Telangana set for another record paddy production: Uttam



Hyderabad, April 19 The Telangana government has launched a large-scale paddy procurement operation for the Rabi 2024–25 season, setting a target of 70.13 lakh metric tonnes (LMTs). This follows an estimated production of 127.50 LMTs over 57 lakh acres, placing Telangana at the top among the country's paddy-producing states.

In Vanakalam, Telangana produced 153.5 LMTs of paddy over 66.7 lakh acres. Therefore, in the year 2024-25, the overall paddy production - including Vanakalam and Yasangi - will touch 281 LMTs, the highest-ever production recorded in any Indian state Addressing all District Collectors via video conference from Civil Supplies Bhavan on Saturday, Minister for Irrigation and Civil Supplies N Uttam Kumar Reddy said, "We are in a situation of plenty. After a smooth and nearly flawless Vanakalam procurement, we must now execute Yasangi procurement with equal or greater efficiency." Highlighting the urgency of the procurement drive, Uttam Kumar Reddy cautioned officials to remain alert due to unseasonal rains reported in several districts. He said such weather fluctuations could damage harvested or standing paddy if not procured swiftly. This is why we must act efficiently and quickly any delay could mean losses for our farmers," he told Collectors, urging intensified ground-level monitoring and infrastructure preparedness at PPCs. As of April 18, around 8.51 LMTs of paddy had arrived at procurement centres, of which 5.77 LMTs had already been procured - 3.79 LMTs of fine variety (Sanna) and 1.98 LMTs of coarse (Doddu). A total of 63,887 farmers had benefited, and payments - including bonuses - were being processed. Around 2.74 LMTs of paddy remained to be lifted from PPCs To achieve the procurement target, 7,337 Paddy Procurement Centres (PPCs) have been activated out of the proposed 8,329, reaching 88 percent operational status. These centres are being managed by Primary Agricultural Credit Societies (PACS), Indira Kranthi Patham (IKP) groups, and other agencies. Districts such as Nizamabad, Kamareddy, Nalgonda, and Siddipet have reported full PPC operationalisation. The Minister said that key equipment - including grain callipers, electronic weighing scales, tarpaulins, paddy cleaners, moisture meters, and husk removers - had been distributed. The state requires 17.5 crore gunny bags (9.45 crore new and 8.05 crore old), of which 9.23 crore are currently available. Collectors were asked to report infrastructure gaps early and resolve them swiftly.

A prison crisis

India's prisons are in crisis. They resemble overrowded warehouses for the forgotten. The India Justice Report 2025 shows the scale of the problem. As of 2022 5.73 lakh inmates were lodged in facilities built for 4.36 akh. That's a 131 per cent occupancy rate. By 2030, the rison population could reach 6.8 lakh — far beyond the rojected capacity of 5.15 lakh. The crisis goes deeper han space. It's a human rights emergency. There are just 25 psychologists for the entire prison population. Mental liness among inmates has more than doubled since 2012. Most of those suffering are undertrials — people not yet onvicted. They wait years for justice because of court lelays. The medical crisis is equally grim. There is a 43 er cent vacancy in medical officer posts across prisons. Delhi has only one doctor per 206 inmates. Without proper are, prisoners suffer in silence — both mentally and physi-

This neglect is not new. The Supreme Court has ofen called for long-term prison planning. But state action emains slow and indifferent. Staff shortages are severe. Correctional vacancies reach 60 per cent in some regions. Delhi's jails, for example, have operated at over 250 per cent capacity. Marginalised communities — Dalits, tribals and Muslims — are overrepresented behind bars. This eflects deep-rooted inequities in the justice system.

Addressing this crisis needs political will. Fast-track courts and alternative dispute resolution can reduce undertrial numbers. Infrastructure investment must match ising inmate numbers. More doctors, psychologists and staff are urgently needed. Legal aid access must improve or the poor. Prisons should not be sites of prolonged punshment. They must become centres of reform. Treating nmates with dignity and care reflects the strength of our lemocracy. It is not a favour — it is a constitutional duty.

Gold may hit Rs 1 lakh amid Trump tariffs, recession fears: Experts

New Delhi: The gold prices in India could soon touch Rs 1 lakh per 10 grams, as global uncertainties continue to push investors towards safe-haven assets, experts said on Saturday.

The sharp rise in gold prices is being driven by fears of a slowdown in the US economy, fuelled by President Donald Trump's renewed tariff policies. According to estimates by global brokerage Goldman Sachs, gold prices could reach \$3,700 per ounce in the near term, and possibly touch \$4,500 per ounce if trade tensions escalate further. If this happens, domestic gold prices on the Multi Commodity Exchange (MCX) could climb to Rs 1 lakh or even Rs 1.25 lakh per 10 grams, market experts said.

Gold has already delivered strong returns to investors. In the last five years, gold prices have jumped more than 110 per cent -- from Rs 44,906 per 10 grams on April 17, 2020, to Rs 95,239 per 10 grams on April 17.

City man loses huge money to scammer

employee from Hyderabad, two weeks ago, received a link via SMS from an unknown number, as well as an email from alu.kunkum@gmail.com regarding a platform called "Bull Markets" to reset a password after joining. Later, the victim received multiple missed calls from someone claiming to be a senior economist (scammer), the victim returned a call. The individual, who answered introduced a trading platform claiming to help people develop trading skills and promised high returns, citing "Quantum AI" as a profit-generating system.

The victim was persuaded to deposit \$230 USD (?20,106.65) using his SBI credit card to the merchant MAM*BULLMARKETS Nairobi KE. A small profit of \$30 USD was shown to build trust. The scammers then convinced the victim to invest more. A second deposit of \$999 USD (?90,835.63) was made. The victim was shown how to make a withdrawal and successfully withdrew \$50 USD, purportedly from his profits.

Encouraged by this, the victim made further deposits: \$540 USD (49,663), \$540 USD (?49,663) and \$500 USD (45,904). After two days of trading, the victim attempted to withdraw \$1,900 USD. The "Senior Economist" called and

Hyderabad, April 19: A 35-years-old male private claimed that withdrawing at that moment would prevent the victim from participating in future trades and maintaining the necessary margin level. The withdrawal request was cancelled around 6:52 PM IST. Following this, the scammer opened multiple trades, drastically lowering the victim's

> The victim received an email warning that the open trades were at immediate risk of closing due to the low margin. From this point on, the scammer refused withdrawal requests and pressured the victim to maintain margin levels by investing more. The victim then deposited \$320 USD (?27,407) via SBI UPI. The merchant name was displayed as Yawar Meat Shop, which raised suspicion about the legitimacy of the platform. Later that day, a different individual claiming to be a Senior Manager called and threatened that if the victim didn't deposit more money, the entire investment and profits would be lost. Fearing further loss, the victim made a final deposit of \$2,584 USD (?2, 28,671).Despite having a remaining balance in the trading account, the victim was not allowed to withdraw amount Rs 9, 72,276/-. The scammers sent documents and asked the victim to sign them, which the victim refused. The victim subsequently raised a complaint through the Cyber Crime Portal

Hydra demolishes illegal structures in GHMC limits

Hvderabad, April 19 The Hydra has demolished illegal structures in the State capital and GHMC limits today. Demolition drive was held in Injapur under Vanasthalipuram area limits. Scoops Ice Cream Company has occupied the main road leading to several colonies. Clashes broke out between the police and a crowd in Maharashtra's Nashik Tuesday night after civic authorities moved in to demolish an illegal structure built around a decades-old dargah in the city's Kathe Galli area. The demolition was carried out by the Nashik Municipal Corporation around structures that had been built around the Satpeer Dargah. As a large number of Corporation staff and the police surrounded the place, clashes broke out after protesters angry over the demolition got into an argument with

"The trustees of the Dargah and local citizens had agreed to remove the construction. Accordingly, all of them had gathered on Tuesday at 11 pm. At the same time, a crowd arrived from the direction of Usmania Chowk, and chaos broke out. The trustees and eminent citizens tried to reason with the mob. Senior police officers also attempted to calm the situation, but the crowd did not listen to anyone and began pelting stones," said Kiran Kumar Chavan, Deputy Commissioner of Police (DCP), Nashik.Chavan said the police deployed tear gas shells, and carried out a mild baton charge to disperse the agitators. "In the stone-



pelting, 31 police personnel sustained minor injuries. So far, 15 individuals have been arrested in connection with the violence, and 57 two-wheelers allegedly used by the mob have been seized," DCP Chavan told the media. A bulldozer being used to demolish an allegedly illegal structure of a dargah, in Nashik district, Maharashtra. Demolition activities commenced at around 5.30 am Wednesday with the help of two JCB machines. Nearly 90 per cent of the unauthorised structure has since been razed, with debris being swiftly cleared by municipal vehicles. A heavy police force continues to be deployed in the Kathe Galli area, with authorities rerouting traffic towards Bhaba Nagar to maintain order. The Nashik Municipal Corporation had previously issued a 15-day notice to vacate the structure that had come up around the dargah.

Ladki Bahin scheme to continue, no question of scrapping it: Ajit Pawar

Earlier, state Women and Child Development Minister Aditi Tatkare on Tuesday said no change has been made in the amount of assistance paid under the scheme, but some 7.74 lakh women already getting Rs 1,000 under another scheme are being paid the difference of Rs 500.She was responding to media reports claiming the aid under the Ladki Bahin scheme was reduced for 7,74,148 women who were receiving benefits of other schemes.

Rs 1,500 per month are paid under the Ladki Bahin Yojana to women who are not taking advantage of any other government scheme. To those who are receiving a benefit of less than Rs 1,500 under other schemes, the difference is paid under the Ladki Bahin Yojana, Tatkare said. In line with this policy, the difference of Rs 500 is being paid to 7,74,148 women who are receiving Rs 1,000 per month under the Namo Shetkari Samman Yojana, the NCP leader said in a post on X."No eligible woman has been excluded from the Ladki Bahin scheme, and no change has been made in the said process after July 3, 2024," Tatkare said, adding she has clarified about the same during the budget session of the state legislature. 3,000 Haryana private schools will face action if 25% seats are not reserved for economically weaker students: Minister Mahipal Dhanda

Nearly 3,000 private schools in Haryana will soon face action if they fail to comply with the government directive of reserving 25 per cent of Class 1 seats for students from economically weaker sections (EWS), said Education Minister Mahipal Dhanda in Chandigarh Dhanda, during a review meeting with the senior officers of the education department, said that under the Right to Education (RTE) Act it is mandatory for all recognised private schools in Haryana to abide by the reservation rule.

The minister has directed education department officials to ensure the enforcement of the rule, adding that noncompliance could lead to the cancellation of the school's recognition. He said that 70 per cent of the 10,000 private schools have so far allocated seats through the Ujjwal Portal.Dhanda also stated that under Rule 158(6) of the Haryana School Education Rules, 2003, no recognised school in the state is allowed to compel students or their parents to purchase textbooks, stationery, or uniforms from a particular shop, nor are the schools permitted to change their uniforms within five years. He said that the government has so far received 40 complaints related to different issues through the Education Department portal apart from 57 complaints through email. "All complaints are currently under investigation, and strict action will be taken against any schools found in violation," he said. The minister shared



that while 2,07,685 students were enrolled in Class 5 in government schools as of April 30, 2024; 2,04,163 students have already been admitted by April 15 this year. Going by the trend, Dhanda expressed confidence that by April 30, the number of admissions will surpass last year's figure, reflecting the growing trust in government schools and the noticeable improvement in the quality of education. The minister further said that under the RTE Act, the funds for uniforms for government school students from Classes 1 to 8 will be transferred directly to their bank accounts by the last week of April. Free textbooks will be distributed to all such

With help from retired officers, teachers, and batchmates, Warhade pushed through. She credits her mother for laying a strong academic foundation that helped her clear the written examination with ease. Warhade admitted that managing time between academics, fitness, and personality development was not easy. "Discipline was the only constant. I had to say no to distractions and stay focused every single day," she said.

Warhade is now preparing for the rigorous four-year training ahead — three years of NDA and one more at the service academy. "The course will be physically and mentally demanding. I've already started preparing for it," she said. Her parents are proud and emotional. "She got the fruits of her hard work. There were times she felt low, but we stood by her. She never gave up," her father said. Her mother added, "It was my dream to see my children do something extraordinary. Rutuja always wanted to do something out of the box. She found inspiration in her father and maternal grandfather, who had also attempted the SSB. As parents, especially of daughters, it's important that we sup-



port their choices and believe in them."

Nandini Waikar, who secured an All India Rank 27, was the third-highest-ranked female candidate. She also grew up with a dream to join the forces. "Three years ago, I decided to join NDA. Since then, I've been preparing. My family and friends were my biggest support," she said. The SSB interview, she said, was the most demanding part of the process. What gave her an edge was the leadership development she underwent during various academy events. "We would practice speaking on different topics, which improved my communication and confidence,'

Her father, overwhelmed with emotion, said, "It was the most beautiful moment of my life. I had taken her to many parades, and I saw the spark in her eyes. She's a born fighter." Her mother, equally proud, said, "She worked so hard, often sacrificing sleep. I used to tell her stories of Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj, whose vision and courage inspired our family. She wanted to contribute to the nation just like him." As they step into a training environment that was once a male-dominated one, both cadets are clear that they expect no special treatment. The police also seized from him 3.5 kg of the high-grade contraband, valued at Rs 4 crore, along with Rs 36 lakh in cash. Hydro ganja or hydroponically grown weed is a highly potent variant of ganja and is much more expensive.

The accused, Jijo Prasad, 25, a resident of Bommanahalli, was nabbed by the Anti-Narcotics Wing while he was waiting to deliver the parcel in a vacant plot near Veer Sandra, close to Electronic City. He was booked under sections of the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (NDPS) Act and sent to judicial custody by a Bengaluru court. Officers said Prasad sourced the contraband from his associate Ashwin in Kerala, who is currently absconding. A search is on to trace him. Prasad allegedly sold hydro ganja to IT professionals in the eastern and southeastern parts of Bengaluru, pricing it at Rs 12,000 per gram.



He used WhatsApp to coordinate with clients and operated discreetly to avoid detection. To mask the smell and avoid suspicion, he packed the drugs in airtight plastic covers and arranged meetings in secluded spots of his choice, the police added. A CCB officer revealed that Prasad had built a wide customer base among techies, leveraging his professional background and low profile to stay under the radar. His arrest followed a tip-off from a police informant. The bust comes amid a larger crackdown on the smuggling and distribution of hydro ganja in Bengaluru. Authorities believe that most of the supply is sourced through the dark web and foreign sellers, with the delivery routed through postal services. However, Prasad's case has exposed a new channel of interstate smuggling via Kerala.

MC crackdown on misuse of water: 180 notices, 8 challans issued on first day

The Chandigarh Municipal Corporation (MC) first introduced a 3 per cent property tax on the annual rateable value (ARV) of commercial, industrial, and institutional lands and buildings in 2004. Committee members Harjeet Singh, Manoj Sonkar and Lakhbir Singh, along with senior MC officials, participated in the session. In a bid to prevent the misuse of potable water, the Chandigarh Municipal Corporation (MC) launched its annual water conservation drive on Monday morning, issuing 180 notices and eight challans to violators for wasting drinking water.

According to officials, the campaign is part of an intensified effort to promote judicious water usage, particularly during the summer months. Officials said the drive conducted between 5.30 am and 8.30 am following the the order of MC Commissioner Amit Kumar was aimed at discouraging practices like washing vehicles, courtyards, or watering lawns using hosepipes. On the first day, several residents were found flouting the guidelines, they said. Under

the campaign, which will continue until June 30, anyone found watering lawns or washing vehicles using hosepipes is liable to be fined Rs 5,788. Additionally, households with leaking tanks, taps, water meters, or coolers were served notices with a two-day deadline to carry out repairs, failing which violators will face penalties. Most of the violations on Monday involved residents washing cars and courtyards using potable water. As part of the enforcement, MC teams documented the breaches with photographs and videos for evidence. The MC Commissioner urged citizens to save drinking water and avoid its misuse. He also encouraged residents to opt for treated tertiary (TT) water for gardening and other non-potable uses. Shamlat land tobe reserved for community development: MCThe Slum Development Committee of the Chandigarh Municipal Corporation has decided to earmark Shamlat (common) land in city villages exclusively for community development purposes such as parks, playgrounds, community centres, and essential infrastruc-

The directive was issued during the committee's first meeting, chaired by Senior Deputy Mayor Kuljeet Singh Sandhu. It was also decided that the departments concerned must prepare cost estimates up to Rs 15 lakh for urgent development projects in under-served areas, which will be reviewed in the next meeting for prompt implementation. Additionally, the committee sought a detailed report on all rented shops in villages now under the MCC jurisdiction, including rental terms and current occupancy, to ensure better revenue and space utilisation. Committee members Harjeet Singh, Manoj Sonkar and Lakhbir Singh, along with senior MC officials, participated in the session. Sandhu emphasised that the committee aims to bridge development gaps in neglected areas and ensure basic civic facilities reach every resident.

8,286 drink-driving challans issued since 2023, nearly 550 licences to be suspended

and manage easily to avoid their licences getting cancelled," said Harman Singh Sidhu, chairman of Arrive Safe Society. "The rising number of drunk-driving cases, coupled with a low suspension rate and growing case backlogs, is raising concerns about the effectiveness of current traffic laws in ensuring road safety," Sidhu added. checkpoints across the city are being set up, which has led to a noticeable increase in the number of challans issued for drunk driving."However, going by recent incidents in the city whereby drunken drivers were involved, a high-speed Mercedes crashed and mounted the central roundabout at Matka Chowk, Sector 17, Chandigarh, narrowly averting a major tragedy.

Amid Panjab University protests, female students raise alarm over campus safety

As protesting students called off their hunger strike at Panjab University late Tuesday evening, female students from multiple departments spoke out against what they described as a "persistent atmosphere of neglect, fear and institutional exclusion". "There's no sense of safety after dark," said Deepti Sehrawat, a student of the Department of Anthropology. "We walk back from the Sector 14 library at night with no lighting, no patrols, and no one around to turn to if something happens. We're told we're overreacting, but it's our daily reality."Students allege that at least four gates on the South Campus remain open or are only lightly guarded. "There's no police in the beatbox opposite the Sector 25 gate," said a second-year student from the Department of Psychology. "Anyone can walk in — locals, schoolboys, and even strangers who ask us our names and departments as we walk to our hostels. Once, a group of men in a jeep stopped and tried to get details out of me. There was no security nearby."The Sector 25 gate next to a residential area has long been flagged as a vulnerable point. "It's not even chest-high and completely unmanned. We've seen men hopping over it, even on the day of the incident where a student, Aditya Thakur, got knifed," said a student from the Department of Hotel Management. "There's no CCTV and no barrier."

Streetlights on key campus routes reportedly remained non-functional for months. "The path between the hostels

and the library was pitch black until last week," Deepti added. "Only after protests began did lights start working again."Komal Preet, former Department Representative (DR) of Laws and currently an LLM student at UILS, said many women remain silent out of fear of judgment or neglect. "Most of us don't report anything. Not because we're unaffected, but because we've been conditioned to stay quiet. There's no female-led safety committee, no self-defence clubs, no peer spaces where women feel heard."Hostel security protocols, too, have come under scrutiny. "The attendance register is just a formality," said Deepti. "Even if someone doesn't sign in by 10 pm, the hostel staff don't call. You can walk in and out of the hostel as well as the university whenever you want, no one asks anything."Late-night security checks are reportedly nonexistent. "We haven't seen a patrol outside our hostel in weeks," said a second-year student from the Department of English. "There's no one posted near dark stretches. If something goes wrong halfway between the hostel and the library, there's nobody to turn to. Guards work overtime and are underpaid; how much can they handle alone? We need retired army professionals and more skilled guards," she added. While grievance cells technically exist, students say they feel inaccessible. "There aren't enough female staff. After the recent violence, we're even more afraid to approach authorities," Komal added. "We feel invisible, not just in terms of safety, but in the protest itself." Deepti, currently, the only woman activist leading the protest, echoed the sentiment. "I've been raising these issues alone. Women's voices aren't just ignored but they're not even included."University authorities did not respond to requests for comment. The protesters were demanding visible reforms, starting with improved lighting, round-the-clock patrolling, and the immediate resignations of both the DSW and the Chief Security Officer (CSO). In response, a new Joint Action Committee (JAC), comprising Kuldeep, Abhishek Garg, and Prakhar Singh Paliwal, has been proposed to oversee the functioning of the DSW office. "The students have vowed to continue their protest until their demands for increased security and accountability are addressed," Archit Garg, Vice President of the Panjab University Campus Students' Council (PUCSC), said earlier.

BJP councillors warn of mass resignation over hike in property tax & collector rates

In a dramatic turn of events, BJP councillors and Mayor Harpreet Kaur Babla appear to be heading towards a confrontation with the Chandigarh Administration over the recent hikes in the property tax and collector rates. A crucial meeting was held on Tuesday at the BJP's Chandigarh headquarters, Kamlam. State party president Jitender Pal Malhotra chaired the meeting, which was attended by the mayor and all elected and nominated councillors of the BJP. According to sources, the BJP councillors are actively considering a collective resignation as a mark of protest against the administration's unilateral decisions, which they claim are being made without considering public sentiment or the elected House's opinions. The councillors argue that such moves are placing an undue financial burden on residents, while their own inputs are being disregarded in key policy matters.

This brewing rebellion is seen as a response to mounting criticism from the opposition and the public, especially after the administration moved ahead with implementing a property tax hike despite the proposal being rejected in the House meeting. The councillors reportedly expressed that if the administration fails to take corrective steps soon, they are prepared to resign in mass. Sources revealed that this issue was earlier discussed with BJP National General Secretary (Organization) B.L Santosh and Chandigarh BJP incharge Atul Garg. The senior leaders are believed to have assured that the matter would be raised with Union Home Minister Amit Shah. Councillors had also pressed for the reversal of these unpopular decisions to avoid public backlash ahead of the upcoming Municipal Corporation elections in December 2026. Meanwhile, amid intensifying political pressure, Mayor Harpreet Kaur Babla recently met with the UT Chief Secretary to request a rollback of the property tax notification. Despite submitting a formal representation, her plea received no response from the administration. Mayor Babla has publicly voiced her frustration, calling the administration's conduct discriminatory. She noted that the Municipal Corporation delivers 80 per cent of the city's civic services, yet does not receive revenue sharing from the Registering and Licensing Authority (RLA).

Mayor Babla questioned how the administration could notify a property tax hike despite the House rejecting the proposal. "The increase in property tax has to be rolled back. Without consulting the councillors, the property tax has been increased, which will not be tolerated. We have been asking the administration for funds, but they are not allocating us. All the expenses are on us, nothing is going right in the City, roads are not in good condition, and there is a short-



age of water", noted Babla. "How will we ask the city people for tax when we are unable to provide them with Civic amenities? So, if the property tax is not rolled back, all BJP councillors and the mayor will resign," added Babla. Meanwhile, earlier, during the BJP meeting, several councillors echoed similar sentiments, with some raising the issue of mass resignation. As buzz grows over BJP councillors, including Mayor Babla, threatening to resign in protest against recent hikes in property tax and collector rates, Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) leaders slammed the move as a political stunt to mislead voters ahead of elections. AAP Chandigarh State Treasurer J.D. Ghai dismissed the resignation talk as "crocodile tears," asserting, "The BJP has failed to deliver any meaningful development in the city over the past decade. Now, they are trying to shift focus from their failures by creating drama."

Echoing Ghai's sentiments, AAP Women's Wing President and councillor Prem Lata also called it a "fixed drama" orchestrated to fool the public. "This resignation drama, staged in the presence of the Chandigarh BJP president, is nothing but a distraction. The property tax hike was approved by the BJP-led central government. If they truly cared for public welfare, they would resign overall central government decisions harming Chandigarh," she said. "The mayor herself claimed to have met Home Minister Amit Shah, who promised grants for the Municipal Corporation. If the BJP truly stands with the people of Chandigarh, its councillors and Mayor should resign over these unfulfilled promises, not just over one issue for political mileage," Prem Lata added.AAP leaders said the people of Chandigarh are no longer unaware — they recognize the difference between real governance and "political stunts."

Woman shot dead near Shahdara park, man last seen with her picked up for questioning

A young woman was found shot dead near a park at GTB Enclave in Shahdara late Monday. Sources in the police said they have picked up a suspect for questioning — allegedly the woman's boyfriend — who could be seen walking with her in CCTV camera footage from the area. The police said the woman was a witness to a murder that had taken place in Nand Nagari last November. "A man was murdered when he allegedly stepped in to stop two men from harassing the woman and rebuked them," said an officer. The two men were later arrested. The police said they are looking into all possible angles, including motives borne out of revenge or relationship issues.

Additional Deputy Commissioner of Police (Shahdara) Neha Yadav said they received a PCR call on Monday night regarding a woman lying dead on the road. "The local police found a woman lying dead on a service road near Sunder Nagari," Yadav said, adding that there were two bullet injuries on the body. Sources said she had been shot on her cheek and chest. The body of the woman, who has been identified, was brought to Guru Tegh Bahadur Hospital for postmortem examination. The woman's relatives told The Indian Express that she was living with her elder sister for over a month after their mother's death.

When contacted, the elder sister said, "We were wor-

ried about her... and wanted to get her married. We even asked her if she liked someone but she never gave us a straight answer." "We had planned to send her to Jaipur to live with our pregnant sister... she was supposed to leave on the 17th, after our mother's chalisvi," the sister added. Chalisvi is a funeral rite observed after 40 days of a person's death. The elder sister was informed of the woman's disappearance at midnight, while she was working at a private hospital. "My daughter called me to say that (she) wasn't home... My uncle later told me that she had been talking to someone over the phone before she left home," she said. Claiming that the woman often went out in the evening to meet her friends, the family reasoned that they were not immediately worried when told that she was not at home. Late night, the police showed up at the house, asking the family to provide the woman's photograph and a description of the clothes she was wearing. "The police did not confirm anything to us until morning," the woman's maternal aunt said. By 7 am on Tuesday, the victim's neighbours raised an alarm. "(The woman's) photograph was being circulated on WhatsApp groups in the area. Everyone was saying that she was the murder victim," said the sister. Panicked, the family rushed to nearby hospitals and police stations before getting to know who had been killed. In front of the mortuary on Tuesday, the family awaited the postmortem examination to take place.

Grenade Remark: Grilled for 5 hrs, Bajwa warns Mann 'to be prepared'; Congress rallies behind him

Senior Congress leader Partap Singh Bajwa was Tuesday questioned by the police for over five hours in connection with an FIR registered against him over his "50 grenades have reached Punjab" statement, even as the party leadership closed ranks behind him in a show of strength. After coming out of the police station, Bajwa termed his questioning as a "sustained interrogation" and said his targeting by the state's AAP government was "political vendetta" that will eventually lead to Congress' resurgence.

"This act of AAP government will be the cause of resurgence of Congress in Punjab. There was a sustained interrogation and we have given befitting reply to each question," he said. Bajwa, the Leader of the Opposition in the Punjab Assembly, also said calling him to the police station for questioning was an insult to the constitutional post he holds and alleged that Chief Minister Bhagwant Mann could not "digest" his expressing concern over the current law and order situation in the state. He also addressed Congress leaders and workers who had accompanied him to the police station and had been staging a sit-in there and thanked them for being united in their overwhelming support to him. "It is this very unity, which we need to remove the AAP government from power. There may have been mistakes made by me or by other party workers, but today everyone has come together for the sake of our honour," he said.

"The Congress has a very good leadership. After winning the elections (2027 Assembly polls) whoever is chosen, we will accept him as our leader. I give you my promise," he added.Bajwa has been booked under Sections 197(1)(d) (false and misleading information that endangers the country's sovereignty and unity) and 353(2) (false statements intended to create enmity and hatred or ill will) of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita. Earlier, Bajwa arrived at the police station at around 2:30 pm accompanied by party's state unit chief Amarinder Singh Raja Warring, MPs Sukhjinder Randhawa and Charanjit Singh Channi, MLAs Rana Gurjit Singh, Sukhpal Singh Khaira, Pargat Singh, and former MLAs Balbir Sidhu, and Kulbir Singh Zira among others. As only Bajwa and his counsel were allowed inside, Congress leaders staged a sit-in outside the police station and rised slogans against Chief Minister Bhagwant Mann and the AAP government, accusing them of misusing the police to target opposition leaders. During the time that Bajwa was questioned national leaders, including Congress president Mallikarjun Kharge and Leader of the Opposition in Lok Sabha Rahul Gandhi, remained in touch with the state lead-

Prior to that the state Congress leadership assembled at the Punjab Congress headquarters in a show of strength where Bajwa warned CM Mann to be prepared for retaliation. "If I remain alive, then I want to tell you Bhagwant Mann, you be prepared," he said. Bajwa said under the parliamentary system, the LoP is considered a shadow chief minister. "Will a shadow CM run away? The Punjab Police came at 8 pm and pasted summons outside my house to appear at the police station. I want to ask the CM if his government has ever pasted any such summon outside the house of a Punjab Police AIG who is on the run in a drugs case. Your police got the interview of gangster Lawrence Bishnoi done on a TV channel from inside jail," he said. The senior Congress leader said that if Mann had any idea of what happened in Punjab till 1992-93, he would realise the seriousness of the situation. "He must not have heard a gunshot in his entire life, how would he know what happened in Punjab and under what fresh threats Punjab is," the LoP said, warning that the situation in state right now is "very serious and critical". On Mann taking a swipe at him on hiring lawyers following the registration of an FIR, Bajwa said it was his democratic right and asked whether AAP leaders like Arvind Kejriwal and Manish Sisodia came out of Tihar Jail without any lawyers. Meanwhile, Warring cautioned police officers, including the DGP, Mohali SSP and the SHO concerned to ensure that they do not succumb to the political pressure of the AAP. He said, the Congress will remember each and every officer who has intimidated and persecuted the party leaders and workers. Questioning the action against Bajwa, he said the LoP had expressed concern over the law and order situation and he took the information about the bombs from a newspaper report. He also shared a detailed list of grenade attacks, which were reported from different parts of the state and which were initially dismissed by the police as the tyre bursts and cylin-


Replying to AAP's allegation that Bajwa had links with Pakistan, Warring said the Congress leader's father was assassinated and he escaped a bomb attack. Channi said Mann should have shown some grace and called up Bajwa to discuss the matter instead of ordering an FIR. He reminded Mann that he was not holding a "stage show" but a responsible position of that of the state's chief minister. He warned that dark clouds were hovering over the horizon of Punjab.Former Deputy CM Sukhjinder Randhawa said if Mann was so alert in registering FIRs, why he had not ordered any inquiry so far in the pro-Khalistan activist Gurpatwant Singh Pannun's "revelations that he had financed AAP campaign in 2017 and 2022". Randhawa also challenged Mann to reveal from where had those grenades come, which were lobbed at various police stations and other places in Punjab.In an interview with a private television channel, Bajwa claimed, "I have come to know that 50 bombs have reached Punjab. Of this, 18 have exploded,

Trump says he wants to give money and flight tickets to immigrants who 'self-deport'

U.S. President Donald Trump said he wants to give money and an aeroplane ticket to any immigrant who is in the country illegally who chooses to "self-deport," and work to get those who are "good" back in the US, a break from his usual hardline immigration rhetoric.Mr. Trump, who campaigned on a pledge to carry out mass deportations, said in a taped interview with Fox Noticias that aired Tuesday (April 15, 2025) that his administration is focused right now on getting "murderers" out of the country. But for others in the US illegally, he said, he's going to implement "a self-deportation program."Mr. Trump offered few details about the plan, including timing, but said the U.S. would provide immigrants airfare and a stipend. "We're going to give them a stipend. We're going to give them some money and a plane ticket, and then we're going to work with them — if they're good if we want them back in, we're going to work with them to get them back in as quickly as we can," Trump said.

Fox Noticias interviewer Rachel Campos-Duffy, who is married to Transportation Secretary Sean Duffy, played Mr. Trump a clip of a Mexican man who she said arrived in the U.S. illegally more than 20 years ago and has children who are American citizens. It is not clear if the man now has legal permission to be in the country, but Ms. Campos-Duffy said the man said that even though he cannot vote, he would have supported Mr. Trump. She played a clip of the man saying he agrees that if someone commits a crime,



himself."I look at this man. I say, this is a guy that we want to keep," Mr. Trump replied. "I'll probably take heat for saying it." He then asked if the man was supposed to be deported and answered his own question: "No, he didn't say that. Good." "I don't think he's in any danger of it," Mr. Trump said. The Republican President also said he wants to help hotels and farms get the workers they need and recommend people to fill needed positions. He said that would be "very soothing" to farmers and said he ultimately wants workers who are in the U.S. illegally to leave and come back with legal permission, but he did not outline any steps to do that. We're doing a self-deportation, and we're going to make it comfortable for people," he said. "And we're going to work with those people to come back into our country

US President ramps up conflict against defiant University, demands apology

U.S. President Donald Trump escalated his war against elite U.S. universities Tuesday with a threat to strip Harvard's tax-exempt status if the country's most famous educational establishment refuses to submit to wide-ranging government oversight. Harvard stands out for defying Mr. Trump, in contrast to several other universities and a string of powerful law firms that have folded under intense pressure from the White House in its crackdown on American institutions. The threat of a major tax bill comes after Harvard saw \$2.2 billion in federal funding frozen on Monday.Mr. Trump said non-profit Harvard "should lose its Tax Exempt Status and be Taxed as a Political Entity" if it does not submit to his demands for the college to change the way it runs itself, including selection of students and authority for professors. Tax-exempt status is "totally contingent on acting in the PUBLIC INTEREST," he added in the post on his Truth Social network.Mr. Trump and his White House team have justified their pressure campaign on universities as a reaction to what they say is uncontrolled anti-Semitism and support for the Palestinian militant group Hamas.Mr. Trump "wants to see Harvard apologize. And Harvard should apologize," Press Secretary Karoline Leavitt told journalists. The anti-Semitism allegations are based on controversy at protests against Israel's war in Gaza that swept across campuses last year. Columbia University in New York — an epicenter of the protests — stood down last month and agreed to oversight of its Middle Eastern department after being threatened with a loss of \$400 million in federal funds. The White House has also strong-armed

dozens of universities and colleges with threats to remove federal funding over their policies meant to encourage racial diversity among students and staff. The White House has cited similarly ideological goals in its unprecedented crackdown on law firms, pressuring them to volunteer hundreds of millions of dollars' worth of legal work to support issues that Trump supports. Harvard, the oldest and wealthiest university in the United States, is now the most prominent institution to resist Mr. Trump's ever-growing bid for control. The Trump administration is demanding that a wide range of Harvard departments come under outside supervision for potential anti-Semitism. It also seeks to require "viewpoint diversity" in student admissions and choice of professors. Harvard President Alan Garber said the school would not "negotiate over its independence or its constitutional rights.""Neither Harvard nor any other private university can allow itself to be taken over by the federal government," he wrote. The standoff likely sets up a long-running, high-profile fight. Hard-line presidential advisors like Stephen Miller depict universities as bastions of anti-conservative forces that need to be brought to heel — a message that resonates strongly with Trump's hard-right anti-elite base. For Trump's opponents, the Harvard refusal to bend marks a chance to draw a line in the sand against an authoritarian takeover."Harvard has set an example for other higher-ed institutions — rejecting an unlawful and ham-handed attempt to stifle academic freedom," former president Barack Obama wrote on X. "Let's hope other institutions follow suit. "The Harvard newspaper, "The Crimson," applauded Garber's defiance, saying "Harvard sent its clearest, most courageous message to date: Our values aren't for sale."

Whispers at the check posts in Manipur

As ethnic leaders and stakeholders sat across negotiating tables in Delhi discussing a road map for peace in Manipur, I chose to travel in the opposite direction — into the heart of the troubled State. I needed to see for myself what the numbers, the reports, and the headlines could not convey. What I witnessed was a land fractured not just by violence, but by silence — a silence that screamed of distrust, despair, and deep wounds. A stark contrast between high-level deliberations and the deepening scars within the State's fractured society.

After spending time in Imphal, I headed to Churachandpur. The road, once a vital lifeline of commerce and mobility, has become a militarised corridor lined with suspicion. Within just one kilometre around the so-called "buffer zone", I counted no fewer than 11 check gates. They were manned variously by the Assam Rifles, Border Security Force, Central Reserve Police Force, Indian Army, Manipur Police Commandos, India Reserve Battalion, and State Police, with one gate manned by Meitei personnel, other by tribal personnel. It was as though the very landscape had been dissected, not just by ethnicity but by uniform and gun. At every checkpoint, my identity card issued by the Government of India was inspected, my details noted down. I asked one officer why there were so many barriers. His reply, whispered under his breath, was chilling: "We are here to stop people from each side from crossing to the other."These "sides" are not borders between nations. They are internal barricades within India — separating Meitei-majority valley areas from Kuki-Zo-dominated hill districts. Communities once intertwined now stand estranged, watching each other through barbed wire and suspicion. Deepening divideThe roots of Manipur's crisis run deep, fed by decades of unresolved tensions around land rights, demographic pressures, and ethnic identity. The spark in 2023 came from a court ruling. On April 19, 2023, the Manipur High Court directed the State to consider granting Scheduled Tribe (ST) status to the Meiteis. This rekindled an old and volatile debate. The Meiteis, forming around 53% of the population and largely confined to the Imphal valley, cited cultural uniqueness and shrinking land access. The tribal communities of Kukis, Zomis, and Nagas who already enjoy ST status and constitutional protections under Article 371C, saw this as a direct threat to their protected lands, rights and cultural autonomy. On May 3, 2023, a Tribal Solidarity March organised by the All Tribal Students' Union Manipur turned into a flashpoint. What followed was months of horrific ethnic violence. Over 200 lives had been lost and more than 60,000 displaced so far.

The Martyrs' Park at Churachandpur. | Photo Credit: Bijoy A. SangmaToday, Manipur is one of India's most militarised regions with even civilians armed. The valleybased outfits such as Arambai Tenggol and Meitei Leepun and Kuki-Zo insurgent groups once under Suspension of Operations (SoO) have resurfaced with renewed vengeance. The SoO framework has collapsed. Trust between state and citizen is broken. Yet this militarisation has not brought peace. One sees guns, but hears only silence. At Martyrs Park at Churachandpur, I stood amid 126 graves of young men and women, many of them barely in their twenties. The silence was heartbreaking, like a scream that had forgotten how to leave the body. Relief camps now dot the State like islands of survival. As of March 2025, there are 283 relief camps across Manipur, housing 58,244 displaced persons. The State provides rice, dal, oil, chana, onion, salt, and tin fish, but little else. In one camp, I visited a

room where four families, each with four or five members, shared a single space. They cook in turns, sleep in shifts, and store their few belongings in cardboard boxes. Some families have started rearing livestock on the premises to generate income; others go to town daily for wage labour to feed their children. When I asked a woman what she felt about those from the other community in her old village, now reduced to ashes, she looked down and said: "I feel angry. There's hurt inside us. But not against the people we lived with. It's an unexplainable anger... a frustration with everything." Another man, when I asked if he ever spoke to his old friends on the phone, nodded quietly: "Yes, once in a while. We talk." What would he do if they met again? His answer floored me: "I will hug them... and cry. I am sure when we meet face to face, they will not kill me. Nor will I."Beneath the surface of ethnic hatred lies a deeper churn - Manipur's location in the Golden Triangle has made it a hotbed of drug trafficking, with reports of rising poppy cultivation. Crackdowns in tribal areas are seen as biased, inflaming anger. Meanwhile, the porous Myanmar border, and

influx of undocumented migrants, have fuelled valley anxi-

eties over cultural dilution. Every side has its own fear nar-

rative. Every side feels unheard. Delusions of dialogue?

The recent tripartite talks in Delhi have failed to inspire public trust. While representatives met under the watch of the Union Home Ministry, the Coordinating Committee on Manipur Integrity (COCOMI), a major Meitei civil society platform, rejected the process, stating that it "distorts the conflict". In a sharply worded statement, COCOMI alleged that the government had reduced the crisis to ethnic violence, while ignoring concerns of narco-terrorism, illegal immigration from Myanmar, and the erosion of valley land rights. The Kukis, in turn, accuse the government of enabling Meitei majoritarian aggression and turning a blind eye to attacks on tribal villages and churches. Many now demand a separate administrative arrangement, a proposal that is fiercely opposed by valley groups. With mutual distrust at its peak, the Delhi talks appear to be more about political optics than genuine reconciliation. What peace requiresManipur's crisis is no longer just about identity. It is about dignity, justice, and a future worth rebuilding. It is time to move beyond platitudes of peace and address the deeper pathologies of the conflict. A few critical steps can serve as entry points. First, neutral mediation: peace talks must be facilitated by neutral, credible mediators, possibly including non-governmental actors or retired judges or international peacebuilders trusted by both communities. Second, autonomous governance models: exploring a semi-autonomous administrative framework for hill regions may allow both groups to coexist with dignity and autonomy, protecting cultural identities while preserving the State's unity. Third, Truth and Reconciliation Commission: an independent body to document atrocities, ensure accountability, and create a space for public testimony, to hear every voice, and offer a chance at healing. Fourth, demilitarisation and economic reintegration: a phased withdrawal of armed civilian groups, accompanied by skill development, livelihood support, and psychological healing. Last, inter-community youth engagement: Initiatives such as inter-community sports, education exchange, and joint cultural festivals can slowly rebuild trust and replant the seeds of friendship. The tragedy of Manipur is not just a local problem — it is a national test. It is a mirror. It shows us the cost of delayed justice, unhealed wounds, and performative politics. It challenges India's constitutional promise of justice, equality, and fraternity. The excessive use of force, biased narratives, and bureaucratic indifference only deepen the wounds. At a time when the rest of the country is moving ahead, Manipur stands still, grieving, waiting, resisting. The soldiers at the buffer zone may keep people physically apart, but only political courage and moral imagination can bring hearts together again. As I left Churachandpur, one weary officer at a check post said: "We are not peacekeepers any more. We are just holding the silence." That silence must not become our collective national conscience. Afghan children will die because of U.S. funding cuts, aid official says

The warning follows the cancellation of foreign aid contracts by President Donald Trump's administration, including to Afghanistan where more than half of the population needs humanitarian assistance to survive. Action Against Hunger initially stopped all U.S.-funded activities in March after the money dried up suddenly. But it kept the most critical services going in northeastern Badakhshan province and the capital Kabul through its own budget, a measure that stopped this month. Its therapeutic feeding unit in Kabul is empty and closing this week. There are no patients, and staff contracts are ending because of the U.S. funding cuts."If we don't treat children with acute malnutrition, there is a very high risk of (them) dying," Action Against Hunger's country director, Cobi Rietveld, told The Associated Press. "No child should die because of malnutrition. If we don't fight hunger, people will die of hunger. If they don't get medical care, there is a high risk of dying. They don't get medical

More than 3.5 million children in Afghanistan will suffer from acute malnutrition this year, an increase of 20% from 2024. Decades of conflict — including the 20-year U.S. war with the Taliban — as well as entrenched poverty and climate shocks have contributed to the country's humanitarian crisis.Last year, the United States provided 43% of all international humanitarian funding to Afghanistan.Ms. Rietveld said there were other nongovernmental organizations dealing with funding cuts to Afghanistan. "So when we cut the funding, there will be more children who are going to die of malnutrition."The children who came to the feeding unit often could not walk or even crawl. Sometimes they were unable to eat because they didn't have the energy. All the services were provided free of charge, including three meals a day. Ms. Rietveld said children would need to be

referred to other places, where there was less capacity and

technical knowledge.

Dr. Abdul Hamid Salehi said Afghan mothers were facing a crisis. Poverty levels among families meant it was impossible to treat severely malnourished children in private clinics. "People used to come to us in large numbers, and they are still hoping and waiting for this funding to be found again or for someone to sponsor us so that we can

resume our work and start serving patients once more.'

Chinese President Xi makes a case for free trade as he tours Southeast Asia

Bangkok: China's Xi is making the case for free trade as he tours Southeast Asia this week, presenting China as a source of "stability and certainty." On Monday, he was welcomed to Hanoi with pomp and ceremony by Vietnam's President Luong Cuong. He arrived in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia's capital, later Tuesday, for a three-day visit and will end his tour with a stop in Cambodia. In Hanoi, Xi had a meeting with Vietnam's Communist Party General Secretary To Lam, where he said the two countries "have brought the world valuable stability and certainty" in a "turbulent world."He also paid respects at the mausoleum of Ho Chi Minh, the founder of the Vietnamese Communist Party. "As beneficiaries of economic globalization, both China and Vietnam should strengthen strategic resolve, jointly oppose unilateral bullying acts, uphold the global free trade system, and keep global industrial and supply chains stable," he added, according to a statement from China's Ministry of Foreign Affairs. China and Vietnam signed a series of memorandums on cooperation in supply chains and a joint railway project, and Xi also promised greater access for Vietnamese agricultural exports to China, although few details were made public about the agreements.US President Donald Trump complained about the meeting, which comes days after his tariffs upended global markets and left governments across the world scrambling. Why are ASHA workers protesting in Kerala? | Explained



The story so far: For over two months now, a section of Kerala's 26,125-strong community of Accredited Social Health Activists (ASHAs) have been on a day-night agitation on the streets demanding better remuneration and retirement benefits. While the agitation gained much attention and was also raised in Parliament, the issues raised by the ASHAs remain unresolved.

Why are they protesting?

ASHAs in Kerala are given a monthly honorarium of ?7,000 and a fixed incentive of ?3,000. Depending on the area where they work (for example, the tribal belt), they also get additional incentives. The payment of the entire honorarium and incentives are dependent on them fulfilling certain work-related criteria. The honorarium is paid by the State while the incentives are paid by the Centre and State at a 60-40 ratio. The State government claims that Kerala pays one of the highest honorarium to ASHAs, whereas the incentives given to ASHAs by the Union government for various services has remained the same from the inception of the scheme. Kerala Health Minister Veena George's statement that almost all ASHAs in the State are drawing anywhere from ?10,000- ?13,000 a month was refuted by the ASHAs who pointed out that they received much less in reality because of the criteria linked to honorariums.

What are the long term demands?

In Kerala, which has one of the highest minimum wage structures, and where daily wages for various jobs range anywhere from ?700-?1,200, ASHAs earn less than 250 daily. Though their immediate demands were the release

of pending amounts due to them, they also demanded that the criteria linked to the honorarium be removed. Their main demand is to hike the honorarium to ?21,000 a month so that they receive at least minimum wage (?700 daily). They also sought a lump sum of ?5 lakh on retirement. The ASHA scheme, when conceived in 2005, envisaged ASHAs as health volunteers rather than as a regular workforce. Hence they receive no fixed salary, no pension or other social security benefits. ASHAs point out that they would forever remain on the fringes unless they were made into a regular workforce.

What is the State saying?

The State Government has all along maintained that ASHAs come under the Union government and that it was entirely up to the Centre to change the fate of ASHAs by making fundamental changes in the scheme such as revising the incentive pattern and changing their employment status from non-paid "health volunteers" to a regular workforce. The State has also called out the Centre for refusing to give the cash grant it owed to the State National Health Mission (NHM) for the year 2023-24 — ?636 crore which has precipitated the current crisis and totally derailed the functioning of the NHM. Though the Government issued orders de-linking the conditions which were attached to the honorarium payment, it has refused to relent to the ASHAs' demand for a hike in honorarium or retirement benefits, citing the State's precarious finances. Moreover, the State government is peeved that the Kerala ASHA Health Workers' Association (KAHWA) which is leading the agitation is doing so in front of the Secretariat and not in front of the Raj Bhavan. It has tried to discredit the agitation, accusing KAHWA of leading an "anti-government" movement.

What is the current position?

The Union Health Minister has declared in the Rajya Sabha that the incentives for ASHAs would be revised, yet no timeframe has been fixed for the same. During the last round of negotiations, the State Government put forth a suggestion that a committee be set up to study the issues of ASHAs, including the honorarium hike. KAHWA suggested that in the interim, ASHAs be given a hike of at least ?3,000 — an increase of ?100 per day — which was rejected by the State.

Wealthy Indians under-reporting their income to avoid taxes: study

A paper studying national accounts — and sampling asset disclosures by Lok Sabha MPs — found rich Indians are likely under-reporting their income, raising the possibility that income inequality in India is starker than previous studies may have indicated. The paper by Delhi School of Economics director Ram Singh finds that "the wealthier a household is, the smaller the income it reports relative to its wealth". It is not uncommon for affluent individuals' wealth, such as fixed assets and long-term capital investments, to relatively outgrow their income. But data from the national accounts, income tax statistics from the Central Board of Direct Taxes, and election candidate filings show that "a 1% increase in family wealth is associated with a more than 0.6% decrease in the reported income-wealth ratio," the paper says. "The decreasing trend in the income-wealth ratio persists for all versions of income reported to tax authorities namely the income reported as taxable and the total income declared, including capital income." The paper was published in the May 2025 edition of the International Association of Research in Income and Wealth's Review of Income and Wealth. Going to the richest households, the relative share of reported income against wealth shrinks even further. For a family listed in the 2021 Forbes richest Indians list, the study estimates that income is a mere 1/12th of wealth. This, Mr. Singh says, is likely indicative of income concealment, likely to avoid taxes. The result has been a regressive taxation structure, where the effective income tax rates actually reduce the richer an individual gets. The data throws up anomalies; namely, while an increase in ownership of equity shares results in a comparable boost in income as well as wealth, an increase in ownership of agricultural land and commercial property decreases the ratio. This should not be happening, Mr. Singh points out, as "rental yields" are nearly always better than equity dividends. "Absent tax evasion, these results would seem counter-



intuitive," the paper says, pointing out what appears to be, specifically, under-reporting of farm rent income, and abuse of farmland ownership by declaring farm income to escape toyotics.

Lok Sabha MP affidavits were studied because they may represent a socially representative dataset. Here, too, Mr. Singh found signs of similar abuse. One curious exception was candidates with a serious chance of winning, whose disclosures showed fewer signs of under-reporting: "That the reported ratios increase with vote share also implies that media and official scrutiny have a more pronounced effect on the reporting of income relative to wealth," he wrote. The findings could exacerbate the already dire assessments of Indian income inequality. A paper published by the World Inequality Lab last year assessed the share of wealth held by India's top 1% earners as 40.1% and the share of income at 22.6%. These findings likely underestimate the extent of the inequality, Mr. Singh writes. Unlike that paper, which pushed for a 2% wealth tax on the ultrarich, Mr. Singh did not make a judgement call on the structure of Indian taxation. "Macroeconomic analysis is beyond the scope of this paper," he wrote.

A proclamation of democracy in legislative process

The recent judgment by the Supreme Court of India, in The State of Tamil Nadu vs Governor of Tamil Nadu, was a historic one. But it has also led to another development — the passing of laws without the assent of the Governor or President, which is an unprecedented event in the history of the republic. The Court invoked Article 142 of the Constitution to do "complete justice" in the case and fixed a time limit for the gubernatorial and presidential responses to the Bills passed by the State legislature. It interpreted Articles 200 and 201 of the Constitution dealing with the powers and functions of the Governors and the President and laid down principles governing these provisions. It emphatically said that the Governor cannot torpedo the laws made by the legislature that reflects the people's will. The judgment that runs into 414 pages has embarrassed the Centre. The Governor of Kerala is on record for his criticism of the judgment. He has expressed his view that the Court has overstepped into the domain of Parliament and exceeded its authority by subjecting even the President of India to judicial review. The issue of interpretation

The Constitution is not a static document when it requires interpretation. The Court does not read the text of the Constitution in a mechanical way; rather, it interprets it organically in each situation. A centralist Constitution such as India's often calls for a federalist elucidation, to balance the interest of the States, which essentially means the people of India. Again, very many deficits in the constitutional provisions might require imaginative and purposive construction to fulfil their objective. Scholar Robert Post has rejected the plain meaning theory of interpretation as not a theory at all, for it does not actually involve a process of interpretation.

Constitutional interpretation, unlike statutory interpretation, is bound to be panoramic, futuristic and extensive. The Court's long journey from the narrow understanding of Article 21 in A.K. Gopalan (1950), which validated the preventive detention, to the broader prepositions on privacy based on the very same article in K.S. Puttaswamy (2017) shows the significant transformation in the process. The present judgment, which was rendered by Justice J.B. Pardiwala and Justice R. Mahadevan, demonstrates constitutional modernity and realism. Article 200 of the Constitution is about the Governor's duties (not powers) with respect to the Bills passed by the State legislature. Primarily, when a Bill is placed before her, the Governor has three ways ahead: to give assent; to withhold it; or to make a reference to the President. Returning the Bill that is withheld, for reconsideration is the next option. Once a Bill so returned is reiterated by the House with or without amendment, the Governor cannot withhold assent any further. The Article also provides for reserving the Bill for presidential clearance in certain cases. Situations of repugnancy, and patent unconstitutionality on account of breach of express constitutional provisions could be reasons for such a course. Article 201 is on the obligations of the President on reservation of the Bill for her consideration. She can either give assent or withhold it. Also, she can direct the Governor to return the Bill to the President with a message when it is not a money Bill. Reconsideration of such a returned Bill should happen within six months. On reiteration, the Bill should be again 'reconsidered' by the President. This scheme indicated in the constitutional text is not comprehensive. The Court, while deciding the illustrative instance of the Tamil Nadu Governor dragging the Bills, had occasion to scan the intent and the content of the constitutional provisions.

Karnataka Gig Workers Bill: What stayed and what changed



The Karnataka Cabinet, on April 11, cleared the muchawaited Karnataka Platform-based Gig Workers (Social Security and Welfare) Bill, 2024, which is now expected to be introduced as an Ordinance. If passed, this would make Karnataka the second State in the country to introduce legislation for the welfare of platform-based gig workers after Bajasthan

Why legislation?

Reports suggest that there are around 2 lakh platformbased gig workers in Bengaluru working with companies such as Swiggy, Zomato, Uber, Ola, Urban Company, Porter, Amazon, Flipkart and so on. An evolving and nascent sector, the gig economy is expected to create 23.5 million jobs in India by 2030 as per a 2022 NITI Aayog report.Platform-based gig workers, who are not full-time employees and are often referred to as 'partners' by the aggregators, enjoy a certain degree of work flexibility unlike jobs in the formal sector. However, given the employment is outside the traditional employer-employee relationship, workers do not have the safety of labour protection laws. Multiple instances of worker neglect and exploitation have been reported over the years necessitating the need for legislation to ensure the protection and welfare of the workers. Although the Central government, in 2020, passed the Code on Social Security (CoSS) which defined gig workers for the first time in India, it is yet to be implemented. In 2023, the Congress government which was then in power in Rajasthan enacted the Rajasthan Platform-Based Gig Workers (Registration and Welfare) Act, 2023 just before the state elections. The subsequent BJP government in the State left the law unimplemented.

What's the timeline?

It was in June 2024 that the Siddaramaiah-led government first published the draft of the Karnataka Platformbased Gig Workers (Social Security and Welfare) Bill. According to officials, the Bill was drafted after several meetings with various stakeholders. While it was expected to be tabled in the monsoon session, industry bodies such as NASSCOM and IAMAI representing various tech companies registered strong opposition against several clauses of the draft Bill and demanded more time to submit their feedback. Following this, the draft Bill was put on the back burner, much to the dismay of gig worker unions, who have since been pushing for its passage at the earliest. In the first week of April, the top brass of the Karnataka government met with Leader of the Opposition Rahul Gandhi, with whom the Bill was discussed. Legislation for gig workers was one of the promises of Congress before the general elections as well as the state elections in Karnataka. Following the meeting, Karnataka Labour Minister Santosh Lad confirmed that the Bill had been finalized and would soon be passed. On April 11, the Karnataka Cabinet cleared the Bill.

What are the key clauses?

The Karnataka Platform-based Gig Workers Bill defines a gig worker as a person who performs work or participates in a work arrangement that results in a given rate of payment, based on the terms and conditions laid out in such contract and includes all piece-rate work, and whose work is sourced through a platform, in the services specified in the Schedule - I. The Bill that emphasizes the rights of gig workers aims to create a welfare fund for the workers, places obligations on aggregators, and proposes a welfare fee of 1%-5% of the payout to the worker during each transaction. All sum received will go to the welfare fund for the workers. A gig workers' welfare board will be established to ensure registration of workers by the platforms, welfare fee collection, and implementation of social security schemes. Aggregators are required to furnish their database of all gig workers to the board. The proposed Payment and Welfare Fee Verification System (PWFVS) will track every payment made to the workers and the welfare fee deducted by the aggregators.

How does the Bill help?

The platforms are required to provide a work environment that is safe and without risk to the health of the worker and ensure that the worker has adequate periods of rest and access to sanitary and rest facilities. Addressing arbitrary termination, which has been one of the major concerns of workers, the Bill notes that no worker can be terminated without a valid written reason and prior notice of 14 days, except in instances where they have caused bodily harm. The Bill also mandates platforms to enter into transparent and fair contracts with the workers and stresses on the need for transparency with respect to the automated monitoring and decision-making system. It proposes a twotiered grievance redressal mechanism wherein the worker is required to approach the internal dispute resolution committee first. If the committee fails to provide an 'Action Taken Report' in 14 days or the worker is unsatisfied, the grievance will be forwarded to the board.

What were the objections?

Following the publishing of the draft Bill in 2024, industry bodies, the Department of Electronics, IT-BT and Science & Technology, and Commerce & Industries department had raised several objections. The key concerns included how the bill defined 'gig worker', welfare fee per transaction, duplicate obligation for aggregators once CoSS 2020 is implemented, clarity on how the welfare fund would be utilised, grievance redressal mechanism under the Industrial Disputes Act and criminal liability on platforms for noncompliance, among others. While CoSS 2020 defined a gig worker as a person who performs work or participates in a work arrangement and earns from such activities outside of traditional employer-employee relationships, the Karnataka bill did not explicitly mention that the gig work

was outside traditional work relationships. Hence, it was demanded that the bill align its definition of gig worker with that of CoSS instead of creating a parallel system which equates gig workers to full time employees.

What were the reasons for objections?

A note from the IT-BT department argued that the welfare fee on a per-transaction basis was not suitable for all business models. It contended that the fee must be 1-2% of a platform's state-specific turnover or 5% of gig workers' payout, whichever is lower. To avoid duplicate obligations for platforms to contribute to both state and central funds, it also demanded a sunset clause or transition mechanism that addressed this issue once CoSS was implemented. The previous version of the Bill proposed a grievance redressal mechanism under the Industrial Disputes Act. This was strongly opposed citing that the Act was applicable only to workmen covered under conventional labour laws. Clarity on welfare fund utilisation was sought, and objections were raised to the central transaction information and management system (CTIMS), citing the compliance burden on platform companies. The draft Bill's demand for platforms to disclose their algorithmic decision-making process was also opposed, contending that the anonymised nature of it was their competitive edge. There were also objections regarding the 14-day notice period for workers before termination. Commerce and industries department argued that wide ranging powers to the state government allowing it to interfere with the algorithms, contracts and day to day management of platforms was against the spirit of ease of doing business.

What were the changes made?

Following the objections, a few amendments were made to the draft Bill. The grievance redressal mechanism was removed from the ambit of the Industrial Disputes Act, and criminalisation for non-compliance was ruled out. While the Bill retained the 14-day notice period, a provision was added that it was not required in situations where bodily harm was caused. The Bill gave more clarity regarding the welfare fee compared to the initial draft which was ambiguous regarding the deductions. In its response to the objections made, the labour department noted that rules would be framed separately for platforms, taking into consideration sector-specific business models and without disturbing financial sustainability, cross-subsidisation and job creation in the industry. It also pointed out that a sunset clause was introduced to the Bill and platforms need not contribute to CoSS if they are already contributing under the state bill.Regarding the objection to CTIMS, the department argued that aggregators are already tracking and storing data at an individual level. CTIMS was changed to Welfare Fee Verification System (WFVS), which only requires integration with the API and no additional compliance, it said. The Bill adhered to its definition of 'gig worker' noting that it assumed employer-employee relationship only to the extent of providing basic minimum social security benefits and clarified that traditional labour laws do not apply to the sector. "Although there is flexibility of work for workers, platforms enter into contracts, define their payout, allocate and control work and in some cases provide benefits and insurance. So, the employer-employee relationship exists to an extent. The bill addresses this unique nature of evolving relationships in the labour market by using a definition of Gig worker without establishing any explicit partnership status," noted the response from Labour Department.

Air hostess on ventilator in Gurugram hospital sexually assaulted by staff: Police

An air hostess was allegedly sexually harassed while she was on a ventilator and in a semi-conscious state during treatment at a private hospital in Gurugram. The alleged incident took place on April 6, but the complaint was lodged at Sadar Police Station on April 14, a day after she was discharged from hospital, said the Gurugram Police.

The 46-year-old woman had come to Gurugram for a training on behalf of her company and was staying at a five-star hotel. During this time, her condition deteriorated due to drowning in the swimming pool after which she was admitted to a private hospital for treatment. On April 5, her husband admitted her to another private hospital in the city. She was on ventilator when a hospital staff allegedly sexually harassed her. She was in a semi-conscious state at the time of alleged harassment and could not resist. Two nurses were also around, but they did not intervene, according to the complaint.

After being discharged from hospital on April 13, she confided in her husband about the harassment and he, in turn, made a call to the Police Control Room. She later filed a formal complaint at the police station in this connection in the presence of her legal advisor. The Gurugram Police said the victim's statement was recorded before the Magistrate and the matter was under investigation. The footage of the closed-circuit television cameras inside hospital was being scrutinised and the accused would be soon arrested, said the police.

Doctoral distress: What's broken in India's PhD system and how to fix it



The PhD is often the lifetime work of a researcher Many drop out -- some estimates put drop-out figures at as high as 40%. And some hang on even if they lost interest mid-course purely for the sake of getting the degree. With the unfamiliarity of the PhD coursework and rigorous review meetings, the PhD program remains an ordeal for many. It is common for students to become disinterested and leave the program midway or change their supervisor. All of this takes mental health for a toss, and students lose valuable years of their lives. Many students experience delays in getting their fellowships for months on end. Hence, it is not surprising that they lose interest, as most of them are in the age group of 25-30 and may have family responsibilities. However, this is just one of the many problems that create hardships for PhD students.

While different institutes have different selection processes, most conduct an entrance exam or select students for a PhD in the sciences based on a GATE score, then conduct interviews, after which a specific number of students are offered PhD positions within the institute. A new PhD student is typically required to complete coursework at the beginning of a program, the duration of which varies among different institutes but usually ranges from one to two years. Some institutes also administer a comprehensive exam at the end of the coursework to assess students' subject knowledge and research capability. Students commence their PhD work only after completing the necessary assessments. Coursework aims to create a foundation, preparing students for their research work. However, it is often considered a mere 'requirement' towards a doctoral degree, where students study to obtain grades. Unlike bachelor's or master's courses, PhD coursework requires thorough reading and preparation, delivering seminars on different topics. and also includes courses on communication skills. Seminar courses help students learn the literature review process, while courses on communication skills are tailored to train students in writing papers, reports, and presenting their

Anish* defended his thesis in December 2023 from a prestigious Indian institute in chemistry and is now working as a postdoctoral fellow in the U.S. Anish found the coursework helpful, as most courses are 'bridging courses' that help close knowledge gaps. He added that a course in instrumentation helped students understand the principles and workings of laboratory equipment. Such courses are immensely useful to students who come after a master's with little exposure to experimental techniques, especially in handling laboratory equipment independently. The PhD program in most places is structured – a research proposal seminar at the end of the 1st year, annual progress seminars at the end of every subsequent year, and a synopsis seminar after four or five years, where students present their doctoral research and later publish it in the form of a thesis, with research publications in peer-reviewed journals. Students finally defend their thesis before external examiners, and thesis committee members and are awarded a PhD upon successful completion.

Why do PhD students lose interest?

Senior researchers are concerned that PhD programs in India have deviated far from being a 'doctorate in philosocritically. "Previously, students were expected to have a wider view of their general area. It has evolved to becoming specialists and sometimes technical specialists with an extremely narrow view", says Prof. Sandhya Koushika, cellular neurobiologist and principal investigator at the Tata Institute of Fundamental Research (TIFR), Mumbai.

Students may join a laboratory right after their master's, where rote learning is still common. In fact, most students join a PhD program just because it is the 'next obvious step' after a master's program, but may not know what doing research is like on a day-to-day basis or the true trajectory of a PhD program. While most master's students are expected to have worked on a research project before joining, the experience of working in a research laboratory is entirely different. A PhD program is a mixture of being both-a student as they are learning, and an employee as they get a stipend. However, unclear expectations or gaps in communication can make students feel vulnerable. "The supervisor needs you to do something at that one particular time, and it absolutely has to be done. Sometimes this understanding doesn't work in the favor of a student, and we feel like we could be taken for granted," says Prasanna Simha, a PhD student at the University of Transdisciplinary Health Sciences and Technology (TDU), Bengaluru. A few years ago, Prasanna worked as a junior research fellow (JRF) in a prestigious institute in Bengaluru. The supervisor expressed interest in enrolling him for a PhD and assigned a few projects. While working on one of the projects, he was abruptly asked to leave the program, as he didn't know specific skills that students usually learn on the go.

Without a fellowship and a secure position, he was left in the lurch. "I felt at that point that the professor wanted me to be prepared to know a lot of things already even before I got to know about them for the first time," says Prasanna. Fortunately, he could join another laboratory at TDU for a PhD program, where he had worked earlier. Prof. Koushika explains how she leads discussions with students. "The question that I often ask young people is, are you interested in science? Why do you want to do a PhD? Sometimes, you can see from the answers that they have a very romantic view (of doing science). And their romantic view comes from listening to Nobel laureates or other famous scientists."Importantly, research advances with debate and criticism, and not all students are comfortable with this process. Constructive criticism by experts and peers is an integral part of doing science. Progress in the lab may not always move forward as planned. Experiments fail; at times, an entire idea may fail, leading to uncertainty. "The levels of uncertainty for a lot of students don't align with a romantic view of science that they hold," says Prof. Koushika.

Students sometimes feel stuck and unmotivated as techniques do not work consistently or projects don't give the expected results. It requires months of revisiting their hypotheses, re-designing experiments, and often starting afresh. But that's how science works in practice, and it should not dampen a student's spirits long-term. "Sometimes, you might still not know the answer, and that should be okay. That should not stand in the way of awarding a PhD degree, because that is also science", says Prasanna. Despite the uncertainty, supervisors, thesis committee members, and peers should work to build a strong support system for a student. How a student navigates their PhD depends on the kind of feedback and support they get from their mentors and peers that should help build their

"The unstructuredness of a PhD is like a marathon. You need to figure out what gels with you and keeps you going. But what keeps you going comes down to the people who hand you water and refreshments", says Anish. He adds that the annual progress review meetings can be helpful, provided committee members give honest and constructive feedback.

The ordeal is over. Now what?

The next career step after a PhD is often to get postdoctoral experience in laboratories within or outside India, and eventually, apply for a faculty position. Today, careers in communication, industry, education, etc., are open to or may require those with a PhD degree. Many students who aspire for non-academic careers sometimes disregard their PhD training, using it merely as a stepping stone to get the degree. Discussions on post-PhD careers outside academia happen rarely. When they do, "the discussions come at the end, like the third year or the fourth year, of the PhD program", says Dr. Vishal Govind Rao, Associate Professor, Dept. of Chemistry at IIT Kanpur. Even if students find interest in non-academic jobs, they have to be carefully oriented. "A PhD is not just about publishing; it is a training for one's lifetime," he adds. Independent thinking, problem-solving, and communication skills learned during PhD training are immensely helpful, even in non-academic careers. The success of a PhD student is typically viewed in terms of the number of papers published and the journals in which they are published, with insufficient weight given to scholarly thinking. Typically, one or two publications in peer-reviewed journals are necessary for getting a PhD degree from most institutes. Publications are more than a checkbox where the number and quality of publications determine career trajectories. However, the pressure to publish can lead to ethical violations such as data fabrication and plagiarism to complete the mandatory graduation requirements. Scholarly publications are the yardsticks by which academic success is measured. Dr. Govind Rao says, "Publication is the currency in academia. It gets you the funding, the collaborations." He is concerned that in many laboratories, PhD students are only trained to generate data, while supervisors design the projects and experiments, write the research articles, and respond to reviewers' comments in the peer-review process. This leaves no room for students to become independent thinkers and scholars. It's not just the publication but thinking about the philosophical aspect of research that is equally important, says Dr. Govind Rao. Writing a research paper, submitting manuscripts, and addressing comments from peer review are skills that students learn on the job. Several institutes offer courses in communication. Despite this basic training, navigating the publication process can be challenging, especially for the first time. Yet, it is essential that students learn to write a research paper on their own, says Dr. Govind Rao. A supervisor's career mainly depends on the number and quality of publications from their laboratory. It becomes the 'norm' for some supervisors to write the research papers themselves, taking away a training opportunity for a student. "Much of what the students do becomes integrally tied, especially in India, to the career of the principal investigator (supervisor) who leads the group", says Prof.

Prof. Koushika suggests that a student's productivity should not be tied to the supervisor's career. Decoupling the two could ease the pressure on students to a large extent. She suggests a system with two tracks-one focused on doing PhD in the traditional way, geared towards an academic career, and the other focused only on employment outside academic research. The latter could be a straight track, without comprehensive exams and coursework, and students could focus on developing transferable skills, perhaps even bypassing publishing papers to get a degree. Alternatively, we need a 'non-student' cadre of scientific humanpower who can work especially on projects with long incubation times. Prof. Koushika recognizes that the 'twotrack system' may not solve the problem but strongly expresses the need to address it. "We need many more ideas because otherwise young people end up being very upset and cynical about their PhD journey, when it should be a journey of discovery and joy."

Urban consumers are worried about their income levels



This March, while a significant share of urban consumers remained optimistic about job opportunities, many continued to be pessimistic about income levels. This suggests that although jobs are available in urban areas, income growth has stagnated. Notably, pessimism around income levels is even more pronounced in rural areas. Moreover, a majority of urban consumers said that commodity prices have risen compared to a year ago and, as a result, their spending has increased. Coupled with stagnant incomes, this has led to a greater share of urban consumers feeling pessimistic about the overall economic situation of the country despite improved sentiment regarding

Urban perceptions are drawn from a Reserve Bank of India (RBI) survey conducted between March 1 and 10, 2025, covering respondents from 19 major cities. Rural perceptions are based on the first edition of a separate RBI survey, which gathered responses from households in rural and semi-urban areas across the country in the same period. Chart 1 shows the share of urban respondents who said that their employment opportunities have increased compared to a year ago. In March, 35.5% of respondents had said that their employment scenario had improved compared to a year ago, maintaining almost the same level recorded in the last one year. Chart 2 shows the share of urban respondents who said that their income levels have increased compared to a year ago. Only 23.8% claimed that their income levels have increased compared to a year ago — close to 12% points less than those who said that the job outlook has improved. The steady recovery in perceptions about income levels, since the pandemic-related peak pessimism, saw a reversal in March 2024. From that month, optimism about income levels started to dip again. This negative trend persisted into March 2025 as well, with fewer than one in four urban respondents reporting any improvement in their income levels. Charts 1 and 2, when read together, suggest that while a decent number of jobs are available in urban areas, income levels remain largely stagnant, as noted earlier. Chart 3 presents the share of urban and rural respondents who reported a decline in their income compared to a year ago. Across all surveyed months, a consistently higher proportion of rural respondents expressed pessimism about their income levels compared to their urban counterparts. In March this year, 29.9% of rural respondents said that their income levels have declined compared to a year ago, higher than the 23.3% who said the same in urban areas. Chart 4 illustrates the share of urban respondents who said that commodity prices have increased over the past year. As of March, over 90% continued to report that prices were higher than a year ago.

This perception appears to have influenced spending behaviour. Chart 5 shows the share of urban respondents who said that their spending has increased compared to the previous year. In March, over 80% reported higher spending levels compared to a year ago. Chart 5 | Share of urban respondents who said that their spending has increased compared to the previous yearCharts 4 and 5 indicate that rising prices have led to higher spending. However, as Chart 2 shows, income levels are stagnant. This suggests that many urban residents may be struggling to make ends meet despite retaining their jobs. This had an effect on the overall economic perception of urban residents. Only 34.7% of them said in March that the overall economic situation has improved this year, compared to last year. This is the lowest such share of respondents in over a year

Doctor, will I ever run again? On life after a heart attack

Aditya (name changed), the 47-year-old father of two, has always been active. A university-level badminton player in his younger days, he remained a regular runner and fitness enthusiast. A 5,000-metre run at the start of each weekend helped him maintain his physical and mental fitness despite a busy schedule. There was no past medical history. He looked healthy and fit. During a work meeting one day, Aditya experienced a searing pain in his chest. He also felt uneasy. The pain continued even after he took two antacids. He began to perspire after a while, and experienced a heavy feeling in both shoulders. Sitting next to him, a co-worker saw something was amiss and called an emergency helpline. Aditya was taken to a hospital with an emergency and cardiac team. His ECG showed that he was having a heart attack. After being hurried to the cath lab, an angiography was performed on him. A blood clot had blocked one of his main heart arteries. In between performing an angioplasty, the doctors informed the family. To remove the blockage, a stent was inserted. After a straightforward procedure, he was moved to the intensive care unit (ICU). then to the ward, and after three days, when he was discharged he was stable. When spoken to after the procedure, his only question was. Doctor, will I be able to run again? Will I be able to play sports like before?' Younger people who experience heart attacks usually worry about this. Despite their apparent activity, many of them have hidden risk factors. Today, heart attacks are increasingly common among young people. The main causes include stress, long work hours, sleep deprivation, junk food, smoking, inactivity, and obesity. Additionally, some individuals experience elevated homocysteine or lipoprotein (a), along with other silent risk factors like excessive levels of bad cholesterol. Aditya's cardiac function decreased from 60% to 40% after the heart attack. He began taking blood thinners, cholesterol-lowering pills, and medications to help his heart pump more efficiently. It was recommended that he follow a strict diet and consume more salads, fruits, veg-



etables, and lean meats like chicken or steamed fish. Ghee vanaspati, fried food, and too much oil were to be avoided

After a week, he started taking 4,000-5,000 steps per day. He was able to walk 4-5 kilometers every day for a month. His strength slowly returned, and he resumed work. His LDL cholesterol had decreased to 50 mg/dL and cardiac function had improved to 50% at the three-month monitoring. He had more vitality. He began alternating between walking and quick runs. After seven months, he managed to complete a 10-kilometre office marathon. Never ignore warning indications such as shoulder pain, perspiration, or chest discomfort. Lives can be saved by immediate intervention and treatment. After a heart attack, it is possible to resume your regular life with proper support, care, medications, and lifestyle modifications. Heart attacks are no longer just a problem for the elderly. A lot of young, active people are also at risk because of aspects related to their lifestyle. Regular health check-ups, regular exercise, a nutritious diet, and timely treatment can save lives; therefore, it is important to never ignore early symptoms. This case shows that even in young people, recovery from a heart attack is possible with timely treatment, quality medical care, and healthy

Underwater heavyweight mantis shrimp also packs a natural energy shield

The mantis shrimp is a colourful, 10-cm-long resident of the ocean whose appearance belies its reputation as one of the most fearsome predators on the planet. These unassuming crustaceans use a hammer-shaped appendage called the dactyl club to strike their prey at a blistering 23 m/s (about 50-times faster than the blink of an eye), smashing into the poor creature's body like a bullet from a gun fired point blank. The strike releases enough energy to send small shockwaves through the surrounding water. But the thing about guns is that every bullet fired has a recoil. It's Newton's third law of motion. If a firearm is not securely braced against the body to absorb it, the sudden backward motion can lead to severe injuries. Yet despite striking prey hard enough to produce shockwaves, the mantis shrimp remains unharmed. How is this possible? A team of researchers from the US and France found the answer in a specialised microstructure in the mantis shrimp's club. They found that this structure was capable of phononic shielding a unique ability that allows it to blunt the flow of acoustic waves and thus weaken the recoil the mantis shrimp has.

The team fired laser pulses at the microstructure in a rapid sequence that illuminated its response at less than one-billionth of a second at a time. They followed this up with numerical simulations. People have looked at the material structure under a microscope but haven't explored the dynamic mechanical behaviour, especially how it responds to wave propagation," Maroun Abi Ghanem, the study's coauthor and a researcher at the Centre National de la Recherche Scientifique, France, said. "We looked into this behaviour by sending waves through the structure and analysed how they interacted with the material."Triggering implosionsThe dactyl club of a mantis shrimp stores its energy in spring-like elastic structures held together by latchlike tendons. When the latch is released, the club is released. As it moves to deliver its punch, it displaces the surrounding water and forms small low-pressure zones. Inside these zones, the water's density drops so much that it turns into vapour, leaving behind a bubble.

When these bubbles collapse due to the pressure of the surrounding water, they release a considerable amount of heat and shockwaves of very high frequencies, up to hundreds of megahertz. Thus, each dactyl-club punch delivers two blows: one from its own punch and the other from the collapsing bubbles, and together they are capable of breaking the tough shells of clams, mussels, and other crustaceans. The dactyl club has a hierarchical design — a fine-tuned blend of mineral and organic materials arranged in three layers. The outermost impact surface is made of a thin but hard inorganic material called hydroxyapatite, which distributes the recoil and prevents it from accumulating at one point. Beneath it, the impact layer and the periodic region contain biopolymer fibres arranged in a pattern that can withstand repeated high-intensity impact without incurring significant damage. Previous studies have explored the club's material structure and impact resistance. The new study went a step further to check whether the periodic architecture of the materials enhances its mechanical performance. It does. The team found that the internal arrangement of the microstructure serves as a phononic bandgap: a structure that prevents energy waves of certain frequencies from passing through, or at least significantly attenuated, Horacio Espinosa, a study coauthor and professor of mechanical and biomedical engineering at Northwestern University in Illinois, the US, said.'An incredible example'To mimic the ultrafast club strike in the laboratory, the team used a pair of pulsed lasers that emit very short flashes of light: one to generate energy waves on the material surface and the other to detect them.

When the laser was directed onto a material, it absorbed the light and induced thermoelastic expansion, i.e. heating and expanding the material. This generated a stress wave on the surface, like a miniature earthquake. The team tracked the wave's movement through the shrimp's club to understand energy transfer in the material. The readings helped researchers draw dispersion diagrams - plots that revealed the bandgaps, or specific frequency ranges, where waves couldn't pass through or were considerably weakened. The appearance of this pattern in the data indicated

to the team that the mantis shrimp used phononic shielding

to protect itself from the recoil. "What's even more fascinat-



ing is that our findings suggest the club's structure not only resists these intense forces but may also be fine-tuned to control how shock waves propagate through it," Espinosa said. "This dual role of structural robustness and wave manipulation is an incredible example of nature optimising materials at multiple levels.'

For a long time, scientists believed that materials that could guide the flow of energy in particular ways could only be created in the lab, not in the wild. Such materials are called metamaterials: they have specially tailored geometries to achieve these effects. The new finding about the mantis shrimp stands to change this belief. Nature always had metamaterials. The study's findings can also be applied to develop synthetic sound-filtering materials for use in protective gear, such as earmuffs for soldiers. They could also inspire new approaches to reducing blast-related injuries in the army and sports, the researchers said in a statement. "We are working on biomimetic structures inspired by the architecture of the mantis shrimp with a focus on wave trapping," Abi Ghanem said. "We are interested in understanding how the structures trap waves, explore what we can do with this trapped energy, and if it is possible to convert the trapped energy into another form." India's US-bound exports in March up 35% as exporters frontloaded shipments to beat reciprocal duties



Official data showed that India's exports to the US in March stood at \$10.14 billion, up 35.06 per cent from \$7.51 billion in March 2024. Indian exporters rushed to beat the reciprocal tariffs expected to come into effect on April 2, pushing goods worth over \$10 billion to the US last month alone — a sharp jump of 35 per cent compared to March last year, according to data released by the Commerce and Industry Ministry

Even as the reciprocal tariffs were subsequently paused for 90 days, exporters globally scrambled last month to accelerate shipments before the duties kicked in. Tech giant Apple, for instance, flew several last-minute consign-

ments of iPhones to the US before the tariffs were due to take effect. Official data showed that India's exports to the US in March stood at \$10.14 billion, up 35.06 per cent from \$7.51 billion in March 2024. For the full financial year (April 2024 to March 2025), exports to the US totalled \$86.51 billion — an increase of 11.59 per cent compared to \$77.52 billion during the same period in the previous year. Meanwhile, goods imports from the US also rose to \$3.70 billion in March 2025, 9.63 per cent higher than in March 2024. Over the same financial year, imports rose 7.44 per cent to \$45.53 billion, compared to \$42.13 billion in 2023–24

The data further showed that India's total goods and services exports in 2024–25 reached a record \$820.93 billion, up 5.50 per cent from \$778.13 billion in the previous financial year. Services exports rose by 12.45 per cent to \$383.51 billion, while goods exports saw marginal growth of 0.08 per cent, reaching \$437.42 billion. Just hours before the April 2 deadline, US President Donald Trump announced a 90-day pause, stating that 75 countries had approached the US seeking to sign trade agreements. However, Trump simultaneously raised tariffs on China to 145 per cent. India and the US are currently negotiating a bilateral trade agreement aimed at more than doubling trade — from the current \$191 billion to \$500 billion by 2030. The first phase of the deal is expected to be concluded by autumn (September—October) this year.

SEBI bans Gensol Engg, promoters from securities market in fund diversion case

Capital markets regulator SEBI on Tuesday barred Gensol Engineering and promoters — Anmol Singh Jaggi and Puneet Singh Jaggi — from the securities markets till further orders in a fund diversion and governance lapses case. The regulator has also debarred Anmol and Puneet Singh Jaggi from holding the position of a director or key managerial personnel in Gensol until further orders. Further, the markets watchdog directed Gensol Engineering Ltd (GEL) to put on hold the stock split announced by it. The order came after the Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI) received a complaint in June 2024 relating to the manipulation of share price and diversion of funds from GEL and thereafter started examining the matter. In a 29-page interim order, SEBI said, "The prima facie findings have shown mis-utilisation and diversion of funds of the company (GEL) in a fraudulent manner by its promoter directors, Anmol Singh Jaggi and Puneet Singh Jaggi, who are also the direct beneficiaries of the diverted funds". "The company has attempted to mislead SEBI, the CRAs (credit rating agencies), the lenders and the investors by submitting forged conduct letters purportedly issued by its lenders,"

The noticees 1, 2 and 3 (GEL, Anmol and Puneet Singh Jaggi) are alleged to have violated the provisions of PFUTP



(Prohibition of Fraudulent and Unfair Trade Practices) rules, it added.SEBI noted that the promoters were running a listed public company as if it were a propriety firm. GEL's funds were routed to related parties and used for unconnected expenses as if the company's funds were promoters' piggy banks. The result of these transactions would mean that the diversions at some time need to be written off from Gensol's books, ultimately resulting in losses to the investors of the company. "...prima facie evidence of a blatant violation of rules of corporate governance is writ large over the workings of the company.

The diversion of funds of the company (GEL) by promoter entities reflects a culture of weak internal control, where even ring-fenced borrowings from institutional creditors were rerouted at the total discretion of the promoters," SEBI's whole-time member Ashwani Bhatia said in the order. The internal controls at Gensol appear to be loose and through the quick layering of transactions, funds have seamlessly flowed to multiple related entities/individuals, Bhatia said.

US has big advantages on services, but projects deficits on goods trade; talks will be based on 'true picture', says govt

Commerce Secretary Sunil Barthwal said Tuesday that the Bilateral Trade Agreement (BTA) talks with the US are focused on the exchange of "right facts" and the "true picture" of trade between the two countries. This comes as US President Donald Trump has consistently sought to pressurise trade partners, accusing them of "ripping the US off" on goods trade, but overlooking the advantages that America enjoys in the services sector. "When we engage with the US team, all the facts are on the table, and the negotiations are based on the right facts and the data we exchange with them. That is completely rooted in the true picture which exists between the two countries. So, the BTA progresses on those lines," Barthwal said. Multiple experts in India have also pointed out that the 26 per cent reciprocal tariffs announced by the US on India were based solely on goods trade, while ignoring services trade — an area where the US and other Western countries hold considerable advantages over developing nations.

According to data compiled by the US Bureau of Economic Analysis, which falls under the country's Department of Commerce, services exports from the US to India have consistently grown over the last three years. In 2022, such exports stood at \$26.53 billion, rising to \$33.99 billion in 2023, and \$40.26 billion in 2024. Notably, the US recorded a marginal trade deficit with India in terms of services imports from New Delhi during the same period — with imports recorded at \$33.03 billion in 2022, \$36.4 billion in 2023 and \$40.74 billion in 2024.

India is considered the largest market by user base for several major US tech companies — such as Meta's Facebook, Instagram and WhatsApp, and Alphabet's Google Search and YouTube — owing to its large population and some of the world's lowest internet data rates. As such, beyond direct monetary value, Indian users provide hundreds of millions of eyeballs for American tech products, while also generating vast amounts of data to fine-tune their services. Incidentally, countering concerns over the selective use of goods trade deficit, China, in a white paper released last week, said that services and local sales of domestic enterprises' branches in the other country (i.e., local sales generated through two-way investment) should also be taken into account when discussing trade.

"When the three components — trade in goods, trade in services, and local sales of domestic enterprises' branches in the other country — are considered together, it becomes clear that the economic and trade benefits accrued by China and the US are roughly balanced," the Chinese white paper stated. In India, revenues from major American companies' operations here have been on a steady rise, particularly in online advertising, which has seen substantial growth due to increasing digital adoption in the country. For instance, Meta India's revenue from operations in FY24 grew by 9.3 per cent to Rs 3,034.8 crore, up from Rs 2,775.7 crore in FY23, while its net profit rose by 43 per



cent to nearly Rs 505 crore. Meta India also makes royalty payments to Meta USA for the commercialisation of intellectual property, along with infrastructure charges. Similarly, Google India saw its revenues increase by 26 per cent to Rs 5,921.1 crore in FY24, from Rs 4,700 crore in FY23. Microsoft India's FY24 revenue grew by more than 18 per cent year-on-year to nearly Rs 23,000 crore. The Global Trade Research Initiative (GTRI) said that the US frequently misrepresents trade figures. "For example, Trump claimed that the US trade deficit with India is \$100 billion, whereas India's official data places it at under \$45 billion. Similarly, the White House fact sheet inaccurately stated that India imposes a 100 per cent tariff on Harley-Davidson motorcycles, when the actual tariff was reduced from 50 per cent to 30 per cent on 1 February 2025," the GTRI report stated.

Wipro Q4 PAT up 26 per cent to Rs 3,569.6 cr

New Delhi: India's fourth-largest IT company Wipro on Wednesday reported a 25.9 per cent increase in consolidated net profit to Rs 3,569.6 crore during the March quarter. It had reported a profit (attributable to equity holders of the company) of Rs 2,834.6 crore in the year-ago period. Revenues for the fourth quarter (Q4) of FY25 came in at Rs 22,504.2 crore, a marginal increase of 1.33 per cent from Rs 22,208.3 crore in Q4 FY24. Sequentially, profit and revenue rose 6.43 per cent and 0.83 per cent, respectively. For full FY25, profits saw an uptick of 18.9 per cent to Rs 13,135.4 crore, according to a regulatory filing. Revenues for the full fiscal year tanked 0.74 per cent to reach Rs 89,088.4 crore. For Q1 FY26, the Bengaluru-headquartered firm sees revenue from its IT services business to be in the range of USD 2,505 million to USD 2,557 million, a drop of 1.5-3.5 per cent in constant currency terms on a sequential basis. "As clients remain cautious in the face of macroeconomic uncertainty, we're focused on partnering closely with them while staying committed to consistent and profitable growth," Wipro CEO and MD Srini Pallia said.

Govt fears trade war may trigger import surge of US farm, Chinese factory goods



AMID ESCALATING global trade tensions, the Commerce and Industry Ministry is assessing the risks of significant trade diversion from other countries to India and is particularly concerned about the likely surge in imports of US farm produce and factory goods from China, Vietnam and Indonesia into the country, a government official said "A recent assessment highlighted the risk of merchandise dumping into India due to reciprocal tariffs amid global trade tensions. Rising US costs may prompt exporters from countries like China, Vietnam, and Indonesia — all facing US trade deficits — to divert goods to India, potentially triggering import surges. Additionally, Chinese retaliatory tariffs on US goods could further increase the inflow of US agricultural products into India," the official said. Unlike other countries, China retaliated against US tariffs, which in turn has raised the risk of trade diversions globally. While the US has imposed a cumulative of 145 per cent tariffs on Chinese products apart from electronic items, Chinese tariffs on US items have also surged to a record 125 per cent. Notably, soybean and corn are the top US agri exports to China.

To support stakeholders amid shifting global trade conditions, including tariff hikes, import surges, and export-related disruptions, the Directorate General of Foreign Trade (DGFT) under the Commerce Ministry launched the Global Tariff and Trade Helpdesk on April 11, 2025, the Commerce and Industry Ministry said. The Indian Express had reported earlier this month that a high-level meeting had taken place at the Commerce and Industry Ministry to assess possible import surge as a result of trade diversions in the backdrop of the reciprocal tariffs. "With a number of tariff announcements and subsequent pauses, things are in flux. But we are looking at import surges and have identified some countries for more intense monitoring. We have also picked commodities for closer watch because we are already aware of certain trends, and we are focusing on

those commodities," Commerce Secretary Sunil Barthwal said. "Depending upon how the world is moving in terms of tariffs, counter-tariffs, exemptions and other developments, we are monitoring those imports. We are also in touch with our stakeholders. Our commodity divisions within the Ministry of Commerce are in contact with export promotion councils and various ministries. Based on the feedback, inputs, and data we analyse, remedial measures will, of course, be taken," Barthwal said.

Meanwhile, the Commerce Ministry said the Directorate General of Trade Remedies (DGTR), the anti-dumping watchdog, has issued final findings on 13 trade remedy investigations on imports in March alone, particularly from China and other countries such as Japan, Taiwan, and the European Union. Items include Vitamin-A Palmitate, Insoluble Sulphur, and Aluminium Foil up to 80 microns, among others. Economists and trade experts have also raised concerns over a surge in exports from China. A research note by HDFC Bank on Friday stated that apart from the direct impact of US tariffs on Indian exports, India faces a "high risk" of oversupply from China, which could hurt domestic manufacturing. "With the tariff increase on Chinese goods now effectively exceeding 60 per cent, it is more likely that a greater share of China's supply could flow into other markets. This makes domestic manufacturing in countries like India vulnerable to cheaper Chinese oversupply," noted Sakshi Gupta, Principal Economist at HDFC Bank. According to Crisil Ratings, India faces a high risk of indirect impacts from US tariffs, particularly in electronics machinery, and textiles, as Chinese exporters may divert their shipments to India as part of a geographical diversification strategy. "The top Chinese exports to the US, including electronics, machinery, and textiles, are particularly vulnerable to dumping, and their influx into the Indian market could impact domestic industries. However, the Indian government may impose anti-dumping duties to safeguard Indian exporters and mitigate any potential damage," Crisil Ratings stated. International think tank the Lowy Institute, in a recent research paper, estimated that about 80 per cent of countries traded more with China than with the US in 2023. However, the US remains a key driver of global demand, particularly as it has increased imports from countries such as Vietnam and Mexico, shifting away from China following the first round of Trump-era tariff hikes. "This increase in imports from China is a combination of US tariffs prompting China to diversify into other markets and a redirection of its exports (parts and components) via other countries that ultimately serve the US market," the think tank

IndusInd Bank external audit reveals Rs 1,979 crore derivative discrepancies

Indusind BankAs per RBI directives on investments issued in September 2023, banks are prohibited from conducting internal trades/ hedging and, accordingly, IndusInd Bank too ceased internal trades from April 1, 2024IndusInd Bank on Tuesday said the report prepared by the external agency – PwC — showed Rs 1,979 crore of 'negative impact' to the net worth of the bank due to the derivative discrepancies. "Based on the report, the bank said that it has assessed an adverse impact of 2.27 per cent to its net worth as of 2024." it said in an exchange filing.

The bank also disclosed the ongoing review by an external agency which was independently reviewing the internal findings. "The report from the external agency identified discrepancies relating to derivative deals," it said. "The bank will appropriately reflect the resultant impact in the financial statements for FY 2024-25 and will continue to take suitable steps to augment the internal controls relating to the derivative accounting operations of the bank," it said. On March 10, 2025, the bank had disclosed that it noted certain discrepancies in accounts balances of its derivative portfolio. The internal review by the bank had estimated an adverse impact of approximately 2.35 per cent of the bank's net worth as of December 2024. As per RBI directives on investments issued in September 2023, banks are prohibited from conducting internal trades/ hedging and, accordingly, IndusInd Bank too ceased internal trades from April 1, 2024. However, during an internal review, the bank identified certain discrepancies where accounting of losses on



forex derivatives/ swap transactions executed prior to April 2024 (over the past 5-7 years) to hedge forex deposits/ debt were not recognised through NII (net interest income), while the corresponding treasury gains were recognised in the P&L. Derivatives are used by treasury department to convert forex deposits/ borrowings into the rupee. According to banking sources, it is probable that the bank was aware of the scale of the issue long before they claimed to have discovered it, and that the disclosure was prompted by the RBI. The bank's handling of internal trades and accrued interest differential has raised questions, as it appears that these transactions were not fully unwound on a daily basis. As a result, the loss accumulated over time instead of being adjusted gradually. This is a likely breach of accounting

Nvidia says it will make AI supercomputers in the US amid looming tariffs, national security probe

Chip major Nvidia said it would produce artificial intelligence (AI) supercomputers entirely in the United States, a day after President Donald Trump said he would soon impose tariffs on semiconductors imported from elsewhere. It makes Nvidia the latest tech company to back Trump's tariff-induced push for local manufacturing. "Together with leading manufacturing partners, the company has commissioned more than a million square feet of manufacturing space to build and test Nvidia Blackwell chips in Arizona and AI supercomputers in Texas," the company said in a press statement. Its Blackwell chips have started production at the Phoenix plant of Taiwan Semiconductor Manufacturing Company (TSMC), Nvidia said, adding that it is building supercomputer manufacturing plants in Texas, with Foxconn in Houston and with Wistron in Dallas. Mass production at both plants is expected to ramp up in the next 12-15 months. "The AI chip and supercomputer supply chain is complex and demands the most advanced manufacturing, packaging, assembly and test technologies. Nvidia is partnering with Amkor and SPIL for packaging and testing operations in Arizona," the company said.

Within the next four years, NVIDIA plans to produce up to half a trillion dollars of AI infrastructure in the United States through partnerships with TSMC, Foxconn, Wistron, Amkor and SPIL. "Manufacturing Nvidia AI chips and supercomputers for American AI factories is expected to create hundreds of thousands of jobs and drive trillions of dollars in economic security over the coming decades," it added. "The engines of the world's AI infrastructure are being built in the United States for the first time," said Jensen Huang, founder and CEO of Nvidia. "Adding American manufacturing helps us better meet the incredible and growing demand for AI chips and supercomputers, strengthens our supply chain and boosts our resiliency."

Last week, the US administration exempted smartphones, computers and memory chips, among others, from the tariff regime, fueling speculation that the US might temper its overall strategy. However, hours later, Trump said that tariffs on semiconductors would be announced soon and that the exemptions may not be permanature.



nent, signalling that any relief might be temporary. The US has also initiated a national security investigation into the imports of semiconductors and semiconductor manufacturing equipment. As per an unpublished version of the investigation, the probe would cover, among other things, semiconductor substrates and bare wafers, legacy chips, leading-edge chips, microelectronics, and SME components.

Google suspends 2.9 millionn advertisers' accounts in India

New Delhi: Internet giant Google suspended 2.9 million advertisers' accounts in India and removed 247.4 million ads in 2024 for abusing its advertisement policy, the company said in a report .Globally, Google suspended over 39.2 million advertiser accounts, removed 5.1 billion ads and restricted over 9.1 billion ads, the company said in its annual ads safety report. "In India, 247.4 million ads were removed and 2.9 million advertiser accounts were suspended," the report said. The company said it launched over 50 enhancements to its LLMs (large language models) in 2024, which sped up complex investigations, helping identify bad actors and fraud signals like illegitimate payment information during account set-up.

Thinking ahead to the England tour — the future can wait



Some five decades ago, after India had been swamped 0-3 in a Test series in England, skipper Ajit Wadekar, then 34, quickly announced his retirement. India had to find a captain with experience and the ability to motivate a team down in the dumps. They settled on Wadekar's predecessor, the charismatic Nawab of Pataudi Jr. who had not played in over four years. When the selectors initially offered him the job for the first two Tests in the home series against the West Indies, Pataudi told them it had to be all five or nothing. West Indian cricketer Clive Lloyd and India's Nawab of Pataudi during the India and West Indies Test series in 1974.

The selectors relented, and Pataudi led in one of the most exciting series, India levelling the scores after losing the first two Tests before losing the decider in Mumbai. Having put Indian cricket on an even keel, Pataudi handed over charge to Bishan Bedi who led in the tours that followed, to New Zealand and the West Indies. When a team has lost a series or two badly, is it better to go in for a younger captain and team with the long-term view, or to plump for experience and an ad hoc approach, with just one series in mind? That's a question the selectors will have to answer soon. India play a five-Test series in England from June, having lost a home series to New Zealand 0-3 and lost 1-3 in Australia, both under Rohit Sharma. India won two ICC white ball tournaments under Rohit, but the captain averages 10.93 in his last eight Tests, with just one 50, and his place in the eleven must be in doubt.

Rohit Sharma turns 38 this month. He has been one of the most unselfish of Indian captains, a white ball great who never asks a player to do what he would not do him-

self. The two younger players who might lead are Jasprit Bumrah, 31, and Shubhman Gill, 25; Bumrah has led in a Test in England too. There are others in the mix: K L Rahul, who has led in three Tests, and Rishabh Pant, who has been vice captain. Indian cricket, like Indian politics, often invokes TINA. "there is no alternative". There is always an alternative, of course. In many ways, the England tour is a starting point. It is the first in the new cycle of the World Test Championship. It catches an Indian team in transition, with Rohit and Virat Kohli, 36, close to the end of their careers, and three. Rishabh Pant, Gill and Yashaswi Jaiswal set to carry the batting on their shoulders in the next generation. The odd man in the middle is K L Rahul. This is a good spread, although one or two more mid-career batters might allow the captain to breathe easier. This is particularly important for a series in England. Experience and form have to come together, and when they do, you have the ideal candidate. Karun Nair's recent heroics in the IPL follows his monstrous run of scores in the Vijay Hazare Trophy, and more relevantly, his 863 runs in the Ranji season, the most by a

Karun Nair plays a shot on the fourth day of the fifth and final Test between India and England at the M.A. Chidambaram Stadium in Chennai on December 19, 2016. Nair is 33, which is not the end of the world, even if his Test match triple century might have come eight years ago. He has played first class cricket in England for Northamptonshire for whom he has scored a double century and averaged over 50 each season. The manner in which he handled Bumrah in the IPL suggests he is ready for a comeback with his combination of skill, style and fettle.

Making Bumrah captain – and he is a fine strategist who understands his players well – over a long tour might be a bit of a risk although he is the best qualified after Rohit. He is India's trump card and will need to be handled delicately, perhaps even rested for a match, if he is to be fully effective. Once the choice is made between ad hocism and preparing for the future, the selection falls into place. Virat Kohli, who has been there and done that might play the role Pataudi did, steadying the ship before handing it over to a younger man. The future can wait a little in that case.

Dharmender, Sunny and a Bollywood-style twist – Meet Bobby aka Digvesh Rathi, IPL's breakout spinner

Dharmender, an assistant at a building-material shop, named his first two sons – what else, Sunny and Bobby. Later, he had a third one. Pleased, he called him Happy. Earlier this month, in his modest house, in one of the many buildings standing cheek by jowl in a bylane of Saboli in Northeast Delhi, Dharmender's life turned into a feel-good sports movie. 'Bobby', who the world knows as Digvesh Rathi, has been this IPL season's breakout spinner. Picked by Lucknow SuperGiants for Rs 30 lakh, the 25-year-old mystery spinner got the Player of the Match award for his figures of 1/21 in a high-scoring game against Mumbai Indians, in just his fourth game of his debut IPL season. That night, when Bobby was being interviewed, Dharmender shed tears, older brother Sunny had a lump in his throat and mother Manju was in the puja room.

The family has been with Digvesh through his many struggles and made sacrifices too. Brother Sunny, a former left-arm spinner, was equally good at cricket. But Dharmender couldn't afford two cricketers in the family, so Sunny dropped out. Sunny now works as a police constable at the Mandoli Prison Complex. It's Sunday, Sunny's weekly off and he is happy to talk about his brother's skills and struggles. "He's here because of his sheer hard work. Digvesh had no godfather, we had no money or influence. We were advised to move out of Delhi. Par bhag kyun jaye (but why would we run away)?." Sunny tells Dharmender says he always believed his son would make it. "Even when he suffered setbacks, he was passionate about the game," he says while giving a quick tour of the small trophy cabinet in the living room. Digvesh's mother Manju says she is happy to leave everything to God. "I didn't watch when he played his first game... When he calls, I only tell Digvesh not to get carried away by success. And I check if he has slept and eaten well," she says. Sunny narrates the story of how Digvesh, the batsman with a Virender Sehwag-like cover drive when he was 13, took to bowling. Those days, he says, the brothers trained on their own at the Poorvi Delhi Khel Parisar in East Delhi's Tahirpur, where batting slots were limited and in demand. "When it was Digvesh's turn to bat, most of the good bowlers were disinterested in bowling because he wasn't a known name. When he played good strokes against them, their ego was hurt too. Players brought their own cricket balls, so they didn't want to waste it on him. I would bowl to him for hours but facing only one bowler limits a batsman,"

Inspired by West Indies spinner Sunil Narine's feats with the cricket ball, Digvesh turned to bowling, aiming at a single stump for hours even as Sunny stood behind the nets and gave instructions. This would be his routine between 1 pm and 3 pm before the other trainees arrived for practice and then from 6 pm to 7 pm, after they left at sunset. "Tappe pe marta, ghanton tak (He would hit one spot for hours)," recalls Sunny.Digvesh's workrate has Lucknow



SuperGiants head coach Justin Langer impressed. The former Australia opener had praised Digvesh, saying, "If he could bowl for 16 hours a day, he would bowl for 16 hours a day. He probably bowls in the corridor of the hotel, he bowls at breakfast, he bowls in the shower, he bowls everywhere. He just loves bowling, and he is being rewarded for years and years of practice." LSG's trust in Digvesh is paying off. So far this IPL, he is joint-fourth among wicket-takers. His run-up, accuracy and subtle variation are the reasons he is being compared to the West Indian T20 great Narine. In a game against KKR, Digvesh even got Narine's wicket. After the game, he got an audience with his idol. Till two years ago, Digvesh didn't have a regular coach. That's when Vijay Dahiya, the former India and Delhi wicketkeeper, spotted him during a club game. "He would get calls from different clubs in Delhi and play for whichever team had a spot open. At one point, I had enrolled him at a reputed academy in Peeragarhi for Rs 2,500 a month but they made him sit on the bench for two years. But once Dahiya saw him at a local match, Digvesh got support. Dahiya called him to train at his Mori Gate academy," says Sunny. His brother's fortunes improved after he bagged 14 wickets in the Delhi Premier League for South Delhi Superstarz. Dharmender's heart swells with pride when talking about his IPL-capped son. A new refrigerator, still wrapped in its cardboard packaging, is the only recent addition to the Rathi household. The family is also keeping its fingers crossed for Happy, the youngest of the three brothers who is preparing for his police exams. Sunny was, however, worried when Digvesh was fined during the IPL for the send-off he gives to batsmen using his palm as a notebook, he scribbles a signature every time he gets a wicket. "I did ask Digvesh about it. He told me it motivates him. I said, 'okay, if that helps you play better, fine, but don't disrespect any player'. He's not doing it to attract attention. He was not even on social media till recently... wouldn't even update his WhatsApp status. He would say, 'what is the point of status update, when you

Punjab Kings defended the lowest total in IPL history — 111 — against Kolkata Knight Riders in their 16-run win at Maharaja Yadavindra Singh PCA International Stadium at Mullanpur on Tuesday night, thus handing KKR their fourth loss this season. With the Ajinkya Rahane-led team lost eight wickets for 33 runs in their chase, the captain was critical of the batting unit of the team and took the blame as a captain. "It's not like Punjab bowled very well. I think we played bad cricket as a batting unit. I take this responsibility as a captain that we couldn't chase this down. But individually, I'm sure, all the players, especially the batters, will think about their own game and improve in the upcoming matches," Rahane said while addressing the media post the match.

It was the Kings' fourth win in 17 home matches in the last two years. The home side had made a total of 111 runs in 20 overs. Kolkata Knight Riders were once placed at 62

for 2 in 7.3 overs during their run chase but then Rahane fell LBW to a Yuzvendra Chahal delivery and the Knight Riders erred by not taking the review with TV replays showing the impact of the ball outside off stump. Rahane's dismissal started the slide for Knight Riders as the team lost their next seven wickets for 33 runs. The Kolkata captain talked about not taking the review and the thought behind the decision. "As a batter, I thought that I could save the review for later. It shouldn't happen that I take a review and lose it, then we are only left with one review. The communication between the two batsmen (him and non-striker Angkrish Raghuvanshi) wasn't that clear. If someone clearly tells you that the impact can be out or it can miss, you take a review as a batter. But generally, the batsmen in front of you, you think about what they say. The communication wasn't that clear: Maybe it could be the umpire's call, maybe it could be hitting. That's why I didn't take a review. But again, no complaints. Apart from that, we also were pretty bad as a batting unit. And that was the reason we lost today," said

The captain also talked about the need for the batting unit to have game awareness in the match. With the pitch offering help to spinners, Rahane was of the view that the batsmen needed to grind it out. "It was not a flat wicket. There was something for the bowlers. We had to grind it out. T20, I believe, is not only about hitting sixes. Though we are seeing at this moment that most of the players are going for big shots, they want to look good while batting, it's not about that. It's all about reading the situation well. Having that game awareness as a batter, as an individual and then taking the game forward -that's what I thought we lacked today," said Rahane.

Ju Wenjun had defied the same opponent, Tan Zhongyi, in May 2018 to claim her first world championship crown. That was her seventh attempt at the Women's World Championship. Since then, she has defended her crown four times. In March 2017, Ju Wenjun became only the fifth woman to cross the 2600 rating threshold, reaching a peak rating of 2604 in March 2017. After that, in 2018, Ju played in the 64-player knockout tournament as the top seed, where she secured victory in every round before the final without needing tiebreaks. She then defeated Kateryna Lagno in a



tiebreak. In 2020, she defeated GM Aleksandra Goryachkina to retain the crown after plenty of drama. She beat Goryachkina in the third game of a rapid tiebreak after the event had ended 6-6 in classical games. Three years later, she defeated compatriot Lei Tingjie to stay the women's world champion. Ju Wenjun, currently ranked No 2 in the world in the women's rankings list, is a native of Shanghai. She started playing chess at seven, and in 2004, aged 13, she won a silver medal in the Asian Women's Chess Championship and qualified for her first Women's World Championship in 2006. What was remarkable about Ju Wenjun's career path is that inspired by Chinese legend Xie Jun, she eschewed junior competitions in favor of playing against adults from a young age.

India to tussle with Canada, Nigeria and two more countries to host Commonwealth Games 2030

Who wants to host the Commonwealth Games? After years of no nation raising their hand to answer that question, at least seven nations, including India, have thrown their hat into the ring to host the CWG, claims Commonwealth Sport. The governing body for the CWG has revealed that it had received official expressions of interest (EOIs) from seven nations and territories keen to explore hosting future editions of the CWG.While India's interest in hosting the Commonwealth Games has been made public in the previous months, Commonwealth Sport confirmed that it had received EOIs from Canada and Nigeria, besides two more unnamed countries, to host the centenary Commonwealth Games in 2030. The report also added that New Zealand are one of two nations that want to host the 2034 edition.

The future of the Commonwealth Games has looked uncertain over the past few years. Recently, Australia's Victoria had pulled out of hosting the Commonwealth Games next year because the Australian state was not willing to fork out as much as AUS \$7 billion (US\$4.8bn) on "a 12-day sporting event". The initial estimate for hosting the Games was AUS \$2.6 billion. South Africa's D??urban was stripped of the hosting rights for the 2022 CWG because of financial issues and was replaced by Birmingham, which



was actually scheduled to host the Games in 2026. Eventually, Glasgow stepped in to host the Commonwealth Games in 2026, but after making many alterations to the games programme. The statement from Commonwealth Sport said: "Hosting costs will be significantly reduced from historical Commonwealth Games costs to diversify the hosting pipeline and enable more, new countries and territories to host. This will be achieved through continued delivery optimisation and encouraging the use of existing venues for sport and accommodation, unless additional infrastructure is part of existing national development plans that will happen irrespective of a Games."


Nushrratt on her journey into 'motherhood'

Kishore Kumar left ailing wife Madhubala amid worsening health; would visit her once in 2 months, disconnect phone: 'Being abandoned killed her'

Despite her passing years ago, Madhubala continues to be one of the most enigmatic stars of Hindi cinema. Beyond her iconic performances during what is often referred to as Bollywood's 'golden era,' her personal life remains a subject of intrigue. It was also the sorrow in her personal life that earned her the moniker of the 'tragedy queen.' In a recent interaction, Madhubala's sister Madhur Bhushan talked about her life and her love affairs with Dilip Kumar and Kishore Kumar. Young in the film industry, Madhubala fell in love with Dilip Kumar. However, their romance didn't last long as the couple parted ways after an ego spat. After ending her relationship with Dilip, Madhubala got involved with Kishore Kumar, with whom she had worked in films like Dhake Ki Malmal (1956), Chalti Ka Naam Gadi (1958), and Half Ticket (1962). However, their marriage too wasn't a happy

Madhubala and Kishore Kumar married despite the Mughal-E-Azam star being diagnosed with a heart condition — a hole in her heart (ventricular septal defect). Their marriage suffered after Madhubala's condition worsened and she became bedridden. Talking about the same, Madhur told Filmfare, "As she (Madhubala) wasn't keeping well, Abba said don't get married now, see what the doctor has to say. But they got married in 1960." After Madhubala's condition worsened, Kishore Kumar flew her to London to consult a doctor, where they declared that she wouldn't survive. "Kishore Bhaiyya flew her to London about 10 days later. The doctors said, her heart is finished. And that she wouldn't live beyond two years," recalled Madhur.

Kishore Kumar, who was at the peak of his career at that time, left a suffering Madhubala at her home with her father and sisters. The actor argued that since his career demanded him to travel, he couldn't take care of the ailing actor. "Kishore Bhaiyya left her at our home. He said that she was sick and needed care while he had to travel, work,




sing and hence wouldn't be able to give her time. He said, I tried my best, I took her to London. But the doctors have said she won't survive. What's my fault?" Madhur added. Though Madhur didn't blame Kishore for leaving Madhubala alone during a tough time, she agreed that the actor-filmmaker didn't provide her with emotional strength. "We're not saying that he was wrong. Aapa was told by the doctors you cannot have sex, you cannot have children... But yet a woman needs emotional support no matter what." Madhur explained that Madhubala insisted on living with Kishore, and he even bought her a flat at Mumbai's Carter Road, but she was mostly left alone in the house. She said, "She'd be alone most of the time. The sea breeze made her sicker."Kishore reduced his visits to Madhubala and would also not be available to take her calls, and that made her jealous. "Often Kishore Bhaiyya's phone was disconnected. He'd visit her once in two to three months. He'd say, 'If I come, you'll cry and it will not be good for your heart. You'll go into depression. You should rest.' She was young, jealousy was natural. Perhaps, a feeling of being abandoned killed her," said Madhur. Madhur admitted that despite seeing heartbreak and facing a fatal illness, her sister had a 'tremendous willpower' that helped her survive for nine years when she was only given two years to live. She passed away in 1969, at the age of 36.
