstanding story of C Shankaran Nair, based on the book, The Case That Shook The Empire. We knew the massacre, but none of us knew the truth. Every time we have watched the tragedy, we have felt the pain, the anger. What makes us all angry is that there isn't an apology even now. Neither the crown, nor the monarchy or the British Government apologized. We came out of the British Raaj valiantly as a country, but as a nation we deserve an apology and this film demands just that," he said.Earlier, in an interview General Dyer' granddaughter spoke to a family member of the victim where she said, "General Dyer is an honorable man, greatly liked by the Indians, who spoke three or four Indian languages which very few people did."

Responding to the victim's family, she asked, "Was he a looter? I think history is history and you've got to accept that."Reacting to this, Karan Johar said, "I have seen that video, and not just as an Indian or humanitarian, but as anyone who has an iota of empathy, it will anger you. How ridiculous was she to say that, and how dare she? She was calling those thousands of people looters, they were innocent people who collected on the auspicious day of Baisakhi, thinking something else was going to be the eventuality of the day. By his own admission, General Dyer said that he only stopped shooting when the bullets ran out.""She went on in an interview to say that he loved India, and all kinds of things that he had the greatest compassion. What love can you have, when your actions only spoke of hate. She is living in a lala land of her own and in some delusion. I don't know her, haven't met her, and don't wish to. The fact that she even said those things boiled my blood, she had such disdain for the biggest genocide in the history of our nation, that it made me demand an apology even more," Karan added.Akshay Kumar also shared his views and said, "One nation's trauma is another nation's lesson. That is what she never understood and kept saying History is history. I appreciate what Karan said and the way he said it."

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
